In 1987, Carrie Saxon Perry was the first African-American woman elected mayor of Hartford—a first for any New England city. She was an outspoken barrier-breaker who brought people together and advocated fiercely for city residents. After her service as Hartford Mayor, Perry became active in the Greater Hartford branch of the N.A.A.C.P. and served as its president from 2004 to 2008.

With the help of Mary Mahoney and Amy Harrell, the group then preserved all the material, including full length interviews, in the Trinity College <u>Digital Repository</u> and created a public facing <u>Historypin</u> collection which allows members of the public to learn about Carrie Saxon Perry and contribute their own material and memories to the collection.

As a component of the project, Aisha, Amna and Olivia presented their preliminary findings to Desiree Primus' 5th grade class at SAND Elementary. They also created the following flier.
