



COLUMN SECTION OF THE SENATE

Foreword

Trinity College, known until 1845 as Washington College, received its charter on May 22, 1823. The following year instruction was begun and two buildings were erected where the State Capitol now stands. The present campus was occupied in 1878, and successively new buildings have been added, until today the large open quadrangle forms one of the most distinctive campuses in the country.

Trinity College has established many fine traditions, none of which is more highly prized than that Trinity men are always gentlemen. Students on and off the campus are expected to guide their actions in accordance with this

standard.

A college is primarily an educational institution. Students are expected to recognize this essential purpose for which this college was founded and has been maintained. Trinity men have pride in high scholastic standards

and in the excellence of its faculty.

An educational institution is based upon the full cooperation of the faculty with the students and the students with the faculty. The administration of any organization is more effective when relationships are clearly defined. Some of the rules and requirements are stated briefly here for the guidance of students and faculty. Familiarity with these regulations and cooperative compliance has been found by experience to be mutually helpful.

Trinity College is an educational enterprise in which the parent, the student, the faculty and the trustees are interested and commonly share. It is the student's abode, his study and his society for four years. Each student, accepted into the fellowship of Trinity men, determines for himself, by his attitude, his purpose and his interests, the abiding values that may be the rich reward of college life.

Regulations

Each student is held responsible for compliance with all the rules of the Faculty. Some of these regulations governing class and chapel attendance, examinations and records, reports and probation have been summarized for the convenience of new students. This is not, however, a complete statement of all the regulations; this is on record in the Dean's Office and is subject to change by vote of the Faculty.

Attendance at College Exercises

The Officer in general charge of matters concerning attendance at college exercises is

the Dean of the College.

Attendance at class exercises is administered subject to the general regulation that a student doing full work is allowed twelve unexcused absences in a term, no more than five of them to be taken in any one course. No such absence may be taken on the day of an announced test or examination.

Unexcused absences on the day immediately preceding and on the day immediately following recesses and holidays are counted double.

If in one term more than five unexcused absences in one course are incurred the student may receive for that course qualitative but

not quantitative credit.

Upon exceeding the total allowance of twelve unexcused absences in all courses in a term, a student may be liable to warning, admonition, suspension, or other disciplinary action. In addition, if the total number of his unexcused absences is eighteen or more, he shall have three semester hours added to the work required of him for graduation.

Semester hours of credit acquired prior to the incurrence of such a penalty shall not be

accepted in satisfaction of it.

The College Office will attempt to notify men of excessive unexcused absences; the Office, however, does not guarantee to send any notice about absences. Responsibility for the accuracy of each man's attendance record rests entirely in his hands; and any failure on the part of the Office to send a notice, or any failure of a student to receive a notice, will not excuse any absence otherwise unexcused. The attendance records are open for inspection on Fridays and Tuesdays from 11 to 12:30. It is recommended that each man inspect his attendance record frequently to make sure of its accuracy; and that whenever a man has secured an excuse for being absent, he inspect the record within a few days after the absence, to make sure that the excuse has been recorded.

Notices informing instructors that absences have been excused will be sent by the Dean's Office to instructors only upon request of the

student concerned.

Excuses for Absences on Account of Illness

The procedure necessary to secure excuses for absences necessitated by illness is as follows:

A student living on the campus or in a fraternity house, prevented by illness from attending college exercises, must send notice to the College Office in Williams Memorial not later than 8:50 on the day of his illness. On the day of his return to duty, and before attending classes, he must fill out the return yellow slip at the Office by 8:50 of that day.

A student not in residence at the College who is absent on account of illness must send notice at the beginning of such illness. On the day of his return to duty, and before attending classes, he must leave a notice of his return at the College Office on the blank provided for this purpose. Also, he must present a statement regarding the illness from a regular medical practitioner. Unless notice is given at the beginning and the end of each absence, the absence will not be excused. No excuse shall be granted in any instance when there is lateness or irregularity in complying with every portion of these regulations.

