LIBRARIAN'S REPORT.

Trinity College

Hartford, Conn.

To The Trustees of Trinity College:

In accordance with Section Three of Title Fifteen of the Statutes of the College, I submit herewith the report of the Librarian for the year ending June, 30, 1917.

The most momentous event of the year, so far as the Library is concerned, is the gift of \$150,000.00 by John Pierpont Morgan, Esq., a member of the Corporation, to provide primarily for the maintenance of the Williams Memorial, erected with funds given by his father, the late J. Pierpont Morgan, and of the Library. This sum, by Mr. Morgan's direction, is to be added to the fund of \$100,000 established by his father, the whole to be known as the J. Pierpont Morgan Fund. This generous gift is a source of great gratification to all friends of the College, meeting, as it does, adequately the present needs of the Library in these respects, and releasing for other purposes funds of the Corporation.

In the death of the Rev. Henry Ferguson, LL. D., and of the Rev. Samuel Hart, D. D., D. C. L., LL. D., both members of the Corporation, and Doctor Hart also of the Library Committee, the Library has lost two of its most interested and generous friends. For many years while a member of the Faculty, Doctor Ferguson also served as a member of the Library Committee, and to his wisdom and knowledge of books no less than to his generosity the Library is deeply indebted. For some ten years subsequent to the resignation of the Rev. John Humphrey Barbour as Librarian, Doctor Hart served as Librarian, and evidence of his wise judgment and untiring labor meet one to this day continually. Your Librarian would like to put on record not only his sense of personal loss in the death of these good friends and faithful servants of the College, but also his feeling that to them is due a great debt of gratitude on the part of all who now and in the future use the Library.

The Library, as heretofore, has been kept open fifty-four hours per week, and the usual statistics in regard to attendance are given.

Your Librarian has again to call attention to a marked decrease in attendance during the year. While perhaps it might be difficult to account fully for the figures, yet the chief factors are not far to seek. In the first place, a week was lost at the opening of the term, entailing of course a decrease in the total use of the Library for the year. Further a marked decrease in attendance of both Faculty and students is to be noted from the time of the entrance of the United States into the great war. The time given by the whole college body to drill and other military matters could not but affect the use of the Library adversely. However, the greatest loss is to be noted in the evening attendance; in fact a full half of the total loss is here. The explanation of this striking fact is to be found in the increased number of students finding employment during the evenings in the offices of the insurance companies of the city. In many cases, this work is a necessity on the part of the student; in many others, the necessity is at least a matter of doubt. In any event, the effect on the student's work, as well as on the use of the Library, cannot but be detrimental. The Librarian is of the opinion that the executive officers of the College, the Faculty,—indeed all conversant with college affairs,—will agree that something should be done by way of regulating and diminishing the employment of students during long hours of the evening and night. The unfortunate results are too obvious to need comment, and it is probable that considerations from other spheres of student activity will be found to point to the same conclusion as is suggested by the data in regard to the decreased use of the Library.

INCREASE OF THE LIBRARY.

There have been added to the collection a total of Two-Thousand Five Hundred and Eighteen volumes, Two Thousand and Four Hundred and Thirty-seven pamphlets, Three maps, Two manuscripts, and One Hundred and Two leaflets. Of these Eight Hundred and Fifty-three volumes and One Hundred and Twenty-three pamphlets were purchases, and One Thousand Six Hundred and Sixty-five volumes, and Two Thousand Three Hundred and Fourteen pamphlets, Three maps, Two manuscripts, and One Hundred and Two leaflets were presented.

Included among the purchases are one hundred and sixteen (116) volumes of periodicals; twenty-nine volumes paid for from the appropriation of the Departments of Greek, Romance Languages, Mathematics, Civil Engineering, and Geology; three (3) purchased with money given by Professor Perkins and President Luther; two with money given by the late Dr. Heywood Scudder, '91, and one purchased with money given by Professor Riggs.

