Librarian's Report

THE REVEREND F. S. LUTHER, LL.D., President, Trinity College, Hartford, Connecticut.

SIR: — In accordance with Title XV., Section 3, of the Statutes, I submit herewith the annual report on the Library, the eighth which I have had the honor to make.

The Library has been open regularly fifty-one and one-half hours each week of the college year, an increase of six hours over the number it was open last year.

The following tables show the extent of the use made of it by the college body. No detailed table of circulation is given, because the circulation of books forms only a very small part of our work, and the conclusions that might be drawn from our circulation statistics would be more misleading than useful. By far the greater part of the use made of the library is within the library itself. It may, however, be of interest to state that during the year 397 volumes have been drawn by 74 students, or 40% of the total undergraduate body. These 74 students were of the following classes: Graduates 1, Seniors 15, Juniors 20, Sophomores 19, Freshmen 17, Specials 2. The total number of volumes drawn by Faculty, students, and others was as follows:

Of course no statistical record is kept of the number of books used in the library rooms; to do so would require so many additional regulations that use of the books would be discouraged rather than encouraged. But a fair impression of the extent to which use is made of the collection, may be gathered from the carefully compiled records of attendance herewith given. Two facts are clear, viz.: that a large number of the students are doing the reading and studying assigned by the professors, and that they are also making considerable independent use of the library for purposes of intellectual acquisition and recreation. The statistics show that there has been a steady growth in these matters during the past eight years. I know there will be a still greater growth with increased administrative facilities and additional means of attracting and helping the students. The percentage of undergraduates using the library is a large and entirely creditable one. The percentage of Freshmen is given separately because it has a special significance. If we can get the library habit inculcated during the first college year its good effects will be felt throughout the college course.

INCREASE OF THE LIBRARY.

There have been acquired during the year 3402 volumes, 1312 pamphlets, and 11 maps. Of these, 800 volumes were purchased, and 2602 volumes, 1312 pamphlets, 11 maps were presented.

The purchases were much the same in character as those of former years. It will be noted that their number was larger than in any previous year of which I have record. For the most part they have been the needed current works on subjects taught in the college.

The most important accession was a complete set of the great 'Corpus Inscriptionum Latinarum,' published under the supervision of the Royal Prussian Academy. It is "the one monumental work in its field;" without it, serious advanced work in the Latin Language or Roman history and antiquities is impossible. Our set was bought, at the request of the Rev. Dr. Samuel Hart, D.C.L., '66, from the income of the Library Fund established in his honor by certain of the Alumni in 1901.

GIFTS

In September 1906 the college was notified that the late Charles Washburn Clark, of Hartford, son of the late Rev. George H. Clark, D.D. (for many years a Trustee), had bequeathed to the college library such books in his library as were

not desired by his brother, Mr. George H. Clark, Jr. The latter made very few selections and in turn, presented the greater part of the library of his father, Dr. Clark. The Librarian was generously given permission to select only what was most needed by the college, and this privilege prevented the addition of many unnecessary duplicates. The number of volumes received in this gift of the Messrs. Clark was 819. It forms in many respects one of the most valuable and useful collections ever given to the library. The large number of titles prevents an extended list being given here, but they embrace scores of the most authoritative works on European history, government, legislation, diplomacy, international law, politics, and political institutions, and they will be of the greatest service both now and in the future to the instructors and students who may concern themselves with these subjects. All the books have been entered in our permanent record of gifts, and an appropriate book label has been placed in them showing their source and date of accession.

Through the kindness of the Rev. Dr. George McClellan Fiske, '70, we received thirty-one volumes of classical books from the library of the Rev. Walter G. Webster, M.A. (Hon. '96), presented by his brothers, Messrs. C. B. and J. L. Webster of New York City.

Twenty-two volumes from the library of the late Rev. Albin B. Jennings, '61, were received through the Rev. Dr. Samuel Hart, '66.

Mr. T. W. Goodridge, '92, presented thirty-one volumes from the library of his father the late Rev. Edward Goodridge, '60. The following very interesting titles were among them: (1) The Works of Richard Hooker, London, 1662, F°. This edition was the first to contain the seventh book of the 'Ecclesiastical Polity,' previously thought to have been lost. (2) A bound volume containing six of the most important pamphlets of Josiah Tucker (1712-1799), Dean of Gloucester, a once famous eighteenth century pamphleteer. He maintained with great energy that the separation of the American colonies from the mother country was both politically and commercially desirable. (3) Thomas Hooker's The Application of Redemption by

the effectual Work of the World. The Ninth and Tenth Books. London, 1657, sm. 4°. This is one of the most interesting of the theological writings of the first pastor of the First Church in Hartford, Ct., as the prefatory epistle gives in brief the history of the work, and, incidentally, of many of the earlier editions of Hooker's famous sermons.