Attendance at Chapel

The following rules govern attendance at Chapel:

1—The following credits will be accorded for attendance at Chapel:

Each week-day Chapel, except
Wednesday, 1 credit
Wednesday morning Chapel, 2 credits
Sunday morning service, 2 credits
Vesper service, 2 credits

Credits possible in a week,11 credits

2—Students are required to secure credit for attendance at Chapel in each term as follows:

Freshmen,	.50	credits
Sophomores,	40	credits
Juniors,	.40	credits
Seniors,	30	credits

Note: Non-resident students are subject to the same requirements as resident students. 3—At the end of the term surpluses and shortages of credits are carried forward.

4—Students deficient in credit for attendance at Chapel at the end of their Senior year are not eligible for a degree. Students seriously deficient in credit at the close of the academic year will not be promoted with their Class. No student is entitled to honorable dismissal if at the time of dismissal he is deficient in credits for attendance at Chapel.

5—Students who are members of the Roman Catholic Church whether resident or non-resident, may secure credit for Sunday attendance at mass by following the directions below:

Students with other religious affiliations may make similar arrangements.

To secure credit for attendance on Sundays at a Church other than the College Chapel, a student is required to file at the Dean's Office a statement written by himself and countersigned by one of his parents, designating the Church to which he intends to go regularly during the ensuing year, and naming the pastor thereof. This notice will be accepted as applying only to the Sundays after the date on which it is filed at the Dean's Office. Besides this notice, the student is required to file at the end of each term a statement, on a blank provided for the purpose, signed by his pastor, certifying that he has been regular in the performance of his religious duties during the preceding Term.

The maximum allowance for credit thus obtained is 28 points in each term (for 14 Sundays).

Rules Regarding Attendance in Physical Education

A student must satisfy all requirements in Physical Education before he can be recommended for his degree.

All students doing full work must fulfill the following requirements in Physical Education:

In the first and second years of attendance at the College, they are required to attend the assigned meetings and perform the assigned exercises in Physical Education three times a week; and in the third year twice a week, except that a student who has successfully completed the Freshman and Sophomore requirements and has shown satisfactory physical proficiency will be excused from the Junior year requirement.

In any term, six unexcused absences are allowed. If a student takes more than the allowed number of unexcused absences in Physical Education in one term, he shall be required to complete that term's work without credit, and shall in addition be required to take an additional term's work in Physical Education in order to fulfill his requirements for graduation.

Regulations Regarding Operation of Cars

Every resident student having a car at the College is required to file at the Dean's Office a card describing his car and specifying whether or not he has his parents' permission

to use it. Notice of this requirement is sent to parents. Cards are available in the Dean's Office.

Non-resident students who own cars which they use for driving to the College are also required to file cards, but this regulation does not apply to students who occasionally drive a family car.

Notices

Mail and personal notices are delivered at the College post office. Each student is held responsible for all official notices and prompt response to them.

The President's Bulletin Board is at Middle Jarvis and general College bulletin boards are in the north archway where important notices are regularly posted. All students are expected to familiarize themselves with these notices daily.

Scholastic Honors

Each year certain honor scholarships are awarded for evidence of exceptional ability. From specific gifts three fellowships are available to seniors for graduate study. The full list of all scholarships and conditions on which they are granted are recorded in the catalogue.

Among other conditions upon which scholarships are granted, the student must have a pass mark in 15 semester-hours (Freshmen, 12) for the term immediately preceding his application, with the following average: For Freshmen, at midyears, 70; at finals, 75; for Sophomores, 75; for Juniors, at midyears, 75; at finals, 80; for Seniors, 80.

Reading Room and Lounging Room

In lower Seabury rooms have been provided for non-resident students. The lounging room is provided with facilities for recreation and affords a convenient gathering place between classes. The Reading Room is set apart for study purposes and supplements the college library.