The following are the titles of some of the more important purchases of the year: Taylor, H. O., *Ancient Ideals*, 2 vols., *Zoologischer Jahresberichte*, 1906-1911; Romain Roland, Jean Christophe, 10 vols., Emile Verhaeren, *Oeuvres*, 6 vols.; New York Times Index, 1913-1917; Amundsen *The South Pole*, 2 vols.; Woddell, *Bridge Engineering*, 2 vols., George Eliot, *Works*, 20 vols.; Turgenieff, *Works*, 7 vols.; Tolstoy, *Works*, 28 vols., Worcester, *The Philippines*, 2 vols.; James Whitcomb Riley, *Works*, 6 vols., and Wells, *Manual of the Writings in Middle English*.

The Library acquired from the library of the late Rev. Samuel Hart, D.D., D.C.L., LL. D., Seven Hundred Twenty-nine volumes and One Hundred and Twenty-three pamph-

lets. Of these Five-Hundred and Fifty-four were bound volumes. Two Hundred and Sixty-four volumes were designated for the Library by Doctor Hart; the others were purchased from his estate as related elsewhere in this report.

GIFTS.

Appendix II contains the names of donors of the year; to these should be added the names of donors of current periodicals given at the beginning of Appendix I.

Some of the gifts are of such a nature as to call for more particular notice.

By direction of the late Rev. Dr. Samuel Hart, '66, the Library received from his estate a number of interesting and valuable items, most of which are in the field of the Classics. As mentioned above, through the kindness of Mrs. Melville K. Bailey, sister of Doctor Hart, and executrix of the estate, the College was permitted to purchase a goodly number of other books from Doctor Hart's Library. Among the gifts from Doctor Hart's Library may be mentioned two valuable paleographical works: The Publications of the New Paleographical Society, and *Paleographie des Classiques Latins*; a collection of editions and translations of Juvenal; a bound set of the Teubner Latin Classics; a number of volumes of the Publications of the Egypt Exploration Fund; a complete file of the Church Quarterly Review, and Doctor Hart's valuable collection of Trinity College publications. The July number of the Trinity College Bulletin will contain a full list of the books received from the Library of Dr. Hart; consequently no fuller details need be given here.

Through the kindness of Dr. Hart, we received as a gift from Mrs. Stoddard, from the library of the late Rev. James Stoddard, '71, a set of the Nicene and Past Nicene Fathers.

In addition to other gifts, Professor Henry A. Perkins presented to the Library "The Photographic History of the Civil War" in ten volumes, a gift much appreciated.

From the estate of Miss Sarah N. Pardee the Library received about three hundred volumes, including a number of useful editions of standard English authors.

Judge Joseph Buffington, LL. D., '75, sent to the Library One hundred and Fifty bound volumes, Twenty-six unbound volumes, Seventy-two pamphlets, and Two manuscripts. This gift included Fifty-four printed and bound volumes, Eight unbound volumes of the stenographic account of the argument, Seven (7) unbound volumes relating to the Court pro-

ceedings, and two manuscripts—all relating to the great Steel Trust case. This is probably the most complete collection of data relating to that epoch-making contest possessed by any Library. This will be of increasing value, and the College owes a debt of gratitude for this, as for many other indications of the loyalty and interest of her distinguished alumnus.

Included also are forty-three volumes of the Pennsylvania Archives. With the exception of the first and second series, the Library now has, through the kindness of Judge Buffington, a complete file of this valuable historical publication, and he has most kindly expressed his intention of procuring what is still lacking.

The Carnegie Endowment for International Peace has designated this Library as a "Depository" to receive all their publications. This year we have received twelve bound and six unbound volumes, and four pamphlets. These publications are of much value, and are correspondingly appreciated.

From Miss Clara A. Coolidge of Boston we received a copy of a magnificently printed and bound book entitled "Thomas Jefferson, Architect," a welcome addition to our collection of such works.

