IX Conferring of Honorary Degrees

MICHAEL STANLEY DUKAKIS

Doctor of Laws

Presented by James P. Whitters, III '62, P'95, '97, former member, Trinity College Board of Trustees Escorted by Kevin J. McMahon, John R. Reitemeyer Professor of Political Science and Charles A. Dana Research Professor of Political Science

In the autumn of 1933, the heart of the Great Depression, you were born in Brookline, Massachusetts, to an immigrant family whose success exemplified the American Dream. Your father and mother emigrated from Greece to America with their families in 1912 and 1913, respectively. Your father attended Harvard Medical School and became a respected obstetrician, and your mother graduated from Bates College.

In Brookline, where your parents settled after they were married, you attended public schools. A member of the Boy Scouts of America, you earned the rank of Eagle Scout and, as an adult, were honored with the Distinguished Eagle Scout Award, which is presented in recognition of significant career accomplishments and at least 25 years of distinguished service, after attaining the level of Eagle Scout, to one's community.

After graduating from Brookline High, you enrolled in Swarthmore College, graduating in 1955. From 1955 to 1957 you served in the Army, stationed primarily in Korea as part of the Support Group to the United Nations Delegation to the Military Armistice Commission. After being discharged, you enrolled in Harvard Law School, earning your law degree in 1960.

That same year, you launched your political career at the municipal level as an elected Town Meeting member and chair of the local Democratic organization in your hometown. Two years later, you won a seat in the Massachusetts legislature, where you would serve for four consecutive terms.

In 1970, you were your party's nominee for lieutenant governor. Though you lost the race that year, it was an important stepping-stone in your career. Four years later, you were nominated for governor, and this time you won handily.

With the victory, however, came daunting challenges. The state was suffering from a record deficit and unprecedented unemployment. Resolving those problems engaged you for your entire term and you were defeated in the Democratic primary in 1978. But you displayed one of the hallmark behaviors for which you are known, tenacity, remaining engaged in public affairs and maintaining a prominent profile. And in 1982 you were re-elected governor. In 1986 you won a third term, and that year you were named the nation's most effective governor by the members of the National Governors Association.

Two years later, you were honored with your party's nomination for the presidency of the United States. Following that election, you completed your term as governor and then left public office in 1991.

In the ensuing 22 years, you have been a distinguished professor in Northeastern University's Political Science Department, a visiting professor in UCLA's Luskin School of Public Affairs, and a distinguished fellow at Northeastern's Dukakis Center for Urban and Regional Policy. In addition, you have taught at Florida Atlantic University and served as a member of the faculty in the senior executive program for state and local managers at Harvard's John F. Kennedy School of Government. You also served as vice chair of the Amtrak Reform Board. Your passion for national health-care policy reform has resulted in extensive research and a series of papers in such leading journals as the Yale Law and Policy Review, The New England Journal of Medicine, and the Journal of American Health Policy.

For a lifetime of service to your nation, your state, your community, and your profession, I have the honor of presenting you, Michael Stanley Dukakis, for the degree of Doctor of Laws, honoris causa.

MARGARET ANN FARLEY

Doctor of Divinity

Presented by Allison Read, College Chaplain Escorted by Patricia Byrne, Professor of Religion, Emerita

ne of the nation's foremost religious ethicists, you attended the University of Detroit, where you earned your A.B. degree in English literature and M.A. in philosophy in 1957 and 1960, respectively. It was at Yale, in 1970 and 1973, that you completed your M.Phil. and Ph.D., both in religious studies, in 1970 and 1973.

A member of the Sisters of Mercy, you joined the faculty of the Yale Divinity School in 1971 as a lecturer. And it was there that you spent the balance of your teaching career: as an assistant professor from 1972 to 1974; associate professor from 1974 to 1984; professor from 1984 to 2007; and, now, as Gilbert L. Stark Professor Emerita of Christian Ethics.

Your prominence in your field is reflected in the many honors that have been bestowed upon you. You've received 11 honorary degrees and many other fellowships and awards. Among them, you received the prestigious John Courtney Murray Award for Excellence in Theology and the Grawemeyer Award in Religion for your book, *Just Love: A Framework for Christian Sexual Ethics*.

Your scholarship is reflected in your impressive body of published work. You have published more than 100 articles, papers, and book chapters on a range of topics that includes medical ethics, sexual ethics, ethics and spirituality, justice, historical theological ethics, and HIV/AIDS. In addition you have either written, co-written, or edited seven books. Among them, *Just Love* is arguably the most notable.

