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

Conferring of Honorary Degrees

GEORGE MALCOLM-SMITH, '25

Master of Arts, Honoris Causa

Hic Pegaseus alumnus, praeses honorande, super aethera vectus ita perequitavit illos virentiores Parnassi colles ut deceat huic bene salso scriptori et ichnographo qui plebeium cognomen insigne fecit lauream Apollinarem conferre. Quam ob rem hunc fabulatorem vegetum qui clamores in scaena apud perilluminatam viam metropolitanam in phantasmatica quoque spelunca apud nostram Hesperiam Sybarim excitavit; virum etiam iucundum qui per motus aeris vibrantes transmisit illa calida et cacophata carmina nostri Afro-Americani Bacchi cuius quidem capripedes Satyri nomine sane omine Iobacchus Spanier et Bromius Monk et Titubatus Gillespie, tuba terribili saltuatim liquefaciunt, Platone acriter obiurgante, corpora animasque nostrae iuventutis; alumnum qui non solum rerum damno sed etiam lucro almae matris deditum, ad te duco, Georgium Malcolm-Smith.

This alumnus, Mr. President, felt, as the title of one of his novels shows, that "the grass is always greener" on the slopes of Parnassus, and so he mounted his Pegasus and has coursed so well those arduous slopes as novelist, cartoonist, humorist that his alma mater may now cut a twig of Apollo's laurel and deck a brow which through merit has distinguished the cognomen of Smith. I present to you for Trinity's honor a son who has made us mindful of him as a writer of lively novels, a stage play on Broadway, a movie in Hollywood; a delectable "disk-jockey," learned in the "bop" and "cool" dithyrambs of our Afro-American Dionysus, Jazz, whose happy-footed Satyrs, Mugsy Spanier, Thalonious Monk, and Dizzy Gillespie, liquefy with their saxophones, to Plato's horror, the body and the soul; a successful alumnus in insurance who serves his College well with his happy talents—George Malcolm-Smith.

CLARENCE NEWTON WESLEY

Master of Arts, Honoris Causa

O nostri discipuli libro patrio nuper tacti, liceat mihi exemplum patris illius vatis qui nec Lesboum refugit tendere barbiton memoranti vobis digito monstrare hunc modestum gazae moderatorem quae mirifice Christiano maiorum nostrorum more ad res humanas fovendas conlata est. Si quidem Dei angelus studio recolens forte beneficia recenseret huius viri in aegros et pauperes et ad spermaticam nostram iuventutem educandam magnopere iterum resonaret, O Amor divinus et praestans, illa psalmisona metra quae generis eius auctor, ille perfervidus et peripateticus sacerdos, primum expressit. Quapropter hunc virum e ventosa urbe profectum, cuius quidem virtutes quasi saburra nostram navem proprie gravitant et immo edepol liberalitates eius quasi taciti intus annosae quercus anuli vitas omnium nostrum crescunt ad te duco, Clarence Newton Wesley.

Wise was Horace's father who took his son to the Forum and supplemented his son's education in books and theories by pointing out to him for emulation men of virtue. Even so may I commend to our departing seniors the life of this modest and self-effacing steward of a great fortune, transformed Christian-wise and American-wise into a philanthropic foundation. Well might the recording Angel of Heaven, reviewing this man's benefactions to the poor and the sick, to youth, that seed of democracy, say of this descendant of John Wesley those words of the

Methodist Hymn, "Love Divine, all love excelling." I take pleasure, Mr. President, in presenting to you a man whose life shows that the stability of America needs no welfare state if it has the ballast of such men. Honor with honor due this Illinois American whose eminence lives quietly as rings of gratitude in the growing tree of human lives—Clarence Newton Wesley.

FRAZAR BULLARD WILDE

Master of Arts, Honoris Causa

In illo salutifero sermone in monte bene dictum est: et quicumque te angariaverit mille passus, vade cum illo alia duo. Haud secus hic peripateticus Quiris noster qui amoeniter ambulat ultra ultimum urbis miliarium, semper angariat alia duo non solum in officiis publicis et privatis sed etiam cum pro patria contra Pancho Villam et postea illos redivivos Arminios militavit. Hunc igitur ducem in rebus securis faciendis et studio conservatorem securitatis ipsius, qui ex tabellario munere ad supremum ascendit gradum societatis quae viridarium abdito flumine superat; virum etiam vivida animi vi imbutus ad rem publicam et familiarem tuendam hic et alibi; civem quoque optime merentem honorem quem daturus es ad te duco, Frazar Bullard Wilde.

In one of those homely metaphors of advice in the Sermon on the Mount, it is said "Whosoever shall compel thee to go a mile, go with him twain." This citizen of Hartford, who loves walking—outwalking the furthest city light in striding pleasure—has always walked the second mile in devotion to his work, to his country in the field of battle, and to his community. I present to you a leader in insurance who has risen from mail-boy to the presidency of the Connecticut General, and who through his work in the Institute of Life Insurance is insuring insurance itself; a man who in many local, state, and national organizations has shown an x-ray vision in the causes of good government and sound economic thought; a citizen who deserves the honor you are about to bestow upon him—Frazar Bullard Wilde.

