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## HERBERT KEIGHTLEY JOB COLLECTION

### BACKGROUND:

#### A. Biographical Summary

Herbert Keightley Job (1864-1933), minister, lecturer, author, ornithologist, and pioneer wildlife photographer, was born in Boston, Massachusetts. He received an A.B. from Harvard and trained as a minister at the Hartford Theological Seminary. He married Elsie Ann Curtiss in 1891 and had two children, George Curtiss and Muriel Marion. He was originally a Congregational minister, first in North Middleboro, Massachusetts, 1891-1898 and then in Kent, Connecticut, 1898-1908. Between 1908 and 1914, he served as State Ornithologist of Connecticut and member of the faculty of the Connecticut Agricultural College (today, University of Connecticut, Storrs), 1908-1914 and between 1914-1924, he was economic ornithologist in charge of the Department of Applied Ornithology. From 1918, he served as Director of the Summer School and the Ornithological Experimental Station of the National Association of Audubon Societies, Amston, Connecticut. Between 1926 and 1930, he was Field Agent for South Carolina of the National Association of Audubon Societies and State Director of Nature Conservation Education, South Carolina. He traveled often in wilder areas of North America in connection with his scientific interests and attained wide recognition for his wildlife photography. The Watkinson Library has 7 print titles by Job.

#### B. Nature of the Collection:

The collection consists of nearly 400 letters, 14 notebooks, a few incomplete, and most pertaining to Job's scientific work, and 326 glass plate slides. The collection was purchased for the Enders Ornithology Collection from Bibliomania, Schenectady, NY, in the summer of 2004. It was accessioned as A179.

### COLLECTION SERIES:

#### Series I: Notebooks:

##### Box 1: Background and Miscellaneous Notebooks:

Background folder: Includes biographical information and inventory.

Item 1: Unknown Author. "Mary R. Curtis: Our Travels". A memoir of a girl named Mary Curtis, apparently written by a family member, maybe an Uncle. Recalls memories of Mary before she took her own life, including accounts of vacations and of her last days. Includes various photographs that are fastened to the pages.

Item 2: HKJ, "Lessons". April 1922- June 1922. Contains a list of lesson plans, including cut out pieces of newspaper and other sources of pictures. All of the lessons are about the religion in some way or another, either Bible study or applications of religion in the real world.

##### Box 2: Ornithology Notebooks I:

Item 1: HKJ, "Field Book of Herbert K. Job", Volume I. January 8, 1879- April 6, 1880. Summary of specimens collected and birds observed in this period of time.

Item 2: HKJ, "Notebook on Ornithology I". January 8, 1879- July 22, 1880. Contains much of the same information from the same time period as Item 2, as far as keeping track of specimens seen and collected, however this notebook goes into more detail about the nature of the specimens, their habits, what he has observed about them, etc.

Item 3: HKJ, "Notebook on Ornithology II". July 28, 1880- January 22, 1881. Extremely detailed account of Ornithological Observations made. Includes observations made at Bentreville, Massachusetts, and around Job's home.

Item 4: HKJ, "Ornithological Notes and Observations". January 1, 1882- December 30, 1882. Includes detailed ornithological observations and thoughts, as well as notes on he has learned about the birds he sees through research. Also contains a inventory of birds he has seen (insert around May 1). Seems to all be taking place around his home.

Item 5: HKJ, "Ornithological Notes and Observations for 1883". January 1883 – May 1885. Detailed ornithological observations, including a break when he becomes ill in March of 1883. There is no cover on the notebook.

Item 6: HKJ, Scraps of notebooks. Not dated. 16 p. on 8 l., with detached binding material. Describing species of winter birds; Description of planned studies he wishes to do; Itemized list of birds observed from September-November 1894 and October-November 1895.

#### Box 3: Ornithology Notebooks II:

Item 1: HKJ, "Notes on Natural History and Travels". May 1895 – September 1896. Detailed ornithological observations, including accounts of work he has done in research and collecting. Job does a bit of traveling in this account.