Trinity College Union

The Trinity College Union, located in Seabury Hall, is a combined recreation center and student store offering a variety of articles, including athletic equipment, school supplies, stationery, candy, ice cream, tobacco and soft drinks. It is operated under the general supervision of the Senate and the Faculty Committee on the Union; the actual management is in the hands of a member of the Senior Class who is appointed to his position as manager by the Senate, upon nomination by the Faculty Committee. The manager hires from five to ten clerks, who are paid by the hour.

The position of manager of the Union is regarded as one of the more remunerative appointments on the campus, generally paying between \$400 and \$500. The remuneration which the manager receives is a share of the profits produced (50% of the first \$800 profit; 15% of the remainder) and therefore varies with the profit-making capacity of the Union

under his managership.

In order to qualify for appointment to the Union managership in his Senior year, a student must have had at least one year's experience as clerk in the Union store. A candidate for the managership must also have demonstrated by his previous record that he

can give the necessary time and attention to the Union without jeopardizing his academic standing. Estimates of the candidate's financial needs, his general dependability in a position of responsibility, and his business judgment, all enter into the selection of a manager. By Senate rule, managers may not be taken from the same fraternity in successive years.

The Senate

The Trinity College Senate is composed of ten Senators. There is one Senator to represent each one of the student groups (eight fraternities and two neutral groups). These Senators are elected by the vote of the entire student

body.

All student organizations and activities come under the jurisdiction of the Senate and must comply with its decisions at all times. These decisions are made in the best judicial manner every Monday evening at 7:30, at which time the President of the Senate (elected by the Senators) calls the meeting to order. Other officers in the Senate are the Secretary and the Treasurer.

Publications

The Trinity Tripod is the college weekly, edited by the students, presenting local news and campus opinion. Freshmen who wish to try out for the paper should communicate with the editor-in-chief.

The Ivy is the college annual published by the Junior class. The editor-in-chief and busi-

ness manager are elected by the class.

The Trinity Review is the college literary magazine put out several times a year by the students. Members of all classes are invited to submit material for publication.

Organizations

Medusa is a Senior Honorary Society. Each year at "Tap Day" a few juniors who have contributed most to college life in their three years on the campus are elected to membership. Although honorary, Medusa has an important function in maintaining respect for

Trinity traditions.

Sophomore Dining Club is an underclass honor society whose members are elected from among the prominent men in the Sophomore class. Its members are entitled to wear the blue cap with a gold band. Founded in 1897, its members early served as hosts of the College. The club cooperates in providing college spirit and hospitality.

Seabury Society unites students interested in religion and social work. Its members serve in different churches in the city on Sundays and as directors of boys' clubs and social

service programs during the week.

Newman Club brings the Catholic students together religiously and socially in meetings held twice each month during the college year.

Political Science Club under the guidance of the History Department has maintained a scholastic attitude toward the passing political scene. The meetings to which prominent speakers are frequently invited are open to all

members of the college body.

Chemistry Club was organized to furnish the students interested in chemistry with the opportunity of enlarging the work of the classroom, by meetings devoted to special aspects of chemistry. Contacts are kept with chemistry clubs in other colleges and representatives are sent to the Connecticut Valley Student Scientific Conference.

Science Club interests the students in the fields of physics, civil engineering and mathematics who wish to gain more technical information upon subjects not covered in the classroom.

Debating Club needs no definition of its purpose or object. Argument and opponents — be they male or female — will enliven and enlighten any meeting of this club. The Debating Society has contributed something to Trinity College and something to the men who have developed its possibilities.

"Les Amis De Marianne" arrange interesting and varied programs in French, inviting guest speakers to their meetings.

The Trinity College Jesters is the dramatic organization. It presents two plays a year, one in the fall and one in the spring. To be eligible to take part in these productions a student must have been in college for at least one semester.

The Glee Club presents several concerts a year, some in conjunction with other colleges and schools, under the direction of the Music Department.

The Choir is a selected group of voices who take part in the services of the Chapel. The members of the choir are paid quarterly.

Pi Gamma Mu is a national honorary social science fraternity. Undergraduates to be eligible for membership must have pursued studies in the social sciences for twenty semester hours and must have received B grades or better.