ANSON THEODORE McCOOK, '02

Doctor of Laws, Honoris Causa

O curiae Trinitienses muros in honorem plausibus et acclamatione iteratis resonare docete quod videtis hunc virum qui ex illustri nostra Scipiada McCook gente omnium officiorum observantissima ortus sit ob pietatem in diplomatibus veteranis inscriptam coronari. Hunc igitur alumnorum filium et fratrem et patruum, hoc die festivo cum sodalibus quinquaginta annis peractis gaudentem, virum doctum qui non solum apud nos valedicentis et optimi honore laureatus est, Terpsichore nihilominus fidibus cantata, sed verum societati Minervae nostrae praeest, militem civemque quem mehercle nemo impune lacessit, togatum quoque consiliarium in Cincinnatorum ordine, multarum etiam causarum pro bono publico auctorem, fidelem postremo alumnum qui aeque ut omnes viri McCook, sive lucem aspicientes sive eheu Elysios campos lustrantes, spe ad bene vivendum imbutus est, nam illic, praeses honorande, radices, illic fundamenta nostra, ad te feliciter duco, Anson Theodorum McCook.

On the discharge papers of a soldier who has done his duty are the simple words: Service, Honest and Faithful. And any certificate of merit which Trinity may give to any of its long line of Fighting McCooks, who have served their Country and their College with such nobility, must be of Honor; and I therefore charge you, Mr. President, amidst the joy of all Trinity men, to honor on this,

the occasion of his fiftieth reunion, this member of the McCook family, who has fulfilled with such distinction every obligation that can fall upon a citizen, a scholar, a soldier, and a servant of God. I present to you the President of our Phi Beta Kappa Society, who was graduated Valedictorian and Optimus [all A's] and yet found time to court Terpsichore in the Mandolin Club; a soldier-citizen who has served his country in battle and as policy-making leader of the American Legion; a respected lawyer with a proud record of causes pro bono publico; a faithful alumnus who, like all McCooks living and dead, has become a symbol of the hope upon which this college was founded—Anson Theodore McCook.

LUCIUS DUBIGNON CLAY

Doctor of Laws. Honoris Causa

In memoria habes, praeses honorande, illas raptas aquilas et, vae victis, Augustum vociferantem "Quintili Vare, legiones redde!" Arma virumque cano sed iam nostra et nostrum qui circumdatus haud procul illo Teutoburgiensi saltu nostras aquilas Daedalicas in aethera misit ut panem substantialem demitterent, Musa maximos plausus Beroliniensi celeris famae volatui impertiente. Ob tenacem in patriae discrimine virtutem, quae animam nostram recreavit, hunc Martialis academiae alumnum, cuius quidem in machinis fabricandis monumenta mehercle, si ita dicam, pontem flumini Heracliteo memorabilem imponent, imperatorem porro antiquum patriae morem gerentem qui exemplari hisce iam iam exituris alumnis est, ad te duco honoris causa, Lucium Dubignon Clay.

Unlike Quintilius Varus, Mr. President, who lost his Roman Eagles when surrounded in the Teutoborgian forest of Germany, this distinguished general raised his American Eagles to heaven, when ringed in Berlin by the might of Russia, and in an epic destined to live long in American annals, known as the Berlin Airlift, dropped manna from Heaven to the cause of freedom. For his cool and resolute courage in a razor's edge crisis of our country, courage which raised the prestige of democracy, I present to you for Trinity's honoring this outstanding graduate of West Point, whose engineering achievements in behalf of his country in peace and in war will cantilever his name on the buttresses of time; a general who has served his country in the best American tradition; one who has come into our midst today to inspire these young men with a life of honor through service—Lucius Dubignon Clay.

STEPHEN AUGUST HURLBUT

The love of God, Mr. President, has been a creative force in the life of this man, who has praised his Maker through the skill of hand in printing and illustrating those canticles of the Creation and of the life beatific known as Medieval Latin Hymns. His Hortus Conclusus and Picture of the Heavenly Jerusalem, as displayed in our Library, are such oblations of beauty that they richly merit Trinity's magnificat, made more dulcet for him because it is uttered in the language he has taught to generations of youth in St. Alban's School. I take therefore pleasure in presenting to you this unique craftsman and scholar, who is one of the best liturgiologists and hymnologists of our Country and our Church; the librarian-emeritus of Washington Cathedral; a man whose very life is a beauteous rubric of devotion—Stephen Augustus Hurlbut.

So outstanding has been their achievement that their splendor rises like a New England spire amid the fields of light. I present to you therefore for Trinity's merited honor this Yankee Socrates along with his better half, residents of historic Deerfield, worthy of a Virgilian Eclogue, which they have made more historic by their dedicated lives of service to American youth—Frank Learoyd and Helen Childs Boyden.