Item 2: HKJ, "Notes on Ornithology". September 1896- August 1897. Detailed ornithological observations. Starts out with Job in Nova Scotia, before traveling back home and going on other trips. There is no cover on the notebook.

Item 3: HKJ, "Notes on Ornithology Volume VIII, Beginning October 1897". October 1897- June 1898. More detailed accounts of Job's ornithological observations.

#### Box 4: Ornithology Notebooks III:

Item 1: HKJ, "Notes on Ornithology Volume IX, Beginning June 13, 1898". June 1898- March 1900. Starts off with a trip to the Dakotas, and continues with the detailed accounts of ornithological observations. Includes a torn out page of a journal of an article Job wrote entitled "The Enchanted Isles" (insert around June 27, 1898).

Item 2: HKJ, "Notes on Ornithology Volume X: from April 1900 to June 5, 1901". April 1900- June 1901. More detailed ornithological observations.

Item 3: HKJ, "Experimental Work on Same-Bird Propagation, Volume I". February 1911- April 1911. Contains the background research done by Job in this area, as well as the experimental procedures carried out by him. Also contains accounts of people he met with regarding his work.

Aeolian Company, The: Woods, W.G. to HKJ, New York, New York, 18 October 1905-typed, signed (1 p. on 1 l.): Accepting Job's membership to the Circulating Library, and forwarding him the appropriate materials.

Allen, Francis H. to HKJ. Boston, Massachusetts, 25 October 1900--holograph (4 p. on 2 l.): Accepting the offer of slides for an Audubon Society lecture; inquires about Job's newest book project.

Allen, Francis H. to HKJ. West Roxbury, Massachusetts, 26 November 1900--holograph (3 p. on 2 l.): Lists the subjects of which he would like slides from Job; asks him to send them as soon as possible.

Baily, William L. to HKJ. Ardmore, Pennsylvania, 17 July 1899—holograph (4 p. on 2 l.): Answer's Job's questions about different species of birds he has studied.

Baily, William L. to HKJ. Ardmore, Pennsylvania, 18 December 1903—holograph on typed letterhead (3 p. on 2 l.): Agrees to send Job photographs he has taken; described the behavior of some birds that he observed; lauds Job's work in bird photography.

Bartlett and Company: E.G. Bartlett to HKJ. Kent, Connecticut. 13 September 1905—typed, signed (1 p. on 1 l.): Bartlett is returning the pictures that they did not use and payment for those they did use; expresses regret at not meeting Job.

Bent, A.C. to HKJ. Taunton Massachusetts, 23 April 1905—holograph (4 p. on 2 l.): Congratulates him on his success with the woodcock; expresses anger at a letter someone sent him; discusses propositions he has received to do studies.

Bent, A.C. to HKJ. Taunton, Massachusetts, 29 April 1905—holograph (2 p. on 1 l.): Lauds Job's photographs of the woodcock; discuss the outlook for a project they want to work on; hopes to see Job soon.

Bent, A.C. to HKJ. Taunton, Massachusetts, 5 May 1905—holograph (2 p. on 1 l.): He is sending a letter he got from somebody, asking Job to send it back with a strong counterargument; discusses plans to meet up with Job to do work.

Bishop, Louis B. to HKJ. New Haven, Connecticut, 29 April 1904—holograph (3 p. on 2 l.): Describes his efforts to stop somebody from collecting some eggs; talks about Job's upcoming trip to South Carolina.

Bishop, Louis B. to HKJ. New Haven, Connecticut, 29 March 1905—holograph (3 p. on 2 l.): Asks Job to start a project in anticipation of his being well enough to join him in June. Discusses specifics of travel: directions, baggage delivery, etc.

Says it will be necessary for field ornithologists to unite against the American Ornithology Union. Talk about Job's plans to study in New Haven.

Bradley, Guy M. to HKJ. Flamingo, Florida, 1 February 1903—holograph (4 p. on 2 l.): Making plans to meet with Job. Tells Job the best way to get to Key West. Talks about what kinds of birds he knows live in Key West.

