Present were; Louis Kampf (Chairperson), Ken Hale, Wayne O'Neil, Lucy Perry, Hank Rosemont, Florence Howe, Hilde Hein, Paul Lauter, Eileen Atherton, Una Claffey, Noam Chomsky.

Financial report was presented by Una Claffey (see enclosed copy). There was some discussion of the projected MAI mass mailing and it was decided to refer a final decision on it to the November meeting.

Eileen Atherton presented the office report. The main topic was the increase of \$100 in rent demanded by the landlord. She and Una Claffey had found what they considered a good alternative office in Central Square at the same rent as we are currently paying or less and it was decided to move if the landlord will rent to us.

There was some discussion on the newsletter. The October issue is complete and will be mailed this week. Una Claffey took responsibility to put together the November issue which will contain articles on Chile, the rice war in Southeast Asia written by Ngo Vinh Long, a piece on Watergate from Noam Chomsky and a review of Sheila Rowbottam's book "Women and Resistance" as well as the project article.

Eileen Atherton suggested that Resist hold a political discussion, as distinct from business, meeting at which we could discuss the role of Resist and its priorities. It was decided that such a meeting be held in February. The staff will send people more information on this in the coming week.

A letter from Pacific Change, a West Coast group which funds political work, was discussed. People from its staff will be in Boston in December or January; it was decided that the staff meet with them when they come. We will let you know the date for those of you who also want to be present.

In the light of a request from a political group to come to the meeting to discuss their work it was decided that in future no suggestions or invitations to groups to attend meetings should be made until it is cleared with the office staff.

Una Claffey reported on the destruction last week of the printing house in Puerto Rico used by the Puerto Rican Socialist Party. The premises had been bombed five months ago and \$60,000 damage caused. This time the damage is estimated at \$100,000. The party had requested Resist to give whatever help we could in the form of suggestions to raise money and any assistance we could give in that task. They had not made a direct request to us for funds but it was decided that we should try to get \$1,000 Z money for them.

Paul Lauter reported on work done so far in preparation for the organizers' conference. He is in the process of soliciting funds to cover costs from a number of foundations. The students from Westbury who worked on the last conference have agreed to work on this one also and the office staff have agreed to pull together a list of people whom we have funded who may be interested in participating. Paul agreed to draw up a work sheet this week so that we could start preparing as soon as possible. The conference will probably take place in February.

There were thirty three requests to consider and we made the following funding decisions.
