Financial Report

Total income for the month was \$4905.29 with total disbursements of \$6228.65.

Of this month's disbursements, approximately 67% went for grants, 26% for office expenses and general overhead, and 7% for printing and postage.

Resubscriptions have fallen off and we expect that they will drop to a trickle soon. So far, returns from the Spanish Refugee mailing have been discouraging with total returns amounting to about \$300.00. At this time, we have received nothing from the I.F. Stone list and so can not predict projected returns from this mailing.

Paul brought up the idea of fund-raising parties again this summer. He said that he will try to contact Bob Lifton about a joint party for Resist and Medical Aid for Indochine. Bob will try to talk to Herb Magidson and Bill offered to talk to Eqbal Ahmed or Dan Berrigan about parties for Resist alone. Wayne said he will approach Ethan Signer about a joint party for Resist and Medical Aid. It was also decided to include return envelopes with every newsletter both as a means of soliciting contributions and as a way of facilitating communications with people on the mailing list.

CLIDF-Bob Rosenthal

CLIDF's income has dropped off considerably in the past year partially because fund-raising efforts have been disappointing and also because of the loss of demand for Ben Spock and other speakers who contribute to CLLDF. The lack of money has been complicated by the loss of IRS tax exempt status, CLLDF has been questioning the advisibility of remaining in existence since it would mean a court battle with IRS which would mean that little money could be granted to projects. The questioning also involves the problem of whether or not CLLDF serves a unique function that would not be fulfilled by other organizations.

It was felt that a tax fight might be worth the effort and money as a legal precedent for USSF and others. Enough money has been set aside so that CLLDF canil continue functioning through December of this year and still continue to grant small amounts. Enough montacts have been set up so that specific money could be gotten for specific projects if the tax exempt status goes through.

CLIDF has been looking for new staff and has been working with VVAW, LESP, and Mass Pax on investigating the legal and publicity aspects of bugging.

Discussion was held about the specific and general responses to Nixon's May 8 speech. Paul talked of a meeting that he had attended in Washington recently with Fred Branfman, Dan Elisberg, Noam, Grace, the Liftons, the Raskins, and others. The discussions there centered around a response to Nixon's speech. Paul and Grace were miterested in building a campaign to support and encourage GI resistance through a continuing program of civilian CD, e.g. the closing of recruiting stations. Other were interested in a one-shot action. It was decided that the group should do a CD action in Congress within the next 10 days and present a petition to the Speaker at the same time. It was generally agreed that this action would attract "heavies" who had not been arrested before. Paul read a position paper that he had written about his and other people's feelings as expressed at this meeting. It was decided later that this paper should appear as an article in the special newslettet.

May 30th

Local groups are planning blockade actions against military contractors and war supply lines for the 30th of May. It was suggested that Resist could compile information of these actions both before and after they occur. Generally, Resist's role could be to (1) alert the press that we will be an information center for actions on the 30th and after, (2) alert local groups that actions are planned on the 30th on a nationwide scale and encourage them to do what they can, (3)announce the campaign and make general public statements to support and justify it. The idea of a press conference to announce EME the actions was discussed. It was generally agreed that N.Y. would be the place to hold such a thing. Suggestions were made that we draw up a statement to be signed by well known people and to be read at the press conference (with these people there if possible). Opposition to the idea of a press conference was expressed. Claudette felt that press conferences were generally dated and that they are no longer as productive or noticeable as in the past. She also felt that one of the type described would have elitist tendencies that might put off some of the people that we are trying to involve in the actions. It was finally agreed not to have the press conference but to draw up apress statement which could be put in a special issue of the newsletter. Bill and Zevin agredd to write this statement. The newsletter could then be sent to various organizations around the country (May 4th Moratorium list), to our own mailing list, and to the press with a special press release. It was agreed that we should also send out press releases after the 30th to announce and summarize actions that are reported to us.

 begin free lunch program in coordination with free health clinic, 450/mo -ent > 2 ft/
 - Counter for the Study of Legal Authority and Mental Patient Status (LAMP), Berkeley;

 aims to be research center for mental health law and psychiatric practice in the

- 7. Chicago Area Military Project (CAMP): Asking \$50 to repair old mimeo machine, \$600 for IBM Selectric typewriter, and \$50 for shelving material for office.