Bradley, Guy M. to HKJ. Flamingo, Florida, 21 June 1903—holograph (6 p. on 3 l.): Thanks Job for the money he sent. Congratulates him on his recent string of "good luck". Talks about what he has seen recently. Tells Job of the death of the son of one of their friends.

Bradley, Guy M. to HKJ. Flamingo, Florida, 31 August 1903—holograph (1 p. on 1 l.): Telling Job that he went to observe the Man O War birds, only to find that they were not nesting.

Bradley, Guy M. to HKJ. Flamingo, Florida, 15 December 1904—holograph (2 p. on 1 l.): Just writing to say hello after a long time without correspondence. Says he fears that hunters will shoot all of his subjects. Talks about what kinds of birds he has been seeing.

Brainard, Homer M. to HKJ. Hartford, Connecticut, 13 April 1905—holograph (1 p. on 1 l.): Thanks Job for the information. Expresses delight that Job will be coming to Hartford to give a lecture, and offers to allow Job to stay with him.

Brainard, Homer M. to HKJ. Hartford, Connecticut, 14 August 1905—holograph (2 p. on 1 l.): Thanks Job for allowing him to stay at his house. Asks him to clarify information he obtained while in Kent.

Breningen, George F. to HKJ. Phoenix, Arizona, 13 February 1899—holograph (1 p. on 1 l.): Offering to trade Job a set of "Arizona eggs" for some of Job's samples.

Breningen, George F. to HKJ. Phoenix, Arizona, 10 March 1899—holograph (1 pg. on 1 l.): Further information on exchanging Breningen's sets of eggs from Arizona with Job's sets of eggs from Dakota.

Buehler, H.G. to HKJ. Lakeville, Connecticut, 15 December 1903—typed, signed (1 p on 1 l.): Regarding Job's pay for a lecture he gave; willing to pay fifteen dollars instead of ten because the lecture was so good.

Buehler, H.G. to HKJ. Lakeville, Connecticut, 4 January 1904—typed, signed (1 p. on 1 l.): Is enclosing a check for Job's lecture. Explains that Mr. Estill is now in a sanitarium.

Burroughs, John to HKJ. West Park, New York, 17 October [1904?] –holograph (2 p. on 2 l.): Gives Job permission to use anything he has written in his own writings.

Burroughs, John to HKJ. West Park, New York, 27 December 1904—holograph (1 p. on 1 l.): Responding to questions Job asked him about a poem to use in one of his works.

Burton, W.R. to HKJ. Dry Tortugas, 20 June 1903—holograph (1 p. on 1 l.): Thanks Job for the letter he sent expressing his sympathies for the death of their son. Asks him to send any pictures he took of their son.

Burton, W.R. to HKJ. Flamingo, Florida, 25 July 1903—typed, signed (1 p. on 1 l.): Thanks Job for the photographs he sent and asks him to send the negatives as well. Talks about how lonely the cape is, and his plans to study the Man-O-War bird.

Burton, W.R. to HKJ. Flamingo, Florida, 2 January 1904—holograph (2 p. on 1 l.): Wishes Job could come visit him; wishes Job good luck on his meeting with the President; Talks about some of the research he has been doing.

Buttnick, Ernest G. to HKJ. Lowell, Massachusetts, 2 December 1904—holograph (3 p. on 2 l.): Asks for a list of Job's publications and to know when Job's new book will come out; asks for information on pictures of live birds in general; talks of a new society being formed.

Clark, Francis E. to HKJ. Boston, Massachusetts, 17 August 1904— typed, signed (1 p. on 1 l.): Thanking Job for sending papers belonging to Mr. Stackman, and for his words about the Christian Endeavor society.

Clark, John N. to HKJ. Saybrook, Connecticut, 30 August 1902—holograph (2 p. on 1 l.): Describing the activities of shore birds that he has studied; Invites Job on a specimen collecting trip.
