## Conferring of Honorary Degrees

## JUDITH MBULA BAHEMUKA

Sociologist and United Nations Representative

Doctor of Humane Letters

Presented by Karla J. Spurlock-Evans, Dean of Multicultural Affairs

Inspiring scholar, tireless advocate of global education, and relentless warrior against rural poverty and disease, you have dedicated your life to raising standards of living, health, and education in Kenya. The transforming power of education was evident in your own life, where teachers identified you as a promising student early, and a secondary education in Catholic schools connected you to Catholic women's education in the United States. In 1970, you earned a bachelor's degree from Marygrove College in Detroit, before returning to Kenya for graduate training in sociology at the University of Nairobi. Subsequently, you undertook postdoctoral study in international agriculture, rural development, and international relations at Cornell University and the University of Minnesota. In 1974, you began teaching at Nairobi University, rising to professor and chair of the sociology department. With interests ranging from the sociology of religion to rural development to AIDS education, you have focused your scholarly attention on the needs of struggling rural people and on women, helping rural families develop sustainable livelihoods, working closely with the Kenyan agricultural extension service, and helping women play more effective roles in agricultural development. You have also played a key role in the global struggle to cope with the AIDS epidemic, serving on national and World Health Organization projects to combat the disease. As an academic, you have been devoted to international education, teaching as a visiting scholar at Catholic University and the Washington Theological Union, at the University of Leiden in the Netherlands, Cornell University, and the Catholic University of Eastern Africa. In 1988, you established the International Learning Center at the University of Nairobi, working closely with the Global Partners Project, which brings students from American liberal arts colleges to study in Africa. You hold the UNESCO Chair on Women and Sustainable Development and sit on the UNESCO Executive Board. Currently, you also serve the Republic of Kenya as ambassador and permanent representative to the United Nations. For your achievements as a leading African sociologist; your skill at easing the burdens of the poor and women in rural Africa; and your inspiring commitment to human dignity, health, and human rights, I have the honor to present you, Judith Mbula Bahemuka, for the degree of Doctor of Humane Letters, honoris causa.

#### THOMAS S. JOHNSON '62, P'97

Financier and Philanthropist
Former Chairman of the Board of Trustees at Trinity College

Doctor of Humane Letters
Presented by Scott W. Reynolds '63, P'92, Secretary of the College

Accomplished banker, skilled leader of nonprofit organizations, and distinguished alumnus, you have devoted your career to building effective institutions and to the service of society. Born in Racine, Wisconsin, you earned a B.A. in economics at Trinity College in 1962 and an M.B.A. from Harvard Business School in 1964. Characteristically, your first job showed your grasp of the global future. You worked as founding coordinator of Asia's first full-time M.B.A. program at the Ateneo de Manila University in the Philippines. You then served in the Department of Defense before launching your career in banking at Chemical Bank in 1969. You rose quickly, serving as president and director from 1983 to 1989, and then became president and director of Manufacturer's Hanover Bank from 1989 to 1991. From 1993 to 2004, you served as chairman and chief executive officer of Greenpoint Financial Corporation and Greenpoint Bank. In banking, you always pushed to equip your institutions to compete effectively in the global marketplace. As an alumnus, you have given outstanding service to the College, receiving an Alumni Medal in 1976, the Gary McQuaid Award in 1985, the Alumni Achievement Award in 1987, the Eigenbrodt Cup in 1992, and the President's Leadership Medal in 2002. As a member, and then chair, of the Board of Trustees for a total of 20 years, your leadership has been characterized by a level-headed style and intense commitment to progress. In the 1990s, you played a key role in planning and realizing the College's Hartford initiative, now symbolized by the Learning Corridor. Your family has also led the way in supporting Trinity. With us today are your son, Tom, and his wife, Isabella Speakman Johnson, a Trinity graduate, Class of 1996, and your daughter, Margaret, and her husband, Richard Wager. You and your wife, Ann, helped establish the Boys & Girls Club at Trinity College and the Trinity Center for Collaborative Teaching and Research. You currently serve as chairman of the Institute of International Education and the United States-Japan Foundation, and served for many years as chairman of the board of directors at Union Theological Seminary in New York. Close to your heart is your service on the Lower Manhattan Development Corporation and the World Trade Center Memorial, a museum and performing arts center to be located on the site of the attack that claimed the life of your son, Scott, Class of 1997. For your outstanding service to American banking; your commitment to leading critical educational, international, cultural, and social service organizations; and for your magnificent service to Trinity College, I have the honor to present you, Thomas S. Johnson, Class of 1962, for the Degree of Doctor of Humane Letters, honoris causa.