Professor Henry A. Perkins has paid the library's subscriptions to the following periodicals: The Electrical World, Power, and Le Radium; and, in addition, has given \$34.88 for the purchase of new books on Physics and Electricity.

Dr. J. Ewing Mears, '58, has continued his annual gift of \$50.00 for the purchase of works on Sanitary Science, and it was through his representations that the Boston Medical Library sent us from its duplicates ninety-two volumes and one hundred and forty-eight pamphlets.

As will be noted in Appendix I, Professors Ferguson, Riggs, Martin, Babbitt, and Kleene, have continued their gifts of periodicals as in former years.

The Carnegie Institution also, has generously retained us on its list and has sent us a copy of each of its valuable publications issued during 1906-7.

From His Excellency the Duc de Loubat, of Paris, France, we have received the second volume of the "Codex Borgia. Eine altmexikanische Bilderschrift. Erläutert von Dr. Eduard Seler. 1906," published at the expense of His Excellency.

A member of the Sophomore Class, wishing to express his appreciation of what the library had been to him, presented \$5.00 to be expended for some useful book or periodical. He modestly desired that his name be not recorded. The full significance of this gift should be apparent to every friend of the College.

The usual detailed list of individual donors is given in an appendix.

Practically all the cards were typewritten from my manuscript copy by Miss Burt, of the Treasurer's Office, to whom full credit should be given for their neatness and accuracy. Had it not been for the help thus received through the courtesy of Mr. Waterman, the Treasurer, the number of volumes catalogued would not have exceeded 1000.

For the Shelf List 710 duplicate cards were prepared for the same number of titles representing 936 volumes.

The extensive bequest of Messrs. G. H. and C. W. Clark, which is mentioned elsewhere, remains uncatalogued and unclassified, but the books are readily accessible when wanted. I have done all that could be done in the way of cataloguing, but the annual increase of books in recent years has been too large to handle currently, and the number of uncatalogued books that is accumulating is most discouraging.

BINDING.

One hundred and twenty-five (125) volumes have been bound at a cost of \$138.85. Seventy-eight volumes were rebacked or otherwise repaired at a cost of \$26.40. The total amount expended for binding was therefore \$165.25, of which \$77.65 was charged to the R. H. Canfield binding fund, and the balance, \$87.60, was apportioned among the book funds.

ASSISTANTS.

Mr. R. R. Wolfe of the Junior Class has had charge of the Reference Room in the evening; Messrs. G. Buck, Phillips, and Skilton, also of the Junior Class, have assisted in the routine day work. Two other students have done work at irregular intervals. Messrs. Wolfe and Phillips have been paid from the annual library appropriation, the others from special funds in your hands. The service of these student assistants has amounted to a total of 1353 working hours. It is a pleasure to acknowledge the earnestness and good temper with which the work assigned them has been done, especially as so much of it has been drearily uninteresting, though very necessary for the welfare of the Library:

CONCLUSION.

On May 22, a fire broke out in the roof over the room above the library quarters. The upper rooms were soon flooded, and the water, making its way through the floors, quickly began to pour down into the library rooms. All the books in the Reference Room and the greater part of those in the south stack, comprising over 40,000 volumes and many thousands of unbound pamphlets, were hastily removed and temporarily placed out on the campus. Later they were returned and stacked up in the undamaged rooms of the library. The work of removing the books was done so speedily that a relatively small amount of damage was done to them. It is not possible at this writing to state how many will have to be rebound or replaced, but in all probability the number will not exceed 300 volumes. A large part of the ceiling in the Reference Room will have to be done over, the walls cleaned, and all the book cases revarnished or rubbed again.

The books are now, of course, in a state of the greatest disorder and confusion. Scarcely a vestige of their previous order and arrangement remains. At present I can only report that it is my intention to have all the books back in their places and a general condition of order re-established by the time College opens in September. Externally, things will look then very much as they did before the fire. But there will still be many months of work before full harmony can be restored between the books and the indexes, shelf-lists, and catalogues which constitute the necessary keys to the quick and intelligent use of the collection. This will prove a task far greater than the physical and mechanical one of rearranging the books on the shelves. If I did not have your assurance of support in supplying the necessary means and assistance in carrying the work of restoration to successful completion, I confess that I should shrink from undertaking it. But as you have kindly and readily given me this assurance, I will do my best to make the library a better arranged one than it was before, more attractive, and better suited to the needs of the students and the instructors.

I beg to assure you of my appreciation of your many personal kindnesses during the year, and of your readiness to further the interests of the library whenever I have had occasion to bring them to your attention.