As controversial as it is widely read, *Just Love* offers a carefully articulated view of love in which the criterion for all loving relationships is grounded in justice. *Just Love*, which begins with a historic perspective and explores sexual ethics in the context of many kinds of relationships, raised your profile outside of your profession, ensuring that the book reached a very broad audience of people who have benefited from your insights.

Beyond your scholarship and commitment to your profession, you have remained, throughout your career, a servant of humankind. You have served on many different boards and committees related to ethics. You were a founding member of the Bioethics Committee at Yale-New Haven Hospital. For eight years you served as co-director of Yale's Interdisciplinary Center for Bioethics. You were director of the Divinity School's Women's Initiative. And you are past president of The Society of Christian Ethics and the Catholic Theological Society of America.

In 2002 you hosted a group of female theologians from Africa who traveled to New Haven to discuss how they might play a greater role in confronting the seemingly intractable AIDS/HIV pandemic in Africa. Out of that seminal meeting emerged the All-Africa Conference: Sister to Sister, of which you are co-director to this day.

Throughout your career you have never taken the easy way. Your scholarship and teaching stand as exemplars for painstaking research and circumspection. Nor have you been deterred when positions you have taken, on various topics, have provoked sometimes protracted and intense opposition.

For your integrity, your dedication to your profession, your unstinting service to your fellow human beings, and your steadfast belief in justice as the yardstick against which love is best measured, I have the honor of presenting you, Margaret Ann Farley, for the degree of Doctor of Divinity, honoris causa.

ELIZABETH KOLBERT

Doctor of Letters

Presented by Christoph E. Geiss, Associate Professor of Physics and Environmental Science Escorted by Margaret D. Lindsey P'12, Dean of the First-Year Program

You began your life's work by studying literature at Yale University. After being awarded a Fulbright Scholarship, you studied abroad at the Universität Hamburg, in Germany, where—in 1984—you embarked on your career in journalism as a stringer for *The New York Times*. A year later, you moved to that paper's metro desk in New York. From 1988 to 1991 you served as the *Times'* Albany bureau chief. You also contributed articles on a wide range of topics to *The New York Times Magazine*.

You remained a *Times* reporter until 1999, when you joined *The New Yorker* as a staff writer. Not surprisingly, considering your *Times* experience, your initial work at that magazine revolved around deeply researched and impeccably crafted political profiles.

Many of those, indeed, enlivened your first book, *The Prophet of Love: And Other Tales of Power and Deceit.* Published in 2004, it chronicles—through insightful portraits of such prominent figures as Hillary Clinton, Rudolph Giuliani, and Michael Bloomberg—the evolution of political influence in New York during the late 1990s, and especially in the aftermath of 9/11.

At *The New Yorker*, you have also branched out into book reviews and commentaries on many topics. But of special, and increasing, significance has been your reportage on environmental issues and, particularly, climate change, inspired by your growing conviction that climate change was an inadequately reported story, given its worldwide significance.

As if to validate that conviction, "The Climate of Man," a three-part series about global warming that you wrote not long after completing *The Prophet of Love*, earned you the American Association for the Advancement of Science Journalism Award in 2005. The series also earned the National Academies Communication Award and National Magazine Award for Public Interest in 2006, the year you received a Lannan Literary Fellowship.

That same year, you published your second book, *Field Notes from a Catastrophe*, which was chosen by Trinity for the entire Class of 2013 to read as their first college assignment. A powerful exploration of the causes and effects of global climate change, *Field Notes* effectively redefined your career. No longer simply a first-rate reporter, you have become one of the most widely known and highly respected environmental writers of our time.

When you received the 16th annual Heinz Award, in 2010, the citation noted, in part, that "She has become a trusted resource to a growing network of concerned citizens who crave informed expertise on the environmental issues, but who lack the access she has acquired to the many disciplines researching the topic." The Sierra Club concurred with that assessment, awarding you its David R. Brower Award, which recognizes outstanding environmental reporting, in 2011.

For your brilliant reporting, which has played an important role in raising awareness of what may be the single-most important science story of our time, and for your dedication to exemplifying and promoting the highest standards of journalism, I have the honor of presenting you, Elizabeth Kolbert, for the degree of Doctor of Letters, *honoris causa*.

BRIDGET MARY McCORMACK

TRINITY COLLEGE CLASS OF 1988 Doctor of Laws

Presented by Frank Kirkpatrick '64, Ellsworth Morton Tracy Lecturer and Professor of Religion Escorted by Howard DeLong, Brownell Professor of Philosophy, Emeritus

A Trinity alumna, you majored in political science and philosophy and graduated with honors in 1988. Both of your siblings—Mary Catherine McCormack and William McCormack—are also Trinity alumni; she in 1991, and he in 1996.

