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RESIST Steering Committee Minutes Monday, June 28, 1971 @ MIT/Boston

Staff Reports

Jennifer Riley was introduced to the general meeting with the information that she has done excellent volunteer work in the office since April (at the time of the mass mailing) and was a paid consulant while Shawn Donovan was hospitalized in June. The staff announced that Jennifer had been hired as a full time member of the office collective and asked the benediction of those assembled on this decision. It was received. Four people are now on the staff: Jennifer, Wendy, Barry, and Shawn.

Staff amounced that recent information obtained from a Boston reporter indicates that the FBI has been monitoring the contents of our garbage for the past year and a half. Bach night the building superintendant specially bags our garbage placing it in a pre-arranged location for regular pick-up by the Bureau. Bill Davidon suggested that this form of surveillance be publicized and handled in such a manuer as to embarkass the FBI--he mentioned the success of the Powellton Carnival and the offensive nature of their campaign to stop harassment.

Einancial Reports

We are in the best financial position of the past eight months, primarily due to the success of the mass mailing in the Spring and a surprising number of individual contributions. One contribution in the amount of \$3,000 was recently received. Bill Bavidon suggested that this person be approached and asked certain questions about her motivation, what she knows about Resist, and why she likes us. Perhaps an understanding of her motivation may assist efforts at securing other large contributions from other sources.

As of this meeting, we have an unemcumbered balence of \$5,000. Keeping in mind that July and August are traditionally slow months, we should only fund to a maximum of \$3,500 this month. The loan from Mrs. Zevin was repaid in toto.

The Demine of the Civil Liberties Legal Defense Fund (CLLDF):

Wendy reported on a conversation with Bliss Mattison of the CLLDF staff. It seems that financial support has failen off in the past months, the continued operation of the office has been slowed down for the summer, and their Board does not plan to weet again until September. All agreed that this would not be an apportune time for CLLDF to close. NOAM CHOMSKY volunteered to talk with LENMARD BOUDIN and inquire about the exact situation and how RESIST can help. He will suggest that they have a Board meeting prior to September.

Fund Raining:

PAUL LAUTER is still trying to get lists of wealthy movement contributors in the D. C. area from MARCUS RASKIN and ARTHUR WASKOW. He will soon be in Washington again and make his pitch for these once more.

ROBERT ZEVIN will bring lists of names taken from the office's "contributor's file" to the next meeting and parcel out names to S. C. people in hopes that personal fund raising letters will result in a continual flow of money into the Resist coffers.

Movement Security Kit:

The Kit is practically finished; all but three articles are printed. These last three are 1) Arlene's article on political positions taken by grand jury witnesses, an overview of this favorite Justice Department tactic considering the situations in Tucson, Harrisburg, Detroit, New York etc., 2) Nick Egelson's piece on the capacity of the FBI and police to politically infiltrate and subvert the New Left. The third article—delaing with aspects of personal and collective security—is being printed at the NEW England Free Press now.

Advertising for the Kit will be done by taking out short ads in a variety of college, underground, and quasi-establishment journals sometime in the Fall. We will also send an announcement to LNS. A colorful flyer describing the contents of the Kit will be sent to all groups who have received funds from Resist in the past few years.

Next Issue of the Newsletter:

When The staff expects to receive an article from (ahem!) FRANK JOYCE on jury selection and legal techniques in recent political trials. WAYNE O'NEIL is also writing an article for the July issue—his topic is the Malcolm X United Liberation Front and the case of the Quincey 5. ARLENE SIEGEL's piece on Ruchell Magee will appear in a later issue. BILL DAVIDON has already submitted a short article about dealing offensively with the FBI and the police.

FRANK JOYCE, GRACE PALEY, AND MITCH GOODMAN all have promised (at some future date) to send the staff their reflections on the MayDay actions. Since so little has been written about the actions in the movement press, several felt a piece in the Newsletter, even though late, would be worthwhile.