From the Connecticut Historical Society we have received, among other gifts, the magnificent photographic reproduction, in two volumes, of the original records of the Connecticut Society of the Cincinnati. These were issued through the generosity of our distinguished honorary graduate, Morgan G. Bulkeley, LL. D., '17.

Through the kindness of Sir Gilbert Parker and Professor W. Macneile Dixon, the Library has received many interesting publications relating to the Great War.

Professor R. W. Riggs and Mrs. Henry Ferguson have continued their generous gifts of periodicals and books as in previous years. Professor Riggs presented to us and had bound, his set of the Journal of Engineering and Industrial Chemistry, and also presented and had bound six volumes of Chemical Abstracts.

From the Yale University Library we received nine volumes of the Silliman Lectures, a most generous gift. From the same source we received also the Documentary History of Yale University, and the Itinerary and Miscellanies of President Ezra Stiles.

President Luther has, as heretofore sent to the Library many interesting items, and for his kindness in this and other matters, the Librarian would make grateful acknowledgment.

He and Professor Henry A. Perkins kindly gave money for the purchase of three much needed books on Military Science.

The Library acknowledges gratefully the kindness of the Carnegie Institute and the Smithsonian Institution in presenting copies of their very valuable publications.

EXCHANGE.

By exchange with the Minnesota Historical Society, we received for our publications eight bound volumes and seven pamphlets published by the Society. We have assurance that we shall receive more of their publications in the same way when their stock become accessible after the removal into the new building of the Society.

THE STAFF.

Miss Elizabeth H. Thompson has continued during the year in the work of cataloguing her most acceptable services. As the result of an illness in the spring, she was obliged to ask for leave of absence during the summer of 1917. The Library was fortunate enough to secure Miss Helen Fay Gates, a graduate of the New York State Library School, to act as Miss Thompson's substitute, during her absence, an arrangement that promises to work out very satisfactorily.

As an assistant to Miss Thompson, in January, 1917, Miss Edith M. Pratt began her work in the Library. She has proved faithful and efficient, and her help has aided materially in the work of cataloguing.

The following members of the student body have been employed as Student Assistants: Walter Bjorn '18, Stanley Arthur Dennis '17, Herbert Curtis Ferris '20, William Jacob Foord '19, Samuel Martin Griffin '20, William Grime '18, Leslie Walter Hodder '19, Newell Brown Holmes '18, Thomas Kelley James '18, Frank Lemuel Johnson '17, Paul Stephen Parsons '18, Randall Edwards Porter '20, Joseph Anthony Racioppi '17, Martin Brown Robertson '18, and Walter Goldsborough Smyth '19. Of these Messrs. Griffin, Grime, Hodder, Johnson, Parsons, Porter, Racioppi, and Robertson were employed only a comparatively short time during the latter part of the year when owing to various causes the regular service had been seriously interfered with. The service has been less satisfactory than usual, but that is due chiefly to abnormal conditions generally, for which the Assistants were in no wise responsible. I take pleasure in expressing my

appreciation especially of the faithful and intelligent service of Mr. Dennis, whose loss by graduation is a matter of much regret. In general, the spirit has been good, and all have done what they could as best they could.

CATALOGUING.

The year has been one of gratifying progress in the work of cataloguing the books accumulated during past years.

The work of reclassifying the volumes removed from the Reading Room to the stack has been about completed; all books in the Reading Room are now catalogued; and nearly six thousand of the accumulation have been completely catalogued. Altogether real and very gratifying progress has been made. Providing an Assistant for Miss Thompson has helped greatly toward bringing about this result.

Of the books catalogued some two thousand belong to the Quick Collection, and work on that is being pushed rapidly. It is hoped that the next report will chronicle its completion. However, much still remains to be done, and it will be years—four or five at least—before the work in this department will be “caught up.”

It is purposed to catalogue immediately the books received from the Library of Doctor Hart; probably that can be finished by the end of August.

BINDING.