- 9. The Prison Law Collective, San Francisco: is a prison legal support group, working mainly at San Quantin and Folsom. Has filed several class action suits against brutality, long confinements, restrictions against correspondence and literature. Their needs are for travel, rent/subsistence, books for prisoners, and \$400 for mimeo run of Jail House Lawyers Manual, which help prisoners file their own suits for damages to help combat brutality inside.
- 10. John Hammar, Holyoke, Mass: (Work, Inc.) Into organizing poor people, urban blacks and rural whites into various coalition (NE Poor Peoples Congress, The Rural Coalition). Also has a profit-making business called Work, INc., which sells shares fo \$1, and which has recently bought a bidg. He is also helping to organize food coops and day care among the poor in New England. Asking for \$96 to help pay an organizer.
- 11. Clemon Blanchey, Walla Walla: is working to make tapes to get to outside groups to describe prison conditions. Also putting out a newsletter with The Prisoners Coalition. Aksing for \$90 for tapes, postage, ditto paper, etc.
- 12. Chicano Vietnam Project, Berkeley: Working for Chicano solidarity with the Vietnamese, and to bring forward the issue of the largenumber of Chicanos drafted for Vietnam. Asking for \$500 to help with costs of a phone bill, replacement of a stolen tape recroder, posters, and travel expenses.

 New England Resistance Revival, Cambridge: was founded in March '72 in response to the upcoming resumption of inductions. They now have action groups in 7 NE cities, support groups in 2 6. Plan to have a newsletter, and to participate in campaign to free Walter Collins. At present have no funding support, the have list for mailing (Final Draft, from AFSC, Cambridge) Asking for \$295 to cover April expenses.
 - 14. Afro-American Media Collective, Boston: is adking for anything towards \$1860 to buy photographic equipment to assemble a light show with political content to raise consciousness of Black Culture in US. Light show would be used at dances in black community. No
- 15. Voice of Haiti, Repewell Junction, NY: Asking for \$110/mo. for 3 mos. to cover costs of paper, a newsletter of the Friends of HHaiti, which provides anti-imperialist propaganda for the HHaitian Liberation Movement.
 - 16. Locus, Inc., Torrington, Ct.: Asking \$205 rent, \$39 phone, \$20 maintenance, \$10 office supplies, \$40 electricity (total \$314) to keep crisis intervention center running. Group recently lost federal grant. Services include crisis hot line, day care center, possible "underground newspaper." ?

- 17. Support Our Soldiers, Los Angeles: Asking for printing costs for GI Self Defense pamphlet. Costs are \$170 (3,000 copies) or \$238 (5,000) from a movement printer. Memos costs are \$52/3000 or \$84/5000.
- 18. Buffalo Creek Massacre Coalition, NY: Asking #300 for fund-raising mailing. Group is engaged in anti-corporate actions against the Pittaton Company. A slag-heap mine recently collapsed at a Pittaton mine and flooded a mining town killing 120 repeople, destroying homes of 5,000.
- 19. Philadelphia Book Club: Asking \$300 to cover past debts so that club can publicize current series of discussions. Book Club is a contemporary political education program, hopes to share insights and experiences among people in many areas of radical social change. Hope to see action groups growing out of study groups.
 - 20. Karl Armstrong Defense Committee, Madison, Wis.: Asking for anything toward fund-raising mailing; Armstrong is accused of bombing Army Mathematics Research Center at Madison, currently being held for extradition in Toronto.
- 21. All. You Can Bat, New Brunswick, NJ: Asking \$50 rent, \$20 LNS charge, \$40 supplies, \$700 printing to continue publishing. Paper is a free working claus paper, recently put out a special issue for striking workers at a New Brunswick air conitioning plant.
- Safe Return, New York: Asking \$120 subsistence, \$90 travel, \$15 misc. to cover costs of a speaking tour of military bases by a self-retired Vietnam veteran.

 Group hopes to provide a radical critique of the deserter question and to help deserters the return to US by creating structure for their legal defense.
 - 23. The Education Center, Cambridge: Asking up to \$487 to cover the costs of Centerpiece, "a forum for innovative education advocates and a channel through which information may be collected and distributed."
 - 24. <u>Jibaro(a)</u>, Dorchester, Mass.: Asking for extension of grant covering rent of storefront, \$165 for next 2 months. Storefront being used as center for t.b. testing.
 - 25. Nitro Defense, Phila: Judy requests \$200 seed money for the defense of 9 GI's compactuated of jumping ship or attempting to jump ship in connection with action against the Nitro, Navy munitions ship. USSF has promised to accept donations for the legal defense and Episcopal Diocese of Phila. has pledged \$100. Also, Judy wants to know if people would like to volunteer their names to be used on a funding letter.