#### HENRY KAUFMAN

## Economist and Philanthropist

Doctor of Humane Letters

Presented by Sharon D. Herzberger, Vice President for Institutional Planning and Administration and Professor of Psychology

Pioneering economist, gifted writer, and devoted defender of persecuted scholars around the globe, you built a great career after escaping from Nazi Germany in 1937 as a 10-year-old boy. After earning bachelor's and doctoral degrees from New York University and a master's degree from Columbia University, you found your life's work on Wall Street. After an apprenticeship in commercial banking and a position as an economist at the Federal Reserve Bank of New York, in 1962, you joined Salomon Brothers and devoted yourself to investment banking. At Salomon, where you eventually served as a renowned managing director and member of the executive committee, you made your mark in research, where you pioneered financial market analysis and built the research department into a key asset for the firm. Throughout your career, you paid keen attention to the continuing tension between what your friend, Paul Volcker, called "the need to compete, to grow, and the need to treat clients fairly, to maintain high fiduciary standards, and to respect the broad public interest reflected in regulation and supervision." In the late '70s and early '80s, you were one of the famed "Dr. Doom and Dr. Gloom" economists whose every comment could cause the world's financial markets to tremble. In 1988, you established Henry Kaufman & Company, an economic and financial consulting firm, where you continued your work not only as one of the most influential economists in the world, but as an important writer and commentator on investment and public policy, authoring Interest Rates, the Markets, and the New Financial World, and On Money and Markets, A Wall Street Memoir. In 1987, you won the first George S. Eccles Prize for excellence in economics writing from Columbia University's School of Business. Throughout your life, you have never forgotten the day the Nazis ransacked your house and arrested your father—or your father's advice to remember the needy and to serve the public good. A noted philanthropist and long-time supporter of many cultural, educational, and social service institutions, last year you established a \$10-million endowment to support the Scholar Rescue Fund at the Institute of International Education to save scholars targeted by oppressive regimes. For your inspiring resilience, your brilliant work as an economist, and your commitment to reduce the horrors of persecution, I have the honor to present you, Henry Kaufman, for the degree of Doctor of Humane Letters, honoris causa.

## The Academic Regalia

In 1895 a commission of leading American educators established the Intercollegiate Code pertaining to the academic costume. The color of the lining of the hood is that of the college or university conferring the degree. The edging of the hood and the tassel of the cap indicate the subject to which the degree pertains, in accordance with the following official designations for colleges and universities in the United States:

## The Owen Morgan Mace

The mace, which precedes the president in academic processions, and is a symbol of his executive powers, was presented to Trinity in 1950 in memory of Owen Morgan, Class of 1906, who served his Alma Mater as a member of the Board of Fellows, as a Trustee, and as treasurer of the College. Historically, maces were first used as weapons in warfare and later became a symbol of the sovereign and his power. One of the first known uses of a mace by an educational institution was at Cambridge University in the thirteenth century. Today a number of colleges use the mace as a symbol of authority and of the power invested in the president by the faculty and trustees. The Morgan Mace is made of ebony, signifying endurance; bronze, meaning power; and

gold, symbolizing dignity and glory. It is 44 inches long and weighs 20 pounds. The fluted staff represents the various components of an enduring education. It is bound by a gold ribbon, inscribed with the names of every Trinity president. On the head, or urn, of the mace are six seals of the sources of life and growth of this College: the Great Seal of the United States; the Seal of the State of Connecticut; the Charter Oak; the original seal of the City of Hartford; the Washington Coat of Arms; and the seal of the Episcopal Diocese of Connecticut. Surmounting the Gothic urn is the Trinity College seal crowned by an eagle about to take flight, symbolizing the freedom and power of an educated person.

#### The Presidential Collar

The collar, which is worn on ceremonial occasions, is the visible symbol of the president's high office and authority. The collar was presented to the College in 1953 by former President G. Keith Funston, Class of 1932, in memory of his grandmother, Maria Briggs Keith. The chain symbolically links modern higher education with the universities of yesteryear. The golden seal of the Trinity President hangs from the collar which is fashioned of 20

replicas of the Trinity Elms and seven silver seals including the six reproduced in the mace, and the Trinity College seal superimposed on a triangle representing the religious foundations of the College crowned by a sun signifying enlightenment. In the lower corners of the triangle are the Book and a pair of student's hands extended to receive it, symbolizing the desire of youth to receive an education.