No money has been available for binding during the year, and naturally an already deplorable situation has become worse. Professor R. B. Riggs generously paid for the binding of seventeen volumes of Chemical Periodicals most or all of which he also presented to the Library. The Reverend

Doctor I. T. Beckwith also paid the expense of having rebound the copy of *Baiterus and Sauppiui Oratores Attici* given by him to the Library. The matter of binding is one to which your Librarian would invite the careful consideration of your body. It is perhaps not to be expected that in the present situation of the College the Corporation will make an appropriation for binding, but something should certainly be done. A gift of a thousand dollars, or even of a smaller amount, for needed binding would be a most welcome and most helpful benefaction just now. The Canfield Fund, it is expected, will in time again yield income, but when it is impossible to say, and even at best this income is woefully inadequate. An annual income of not less than five hundred dollars for binding is one of the great needs of the Library, and it is to be hoped that it may be provided soon.

PUBLICATIONS.

A pamphlet of twenty-nine pages entitled "A Handbook of the Library" was published in April, 1917, as Number 2 of Volume XIV of the Trinity College Bulletin. The work of compiling it was done by the Librarian with material help from Miss Thompson. It was prepared with the purpose of putting into the hands of the students those facts in regard to the organization of a library with some suggestions as to methods of work and as to the books that they most need to know. It is believed that it will be found useful. It is planned to issue as the July number of the Bulletin a list of the books acquired from the Library of the late Reverend Doctor Samuel Hart.

FUNDS.

The decreased number of books purchased during the year is an index of the straits in which we find ourselves, owing to the state of the Funds for the increase of the Library. The Canfield, the Northam, and the Sheffield Funds still remain unproductive. It is confidently expected that ultimately these funds may be restored, though it cannot but be long before a full recovery has been made. At present the fact is that we have little more than sufficient income to cover the cost of our periodicals and continuations, while the needs of all the Departments of Instruction increase and accumulate. The Library should have an annual income of not less than five thousand dollars to enable it to meet the

demands upon it, and to ensure its rank among the Libraries of the other Colleges of our class in New England.

Your Librarian would again express the hope that some generous benefactor of the Library may provide for this need of the college, a need that, since the efficiency of every Department of Instruction is directly conditioned on the adequacy of the Library to its needs, cannot be characterised as less than fundamental.

THE LIBRARY COMMITTEE.

Your Librarian would again express his appreciation of the helpfulness of the members of the Library Committee individually and collectively. The death of the Rev. Dr. Samuel Hart is a great loss to the Library as well as to the College in general, and, one may safely add, to the world as well. His vast learning, his intimate knowledge of our Library and of books generally, his faithfulness in attending the meetings of the Library Committee, and his never failing answers to numerous requests for information and help made him a most valued member of the Committee. It is impossible to put into words the sense of loss felt in his death, a feeling shared by all whose privilege it was to know him. It is pleasant to remember that to the end his thought was of the College and the Library, and that to him we are indebted for some of the treasures of his Library. To President Luther and Professor Riggs your Librarian would express grateful appreciation.

CONCLUSION.

To sum up the year's events and activities, one may safely say that in spite of the persistence of many discouraging features much advance has been made. The most generous gift of Mr. Morgan has assured the College of adequate funds for the maintenance of the Williams Memorial and for necessary salaries in the Library. The importance of this gift can hardly be overestimated. Usually there is less willingness to give funds for such purposes as these than for books. So when we think of the contrast between the situation of the Library now as compared with five years ago, we take courage, and hope anew that what is still lacking will in good time come to us.

Another source of great satisfaction is the progress in the work of cataloguing. Although the force is still very in-

adequate, yet real gain has been made, and the usefulness of the collection vastly increased. In three or four years, even at the present rate of progress, we may hope to see the work of cataloguing measurably caught up. If we could have again even our normal income for the purchase of books and for binding, we could go on meeting the chiefest of the demands on the Library, looking to the not too distant future for the satisfying of those other needs on which your Librarian has dwelt.