ACLU/RESIST vs. The FBI:

BELL CHEVIGNY reported on a meeting she had with Mel Wulf and others in the New York office of the ACL... They talked about the Union's intentions to bring suit against the Justice Department and FBI on the basis of the Media documents and about ways to mobilize public opinion on the issue of pervasive surveillance. One suggestion is to encourage the formation of a Citizen's Commission in every city which might perform some specific tasks such as inquiring assignmental surveils about policies of providing information to law enforcement agencies who seek such information without subpoenas. Banks, telephones companies, and other corporations should be approached.

Campus groups can investigate university policies. Banks, phone companies, universities and corporations should all be advised of the legal issues involved in such policies, and possible jeoprady.

Bill Davidon reported that in Philadelphia the ACLU has brought suit against the Police Department for the existence of a question about political associations on its interrogation/arrest form. In response to the suit, the Department dropped this question and printed a revised interrogation form.

This is one issue in connection with which RESIST contacts (long out of use) may be brought into play. A letter advocating the formation of local Citizens' Commissions will be sent out in August.

Report on Area Contact Meeting

The impetus for this discussion comes from several areas: dissatisfaction with the manner in which funding requests are checked out, staff disaatisfaction with a simple "dole" relationship to movement groups and a desire to be more wow of a resource to groups funded by RESIST. the example of the Malcolm X United Liberation Front was cited as a model for further development; in this instance, organizers from Tallahassee, Florida came to Boston and New York City and met with RESIST people in those cities. They were then introduced to sources of legal assistance and publicity necessary to the successful defense of five of their members held on a variety of capital charges.

If a different type of relationship between RESIST and local projects and groups—one that is not entirely based on money, but one in which RESIST becomes a resource organization (financial, legal, publicity, etc.) — is to be developed, then there has to be greater participation by all members in the Boston area. Claudette Piper suggested the formation of a Boston Working Committee to be composed of staff, ex-staff, seering committee members, area people, and friends. (At a meeting held at the Hein's house on the 30th of June, this proposal was discussed in more detail: area or geographical responsibility was re-defined, in some instances assignments were juggled, and a complimentary method of handling funding requests besides simple geographical assignment was adopted. From now on, the Working Committee will be organized around particular interests as well as on geographical lines. This will result in overlapping and greater communications and, hopefully, better investigation of funding requests by the Working Committee. This group will meet monthly, just prior to the steering committee meetings.)

Discussion on Pentagon Study

NOAM CHOMSKY suggested that the Nixon Administration's real problem with the release of the Pentagon study lies in the damage done to the secrecy system. The Administration is counting on the inability of the general public to connect disclosures about double dealing in past Administrations with similar machinations by the present one. They hope that the entire issue can be turned into a Republicans(good guys) vs. Democrats (bad guys) skirmish without fundamental question about the system being raised. Noam said that in his opinion Nixon sought injunctions against the newspapers not because he had any concern for the reputation of Johnson but rather out of self-serving motives. He said the press is not dealing with two issues raised by the Pentagon papers: 1) that the New Left has been right for the past six years, and 2) that the material does apply to the Nixon Administration and is not just of historical interest, that the same type of planning is continuing.

There were differing opinions as to the added legitimacy these documents give to the American Left in the eyes of the general public.

ARLENE SIECEL suggested that RESIST arrange a round-table discussion with Elasberg and various movement people. This could be video-taped and recorded and distributed mationally.

ARLENE, HILDE HEIN, and SHAWN DONOVAN will work on an article about the Pentagon papers for an upcoming issue of the Newsletter. This will probably appear in August.

Frenk Joyce said that Ellsberg should be pressed to relate more but to the left in upcoming months and particularly the underground press. When suggestions were made about publicly linking Ellsberg with RESIST through speaking tours, etc., many people expressed hesitation due to distrust of his political position. Hilde Hein said that Ellsberg would be wiser to steer clear of aligning himself with Left groups because this would diminish his ability to speak to a new constituency.
