MINUTES OF THE RESIST STEERING COMMITTEE MEETING July 27, Cambridge

Direct mail

The next direct mail funding letter will go out in the middle of September. The mailing will include a list and description of projects funded by Resist, possibly a precis of the new Call, an appeal for funds, and other material designed to make people reach for their checkbooks.

New Call.

A press conference will be called to announce it. The first large mailing of the new call will be accompanied by a cover letter that explains the history of it.

Bill Ayers told me that he spoke to you about the fundraising that we are involved in to cover the expenses of the National Action in the fall. I am enclosing an itemized list that we have prepared to explain why we need money.

I hope that Resist will be able to help us pay for some of the projects and also that you will send me the mames of any people that you know who might also be willing to make a contribution.

I am not sure how far you are from Washington D.C. but if you are in driving distance you might want me to contact you when we pull together some of the fundraising projects that we have planned there. I hope to hear from you soon.

Lisa Meisel, National Office Staff Below is an itemized list of the expenses that we see forthcoming as we plan for the National Action in Chicago this fall. The explanation of each item will, we hope, make clear its necessity in order to organize a successful mass action to end the war in Vietnam, support the Black Liberation struggle, and demand that all political prisoners be set free.

Individuals and groups are urged to send contributions for either a specific item or a general contribution which we will use toward whichever project we feel is in need of funding most at the time.

Friends are also urged to send us lists which they have compiled of people who would be willing to aid us financially.

- 1. STAFF-\$2,100. A staff of ten people will be working full time on the National Action. These people are to be paid \$15 a week for 14 weeks.
- 2. TRAVEL-\$7,000. Five of the staff will be stationed at the Chicago office. The other fiewe will be traveling across the country to organize for the action. Travel expenses should run about \$100 a week per person for 14 weeks.
- 3. PROPAGANDA-500,000 posters, wallposters, and small stickers: \$20,000 1,000,000 leaflets: \$8,000 100,000 buttons: \$5,000

Because written propaganda is such an important part of any organizing job, we feel that mass distribution of posters, wallposters (these are glued onto buildings, etc.), small stickers, leaflets, and buttons is critical.

- 4. FUNDRAISING MAILINGS-\$500 MEMBERSHIP MAILINGS-\$1,000
- 5. MASS NEWSPAPER-\$24,000. We are going to start work immediately on a newspaper that will be appropriate for mass distribution. The three issues that will come out before the National Action will be distributed to 200,000 people each month and will cost \$8,000 to produce each month.
- 6. OFFICE-\$7,400. The National Action office costs \$900 to rent for three mendous we are having a WATS Line installed for that period because of the tremendous number of long distance phone calls that will have to be made (\$6,000). Supplies for this office will cost \$500.
- 7. LEGAL & MEDICAL-\$27,000. We are planning a massive peaceful demonstration, but we feel that we have a responsibility to those people who will be with us in Chicago to provide medical and legal services in the event that either would be necessary. We will have a team of doctors working with us who estimate their expenses at \$500, and a team of lawyers who have requested that they be allotted \$1,500. The lawyers also feel that a a bail fund of \$25,000 should be on hand to avoid any unnecessary hardships.

All of these expenses total \$102,500, which we must raise in the next three months. We hope that people will help us to make the National Action as important as the issues warrant it be by helping us with this financial burden.

Dear Bisa and Bill.

The Boston office will be sending out a check for \$400, which the steering committee voted at the last meeting. Our thought was that it might go a long way toward a fund-raising mailing; but obviously you will set your own priorities with that little piece toward the action. It's not impossible that, once it's clearer what plans are for October 11, people might be inclined to put up a little more for some specific purpose, but there's no way of knowing where we'll be financially in September or October.

People were very anxious to have some sense of what;s planned for the 11th. That is, I guess, some scenario about what you expect might happen-rally, march, where, when, etc. It's not impossible that RESIST would like to co-sponsor, for what that might be worth.

Our office will also be sanding you a list of Steering Committee people (somewhat different by now from what!s on the left here). Please feel free to contact them about fund-raising, etc. locally. If you want to know names of good local contacts, we can get that to you, but I'm not sure if Chicago will be the sort of scene to which the kinds of folks who make up the Resist "constituency" can usefully contribute.

Yes, we're in driving distance of Washington (about an hour). We'll be gone all of August (into once looked like a vacation), but back Sept. 1, and we'd like to be kept up on any fund-raising and other area plans. Can also put up folks coming through this way.
