Our present balance plus projected income minus expenses gives us approximately \$7000.00 to grant at this meeting. In addition we have \$1500.00 left over from Zevin's fund which is to be given out in \$500.00 amounts or more.

Where our money has gone for the last 6 months:

38% for grants

23% for office upkeep, printing, etc.

39% for staff salaries

Proposed changes: If total staff salaries are adjusted downward to between \$200 and \$220 per week, their percentage of the budget would decline to about 19 oz 20% from their recent high of 39%. Assuming that our income is stable in coming worths. that adjustment would leave our expendituees looking like this:

57% for grants

including 23% for office upkeep, printing, etc.
20% for staff salaries

If we are able to maintain a schedule of one wass mailing of 3,000 names per month in the future, if the staff can rely on at least some consistently available volumteer help from the Boston area, if steering committee members whose travel expenses to SC meetings are paid by Resist could help pay part of their expenses, if new sources of revenue are found ... then there is no reason dist why grants cannot increase, both as a percentage of the budget, and absolutly.

Resist-proposed structural changes

1. People in Boston, including the current office staff and others who want to relate to the office on a systematic basis, would constitute themselves as the Staff. The Staff would probably end up with 10 to 15 people on it. Two or three would be full-time, and paid a subsistence wage. The rest would schedule themselves to come into the office a couple hours a week. The Staff would a) research, rencommend, communicate with, and refer funding requests, b) make decisions about adding staff and running the office, c) do shitwork, d) help think about, plan, and initiate fundraising efforts, e) come together in a meeting at least once a month.

The Staff would possibly consist of: Hilds Heln, Hank Rosemont, Bob Zevin, Ken Hale, Bileen Athurton, Andy Himes, Doug McCs/y, Sue Rosen, Claudettte Piper, Tom Davidson, Una Claffey, Tom Wolfe, Donna Miller, Louis Kampf, etc.

Each Boston Staff member, working in partnership with one or more Resist people away from Boston, would be responsible for relating to one type of funding request. For Example:

Military Projects: Bob Zevin/Paul Lauter
women's movement: Hilda Hein/Florence Howe
student/non-violent groups: Hank Rosemont/Bill Davidon
labor organizations: Andy Himes/Jean Turner, Frank Joyce Claudette.

anti-war groups: Tom Davidson, Doug McCay/Bell C., Barb Webster

- 2. The Newsletter: Rather than being simply a news sheet, why not combine it with what used to be called the "Interproject Memo"? It would include at least one long analytical piece each month, written by a project we've funded (talking about the groups practice, mistakes, political programs, how the people relate to their community, etc.). Contents of each newsletter would be decided at the monthly Staff meeting. Responsibility for putting it out each month would be assumed by one staff member inside the office, and one outside the office; we would try to put articles into the newsletter that would offer specific help to our readership (e.g., Zevin is writing an article this month about how to make socially useful investments). Because of the extra analytical article, the newsletter might be expanded to eight pages. P.s., this month we are greatly expanding the number of organizing projects receiving the newsletter.
- 3. The Steering Committee should meet once every three months. The SC would decide on funding requests that are not of an emergency nature, or that don's have to be the decided on within a one or two month period of time. The SC would make long range policy and political decisions, and would take some responsibility for doing fundraising. Between SC meetings, most steering committee members would work in partnership with a Boston Staff member on a specific type of funding request. Any SC member would be welcome to come to the monthly Staff meeting to participate in the decision-making process.

The Staff meeting would make funding decisions in the following cases: a) the people asking for money cannot wait 1, 2, or 3 months for the SC to meet, b) an emergency request that must be decided immediately.

Structural Changes - January 1973

1. People in Boston, including the current office staff and others who want to relate to the office on a systematic basis, will constitute themselves as the Staff. The Staff will probably end up with 12-17 people on it. Two or three will be full-time, and paid a subsistence wage. The rest will schedule themselves to come into the office a couple of hours a week. The Staff will a) research, recommend, communicate with, and refer funding requests, b) make decisions about adding staff and running the office, c) do shitwork, d) help think about, plan, and initiate fundraising efforts, e) come together in a meeting once a month, before the regular Resist meeting, to discuss requests, decide on the content of the newsletter, and to do bureacratic crap. Each Boston Staff member, working in partnership with one or more Resist people away from Boston, would be responsible for relating to one type of funding request. For example:

- 2. There will be one regular meeting/Resist people and on the first Sunday of each month, in Boston. That meeting will make funding decisions, programmatic decisions, and talk politics.
- 3. The Newsletter: Rather than being simply a newssheet, the newsletter will be combined with what used to be called the "Interproject Memo". It will include at least one long analytical piece each month, written by people in a project we've funded (talking about the group's practice, mistakes, political programs, how the people relate to their constituencies, etc.) Contents of each newsletter will be decided at the monthly Staff meetings. Responsibility for putting it out each month would be assumed by one Staff members inside the office, and one Staff member outside the office. We would try to put articles in the newsletter that will offer specific help to our readership (e.g., Zevin is writing an article this month about how to make socially useful investments). Because of the extra analytical article, the newsletter will be expanded to eight pages (at least initially). Hopefully, the newsletter will become part of our political program (sic) rather than just a means of keeping money rolling in. (P.S. This month we have greatly expanded the number of organizing projects receiving the newsletter.)