Three years after you graduated from Trinity, you received your J.D. from the New York University School of Law, where you were a Root-Tilden scholar and where you won the Ann Petluck Poses Memorial Prize for advocacy. For the first five years of your legal career, you worked in New York. At first you worked with the Legal Aid Society. Later you served with the Office of the Appellate Defender, where you represented more than 1,000 clients in the state's trial and appellate courts.

In 1996, you became a faculty fellow at Yale Law School. Two years later, you joined the faculty of the University of Michigan Law School, where you taught criminal law and legal ethics. Supervising the law school's General Litigation Clinic, you focused principally on the professional benefits of clinical legal education. Building on that experience, you created additional clinics at Michigan Law, including two focused on domestic violence and pediatric health advocacy.

Your exceptional work in that area was rewarded when, in 2002, you were named associate dean for clinical affairs. In that capacity you were responsible for ongoing development of the law school's practical education, and you continued to introduce new clinics that provided a range of legal services while affording students real-world learning experiences. Thanks to your leadership, students were soon able to hone their skills in clinics focusing on mediation, low-income taxpayers, international transactions, human trafficking, juvenile justice, and entrepreneurship.

At the same time that you were developing and introducing these innovative programs, you conducted and supervised a wide range of civil and criminal litigation in both the Michigan and federal courts. As a result of your investment in these programs, they are now nationally acknowledged to be among the best places for a young lawyer to develop his or her skills.

Additionally, you founded the Michigan Innocence Clinic, the first such clinic in America to handle exclusively non-DNA evidence cases. Students provide counsel to state residents who have been wrongly convicted. Thanks to that clinic, seven people have been exonerated in the past five years. So successful has the clinic been, in fact, that you were honored in 2010 with the Justice for All Award of the Criminal Defense Attorneys of Michigan. A year later, the Washtenaw County Bar Association presented you with the Patriot Award. And in 2012 you were honored by the Cooley Law School with the Distinguished Brief Award in recognition of the best brief filed in the Michigan Supreme Court that term.

In November of that year you were elected to the Michigan Supreme Court.

For your exceptional devotion to legal education, especially your passionate commitment to developing clinical opportunities for law students to learn while serving the public, I have the honor of presenting you, Bridget Mary McCormack, for the degree of Doctor of Laws, *honoris causa*.

The Academic Regalia

In 1895 a commission of leading American educators established the Intercollegiate Code pertaining to the academic costume. The color of the lining of the hood is that of the college or university conferring the degree. The edging of the hood and the tassel of the cap indicate the subject to which the degree pertains, in accordance with the following official designations for colleges and universities in the United States:

Trinity College differs from the above list because the colors of Trinity hoods were established prior to the formulation of the Code. Following are the colors of the academic hoods symbolizing the honorary degrees conferred by Trinity:

The Owen Morgan Mace

The mace, which precedes the president in academic processions, and is a symbol of his executive powers, was presented to Trinity in 1950 in memory of Owen Morgan, Class of 1906, who served his Alma Mater as a member of the Board of Fellows, as a Trustee, and as treasurer of the College. Historically, maces were first used as weapons in warfare and later became a symbol of the sovereign and his power. One of the first known uses of a mace by an educational institution was at Cambridge University in the thirteenth century. Today a number of colleges use the mace as a symbol of authority and of the power invested in the president by the faculty and trustees. The Morgan Mace is made of ebony, signifying endurance; bronze, meaning power; and gold, symbolizing dignity and glory. It is 44 inches long and weighs 20 pounds. The fluted staff represents the various components of an enduring education. It is bound by a gold ribbon, inscribed with the names of every Trinity president. On the head, or urn, of the mace are six seals of the sources of life and growth of this College: the Great Seal of the United States; the Seal of the State of Connecticut; the Charter Oak; the original seal of the City of Hartford; the Washington Coat of Arms; and the seal of the Episcopal Diocese of Connecticut. Surmounting the Gothic urn is the Trinity College seal crowned by an eagle about to take flight, symbolizing the freedom and power of an educated person.

The Presidential Collar

The collar, which is worn on ceremonial occasions, is the visible symbol of the president's high office and authority. The collar was presented to the College in 1953 by former President G. Keith Funston, Class of 1932, in memory of his grandmother, Maria Briggs Keith. The chain symbolically links modern higher education with the universities of yesteryear. The golden seal of the Trinity President hangs from the collar which is fashioned of 20 replicas of the Trinity Elms and seven silver seals including the six reproduced in the mace, and the Trinity College seal superimposed on a triangle representing the religious foundations of the College crowned by a sun signifying enlightenment. In the lower corners of the triangle are the Book and a pair of student's hands extended to receive it, symbolizing the desire of youth to receive an education.
