Introduction

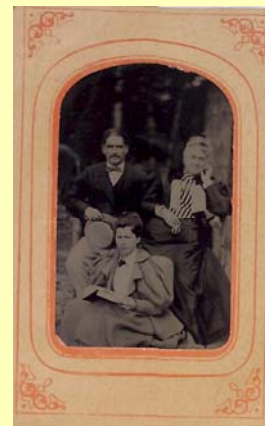
The Sibour (Sybourg, Syberg) family originated in Prussia. The first written documents of the Sibours in France date from the 16th century. The elder branch established their new home in the city of Carpentras, in the Comtat Venaissin (today Department de Vaucluse) where they soon occupied important political and ecclesiastical positions. The Sibour Family Archives follows their lives between 1600 and 1920.

The Sibours were direct descendents of Saint Louis (Louis IX). Due to their membership in the high nobility, male Sibours were closely affiliated with the Royal Court of France and held high status positions in the Roman Catholic Church. Many of the female members of the family were chosen to be maids of honor to the Queen. (For more on the genealogy of the Sibours see Boxes 2, 11, & 12) and became nuns in the prestigious Couvent de la Visitation Sainte-Marie in Carpentras. Later male members of the Sibour family became Knights of the Order of Malta. (For more on their religious life and affiliations see Boxes 17 & 14)

The Sibour family is one of those that suffered great losses during the French Revolution; their wealth was confiscated, many of them were imprisoned, and some of the male Sibours had to immigrate to Italy. Most of the Sibour women stayed in France to intercede on behalf of their husbands in business affairs and fight for their amnesty. They claimed that the male Sibours had to leave France due to the death of their cousin, Capt. Bèlmes, who left his riches to the Sibours. A large segment of the collection recounts the forced emigration of male family members and the struggle of the women to see again their husbands and sons.



The American branch of the Sibours begins with Gabriel de Sibour, who arrived to the US around 1850. He became consul of Charleston, Richmond, Boston, and Baltimore. Gabriel de Sibour married a Protestant lady, Mary Louisa Johnson of Maine, who could trace back her family ancestry to the first puritan settlers. The marriage was opposed on both sides, but eventually Mary Sibour



became an accepted and much loved member of the family. The present collection is partly due to her genealogical research and efforts to preserve the family documents. Her description of the American Civil War that they lived through in Charleston, as well as her autobiography not only permits the reader to get a glimpse of the Sibour family's life but also provides a personal account of American history in the 19th century (for more on the Civil War see Box 10).

After Gabriel de Sibour's early death, Mary and the children moved to France to live with the Sibour family. Louis, the eldest son inherited the title of Count and although born in the US and married to an American lady, he became closely linked to his family heritage. He continued his mother's genealogical research and wrote the family story in the family Livre de Raison. He also became a Knight of the Order of Malta. The archives end in the 1920s, during Louis's lifetime. (For more on the Sibour Family story and the Livre de Raison see Box 11, for more on Louis's genealogical research see Box 2).

Marie Gabrielle de S. (c. 1760-1805) – nun at Carpentras

Jean Baptiste Joseph de S. (1767-1843) – served in Army of Coblenz, was mayor on Monteux, married Countess Pauline de Sallmard

Joseph Louis Antoine de S. (1819-1889) – never married, took care of Gabriel de S. family after his brother's early death

Jean Antonin Gabriel de S. (Gabriel, 1821-1885) – French consul at Charleston, Richmond, Boston, and Baltimore; married Mary Louisa Johnson of Maine

Mary de S. (born Mary Louisa Johnson, † 1912) – Gabriel de S.’s wife, the present collection is partly due to her genealogical research and efforts to preserve the family documents

Jean Theodule Françique Louis de S. (Louis, 1865-1925) – member of the Order of Malta and the heir of the title of Count

Description of the collection

The Sibour family archives consists of 21 boxes of letters, newspaper clippings related to the family, personal objects, photos, genealogical notes and materials, family trees, as well as legal and ecclesiastical documents that used to belong to different members of the family. The archives follow the life of the Sibour family from the beginnings of the 17th century to the 1920s.

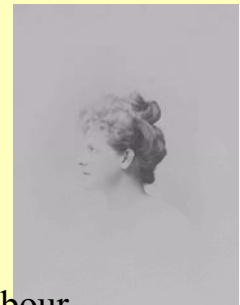

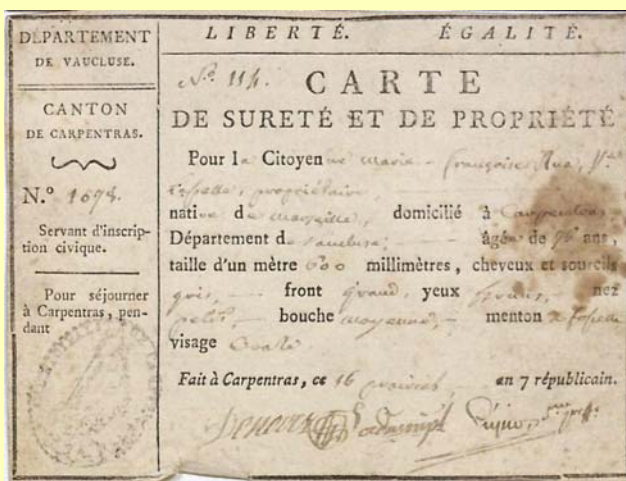

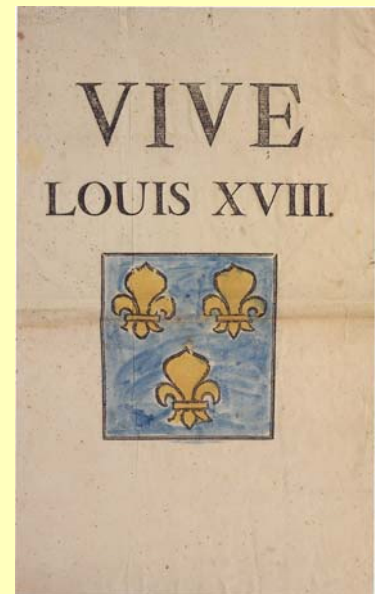