Phi Beta Kappa is a national honorary scholastic fraternity, election to which is held in the junior and senior years. A high scholastic average is required for election to this organization.

Freshman Advisers

Members of the Advisory Council of the Faculty serve as advisers to freshmen. They establish a personal contact between the incoming student and the college, guiding the student in registration and counselling with him at regular periods concerning his scholastic progress. These members of the faculty represent the effort of the faculty to integrate the student successfully with the life of the college; and their endeavors are dependent upon the fullest cooperation of the individual student.

Upper Class Advisers

Each upperclassman has a faculty adviser generally in the field of his major interest who carries on the work begun in the freshman year by the members of the Freshman Advisory Council.

Athletic Trophies

In addition to the varsity letters and class numerals there are three athletic awards which have come to mean a great deal to Trinity men. The first and best known of these awards is the George Sheldon McCook Trophy. This award is given annually to a member of the senior class who has gained distinction in athletics and has shown qualities of leadership, sportsmanship, honor, courtesy and general dependableness.

Another greatly prized trophy is called the "Class of '35 Football Award" which is given each year to "the most valuable football player." A similar award for the "most valuable Soccer player" has recently been given by Mr. Peter S. Fish, a member of the Class of 1935.

During the 1939-1940 season the McCook Trophy was awarded to Joseph L. Rihl, the Class of '35 award to Richard D. Lindner, and Soccer award to Raymond J. Ferguson.

Athletic Activities

Athletic activites at Trinity College are divided into three classifications: Intercollegiate athletics, Intra-mural athletics, and required physical education. All three divisions are under the supervision of the members of the Physical Education department.

Intercollegiate Athletics. Schedules are arranged for varsity and freshman teams in the following sports: football, soccer and cross-country in the fall; basketball and swimming in the winter; and baseball, track and tennis in the spring. In addition, an informal intercollegiate schedule is arranged in squash racquets and golf. The governing body for intercollegiate athletics is the athletic advisory council composed of three undergraduates elected by the students, three alumni members and three members of the faculty.

All students become members of the Trinity College Athletic Association when they pay their regular tuition at the college office. This entitles them to admission to all home athletic contests and provides them with the lockers and towels in the gymnasium buildings.

All students who are successfully carrying a full academic schedule are eligible to participate on intercollegiate varsity or freshman athletic teams representing the college. Trinity maintains a full year freshman rule, a full year transfer rule and a three-year varsity rule in keeping with the practice now in vogue in most of the colleges in our group.

A system of student memberships for the various varsity and freshman athletic teams makes it possible for students to gain valuable organizing and business experience. Application for managerships should be made to the Director of Physical Education or to the coach of the sport involved.

Intra-mural Athletics. The aim of the intramural program is to provide athletic competition for as large a group as possible and is particularly for students not participating on freshman or varsity teams. There are twelve teams in the intra-mural league, nine of which are fraternity teams and three chosen from the non-fraternity students. The sports on the intra-mural program are basketball, swimming, water baseball, squash racquets, track, tennis and softball. A trophy is in competition in each sport. A point system of scoring has been devised to determine the winner in all intra-mural competitions for the year and the Alumni Trophy is awarded to the team earning the greatest number of points.

Physical Education. This is a required course for all freshmen, sophomores and juniors, the first two classes reporting three times per week throughout the college year and the juniors twice per week. A regulation uniform is required. Juniors who have completed all group Physical Education requirements and who have shown reasonable physical proficiency may be excused by the department from further required attendance. Credit for Physical Education attendance is given to members of varsity or freshman intercollegiate athletic teams during the season they are actively engaged on these teams. No attendance credit is given for intra-mural athletics.

Anyone overcutting classes will be required to attend until all requirements have been completed. The required activities are as follows: (1) swimming, (2) tennis, (3) squash, (4) one team sport (football, basketball, baseball, touch-football, softball, volleyball or soccer), (5) pass a Physical Education examination and a sports examination, (6) show regular habits of recreation and attendance.
