NEW YORK ALUMNI MEETING.

The annual meeting of the New York Alumni, 1872, was held on the evening of Thursday, the 20th of June. Previous re-unions in New York have been held at the Astor House or at Delmonico's; but on this occasion, Mr. Wm. E. Curtis, '42, the President of the Alumni Association, gave a reception at his own house.

There were about sixty graduates, of all ages, from the new-fledged alumnus of one year's standing who found it so exceedingly difficult to recall his class number, to the "old boys" whose names are again heard in college as the son follows in the father's steps. The first part of the evening was passed very pleasantly in discussing the prospects of the college and inquiring after old friends, until about ten o'clock when supper was served.

When the guests returned from the dining room to the parlor, Dr. Paddock, gaining their attention, spoke briefly of the occasion, and requested that Bp. Potter of New York would respond to a very general wish among the Alumni and address a few words.

The clapping of hands which this suggestion caused assured the Bishop that the wish was general and he responded to it. He spoke of his connection with the college at an early day in its history, and of the warm interest he still felt in its career. In conclusion, he spoke of the changes about to be made, and expressed a very earnest hope that the money received from the sale of the present grounds would not be largely expended in buildings. "It is," said he, "the error of American colleges to put too

much of their endowment in bricks and mortar. But upon this subject there are others prepared to speak more definitely than I can, and I hand on the ball to President Jackson."

The President advanced a few steps within the circle of alumni grouped about the parlor, and proceeded to give a full and lucid explanation of the changes made, and to be made, in the affairs of the college. Much applause greeted the judicious measures and the enthusiasm with which they were told. He described fully the transactions of the sale of the college property; but as these have been already given to the readers of the TABLET, we shall not repeat them. The new college buildings to be put up within five years; will be located on one of two sites, near the city of Hartford, which the college has now under consideration. Each of these contain about seventy acres, of which thirty, after the college is located there, can be sold off for as much as the whole farm cost the college. Thus the college will still have intact the \$600,000 received from the city, the accumulated interest of \$200,000, by the time they will need to draw upon this principal, and an increase of \$200,000 in the value of the present college property. The buildings to be erected from these funds will be on the most improved and modern plans. "For this purpose," said Dr. Jackson, "it is my intention to visit Europe this summer and to make a special study of the universities, in order that we may embody in our buildings all the excellencies which wisdom and reflection have been able to devise for such structures in the old world." The President then spoke of some possible changes in the instruction given by the college, and concluded by calling on Dr. Paddock for a few remarks.

Dr. Benj. H. Paddock, '48, then spoke, but quite briefly. He said the homelike character of a reception at the house of an alumnus was far preferable to the noise of a public dinner. He hoped they would have many such re-unions at the houses of their alumni; and he thanked Mr. Curtis, as he knew every one present wished to do, for the very pleasant reception he had given them.

Mr. Curtis said it was a source of much gratification to be able to gather even so many of the New York alumni at his house; and he hoped he might entertain them many times more, and many more of them. At the conclusion of these remarks, all took leave of their host and hostess.

COMMENCEMENT WEEK.

SUNDAY. - BACCALAUREATE SERMON.

The exercises of Commencement Week were begun with evening chapel on July 7th, the last Sunday in Trinity term. The chapel was crowded as usual with many of the Alumni and other friends of the College, while the graduating class occupied seats in the aisle.

The Evening Prayer was read by the Rev. Silas Totten, D. D., LL. D., formerly president of the College, the Rev. Profs. Mallory, Huntington, and Hart, and the Rev. Mr. Knight. The singing was led by the students, the graduating class chanting antiphonally with the rest of the congregation. The president preached the Baccalaureate Sermon, from the text: "What think ye of Christ?" The Benediction was pronounced by Bishop Williams, chancellor of the College.

The examinations for admission were held on Tuesday, in the Cabinet. The applicants were said to have been better prepared and to have passed the examinations more creditably than any who have heretofore presented themselves.

PHI BETA KAPPA ORATION.

In the evening, the Phi Beta Kappa oration was delivered in Christ Church. After prayer by President Jackson, Professor Brocklesby, president of the Connecticut Beta, introduced the Rev. John Scarborough, M. A., of the class of 1854. His subject was: "The Social Tendencies of the Times."

WEDNESDAY .- CONVOCATION.

On Wednesday morning, the House of Convocation met for prayers in the chapel at 9:30. The service was read by President Jackson, ex-President Totten, and the Rev. Mr. Scarborough.

At 10 o'clock, the business meeting was held in the cabinet. The Rev. John Scarborough, M. A., was chosen dean pro tem., and took the chair, the Rev. Louis French, M. A., acting as registrar. The minutes of preceding meetings were read and accepted. Prof. Brocklesby, chairman of the Standing Committee, presented their report, with the necrology of the past year, as follows:

The Rev. Frederick Jordan Goodwin, Bowdoin 1832, M. A. ad eundem 1847, D. D. 1854, Professor in the Berkeley Divinity School, died at Middletown, Conn., February 29, 1872, aged 68.

Jedediah Huntington, a trustee since 1851, died at Norwich, Conn., March 23, 1872, aged 81.

The Rev. W. B. Buckingham, B. A., presented his report as bursar, which was accepted.

The Rev. Professor Pynchon reported that the Alumni Library Fund amounted to \$2,774; and the committee which he represented was continued.

The Rev. Prof. Hart reported for the Committee on the observance of the Semi-Centennial next year, advising the appointment of a committee, with full power to cooperate with the committee of the Trustees, and with the Faculty, in the choice of orators and poets for the occasion, in making arrangements for the due celebration of the day, in drawing up and presenting to the alumni a plan for adding to the present endowments, and in doing anything which they may deem necessary or desirable for the successful observance of the anniversary.

