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Resist Board Meeting, Sept. 8, 1974

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Minutes for September 8th

Financial Report The misc. \$117.00 item on the previous month's report was explained to be \$115.00 for Una's vacation pay. Frank Pollatsek a contributor recruited about ten new people to Resist and collected \$230.00 for Resist. Travel expenses were discussed, and it was concluded that people take travel money if they can't afford to pay their own, and only the upper limit that Resist will pay will be round trip from home base to the meeting place.

Office Report Staff recommended we continue using the services of the mailing house, at about \$55.00 a month to send out our newsletter and people agreed. A geographic study was done on recommendation of Norma Fruchter, and is enclosed. The GI Alliance wrote the office saying they had used their grant for other than they said they were going to use it and people said fine. We made a trade with the War Resisters League for their list and Noam is going to talk with Ramparts about getting their list for the large Coplan mailing. The work of the newsletter was discussed and it was decided to try to re-initiate the practice of an outside the office Resist person working on the newsletter with a staff person. Hank offered to work on the September issue, and Hilde the October one. Articles were discussed, Hank is writing a response to John Stevens piece for September and Noam suggested doing something on the folks going to jail for withholding taxes particularly in light of Nixon's pardon, and will get materials to the office. A piece on Puerto Rico including the announcement of the Oct. 27 action in New York will also go in the September issue. Promised for October is a piece by Frank on the 1st congress of the new Communist Labor Party, Jean will have something from the women's group she's involved with, Larry is doing a piece on Prairie Fire to be read at the next meeting, and Bob suggested we do something on the Nuclear Power Question and people were mentioned who would be qualified to do it.

The next meeting will be in New York, at Bell Chevigny's house on the 6th of Oct. at 12 o'clock that's on a Sunday.

Hilde initiated the discussion on Resist's posture to Marxist-Leninist groups and also our posture to the party building tendency.

Larry gave a history of how the question has come about over the last few months.

People agreed that we should not exclude groups because they are Marxist-Leninist, or Democratic Centralist, or involved with the building of a new communist party. It was further decided we could fund groups with the common element of moving toward a socialist revolution, who didn't necessarily agree on how that is to come about. We then decided to discuss in depth the particular political questions as they presented themselves in the first five requests rather than in a void.

The general feeling seemed to be that the movement is becoming more sophisticated and we should ask for long term strategies to be explained and expect this of groups aspiring to have an understanding and direction.

WHERE HAS ALL THE MONEY GONE?

GEOGRAPHIC ANALYSIS OF RESIST GRANT RECIPIENTS, 1968-SEPT. 1974

1. The following is a breakdown of where RESIST money has gone over the years. An overall view of seven years is given first. States, foreign countries, and the city of Boston, were ranked according to the total amount of money that projects and organizations within the area have received. Where possible, grants have been registered for the state, etc., where that money was eventually headed according to the request we received. For instance, if an individual or organization in Chicago was acting as a liason for an organization or project in Indiana, the grant was registered under Indiana, rather than the mailing address for the grant. There undoubtedly instances where our records did not reveal precisely where the money wound up, or where groups redirected funds to a project in a different state. What the study does register is where we decided the money ought to go.
2. Each month in which money was given to a project is counted as one grant. A continuing grant for three months is counted as three different grants. In the yearly breakdown of grants, the number of different organizations that received grants in the state, etc., for that year is listed. For instance, if the Malcolm X United Liberation Front in Florida received three different grants in one year, they would count as one in the "different groups" column for that year and every other year in which they received RESIST funds. A continuing grant that runs into the following year is treated as follows; all components of the continuing grant given in each year are listed under each year's figures, rather than listing all grants (components in the continuing grant) in the year in which the initial grant was made. For instance, a three month grant given in 1972 in December is listed as follows; one grant for 1972, two grants for 1973.
3. A special item was created for Boston. Figures for Boston include grants given to projects in Cambridge, Boston, Somerville, Dorchester, Allston-Brighton, Back Bay, Jamaica Plain. It did not include grants to projects in Massachusetts outside of this area. A different item was made for Massachusetts minus Boston. It should be noted that if the two items (Boston and Massachusetts) were combined, they would have finished in first place (have received the most money) over the period of seven years.
4. The original data is available upon request from the staff, as are any answers to any questions about this whole thing.