D., 1842, New York City; the Rev. Robert B. Fairbairn, D. D., 1840, St. Stephen's College; the Rev. Samuel Hall, M. A., 1854, Newark, N. J.; the Rev. Samuel Hart, M. A., 1866, Trinity College; Irving Paris, M. A., New York City; Isaac Hazlehurst, Ll. D., 1828, Philadelphia.

A discussion on the location of the new college buildings was begun by Mr. Whitman, 1840, and was continued by Mr. W. C. Hicks, 1848, the Right Rev. W. W. Niles, D. D., 1857, the Rev. R. A. Benton, 1864, the Rev. Dr. Olmsted, 1842, and the Rev. Dr. Gallaudet, 1842, but no motion came before the House, and no vote was taken.

In the afternoon, the Convocation met again, and discussed several things connected with the work of the College, some of the speakers expressing the wish that a part, at least, of the trustees might be elected by the alumni. The discussion was one of great interest. Among those who spoke were, the Rev. Silas Totten, D. D., LL. D., formerly President of the College; the Rev. Professor T. R. Pynchon, D. D., 1841; B. G. Whitman, M. A., 1840; William C. Hicks, M. A., 1848; the Rev. F. D. Harriman, M. A., 1845 the Hon. Stewart L. Woodford,

LL. D.; the Rev. L. B. Baldwin, M. A., 1860, the Rev. John H. Betts, M. A., 1844; and the Rev. W. E. Webb, M. A., 1840.

EVENING ORATION BEFORE THE HOUSE OF CONVOCATION.

The annual oration before the House of Convocation was delivered in the evening in Christ Church, by the Hon. Stewart L. Woodford, LL.D., of New York, the Rev. John Scarborough presiding and officiating as dean. The subject of the address was, "The Methods and Morals of our Politics."

After the address, a vote of thanks was offered to the orator, and a copy of his address was desired for publication.

The dean announced the following committee, as directed by a vote in the afternoon, to present a report next year as to the best method of organizing and working an American college: The Rev. President Jackson, D. D., LL. D., '37; the Rev. Prof. Pynchon, D. D., '41; the Rev. John A. Paddock, D. D., '45, of Brooklyn, New York; the Rev. F. I). Harriman, M. A., '44, of Hartford; William C. Hicks, M. A., '48, of New York City; John Day Ferguson, M. A., '51, of Stamford, Conn.

A message was presented from the Board of Trustees announcing that the time of holding Commencement had been changed to the Thursday before the Fourth of July. The House then adjourned.

THURSDAY. - COMMENCEMENT DAY.

The exercises of Commencement Day began with prayers in the chapel at 9:30 o'clock, President Jackson being assisted in the service by the Rev. J. H. Betts, M. A., 1844, of Pine Meadow, Conn., and the Rev. Thomas Gallaudet, D. D., 1842, of New York.

At 10 o'clock the procession was formed on the College Campus, in the following order:

H. McCollough, L. W. Richardson, G. B. Underhill, and E. B. Watts.

THE EXERCISES AT THE HALL.

The procession reached the Opera House about 11 o'clock. The dress circle and part of the lower portion of the hall was already filled, the greater part of the audience being ladies, from whose hands many of the speakers received elegant boquets, as tokens of their approbation and esteem. The Chancellor, President, and Trustees took seats upon the stage. The graduating class, the under-graduates, and the alumni, taking seats in the parquette.

This is the first time the new rule has been put in operation by which a part only of those who receive for Commencement appointments have also appointments to speak. The exercises were, therefore, comparatively short.

THE ORATIONS OF THE GRADUATING CLASS were generally well written, and well committed, but, with three or four exceptions, were not as well delivered as we would expect from the amount of training which the class had undergone during the last collegiate year. It is here that we may observe the only objection which may be raised against the new rule which has been established in regard to the Commencement appointments, and that is, that the best speakers, and often the best writers of the graduating class are not allowed to deliver orations at the Commencement exercises. It is illustrated by the fact that the A. B. K. prize was divided between the only two speakers who had received the extra appointments. But on the whole, the Commencement Orations were good, and, we are happy to say, were not tedious.

THE COMMENCEMENT DINNER

was served in fine style at the United States Hotel. After-dinner speeches were made by the Rev. Dr. B. H. Paddock, '48, of Brooklyn,

N. Y.; James Ivers Lewis, '62, of New London, Conn.; the Hon. Henry Barnard, LL.D., of this city; the Rev. Silas Totten, D.D., LL.D., once president of the college; the Rev. Wellington E. Webb, '40, of New York city; Bankson T. Morgan, of New York city; the Rev. Dr. Scarborough, '54, of Pittsburgh, Pa.; and Professor Brocklesby. Much was said in commendation of the "new departure" of the college; some suggestions were made as to the way in which it should be carried out; and the alumni were urged to do their part in the work. President Jackson announced that the . B. K. prize was awarded to Messrs. R. W. Barnwell, of Beaufort, S. C., and A. M. Smith, of New York city. College songs were heartily sung between speeches, and the assembly sang "Auld Lang Syne," as usual, before breaking up.

The President's Reception was given in the evening, at his residence, and was largely attended by the alumni and students of the College, as well as by many of the good citizens of Hartford. A slight shower put a damper on many a fascinating tête-a-tête, which was being held on the neighboring door-steps, etc. It is sufficient to say that the appearance of the shower was attended by a reappearance of many couples who had just been exchanging the last and sad good-byes.

Commencement Week was a success, and we do not doubt but that all who were present at the festivities will long remember with much pleasure the Commencement of 1872.

Owing to the accumulated matter which now rests upon our hands, the accounts of Class Day, and the Sophomore Entertainment have been omitted. They will be published in the September number.
