Several generations ago, Mr. President, those intrepid mariners of New England visited even that enchanted land of China and brought back with them those storied riches of the East—brocades, silks, china, tea, spices, jade, Ming dynasty vases, fans, and teak-wood chests. This business man of New England also visited that enchanted land but he brought back merchandise of the mind—a collection of books which contain the History, Art, Culture and Civilization of China and the Far East. This treasure, a monument more lasting than bronze, has been given to Trinity College by this kindly and cultured gentleman so that all of us may extend our horizon through the culture of the East. This Harvard man loves Trinity well, so I present to you a man deeply devoted to the Church and our College, a business man who is also a lover of the Muses and of the Chinese Nightingale—Henry Du Bois Bailey Moore.

CHARLES ARCHIBALD GOODWIN

There are many things, President Funston, which I could say about this distinguished citizen of Hartford, but since the poet Pindar says "water is best" and the philosopher Thales proclaimed that water is the essence of all things, it behooves me also to sing not of "arms and the man," as Virgil did, but of "water and this man." This man had the foresight to see that the water works of greater Hartford should be an organic whole and not as Horace puts it "its scattered limbs." He therefore planned and organized the Metropolitan District Commission of Hartford, which has rendered valuable service to greater Hartford. For such a distinguished contribution to our welfare and to the future of Hartford this man is worthy of honor. I therefore present to you, Mr. President, this Yale alumnus, who is deeply devoted to a boat now anxiously awaiting him at Essex, a boat of which Catullus could also say that it

"... was never known to lag behind,
Foremost on every tack, with every
wind,"

a distinguished member of the Hartford Bar, a son of our former distinguished trustee Francis Goodwin, a director and trustee of many financial, educational, and church institutions which share our joy today in the honor you are about to bestow upon him—Charles Archibald Goodwin.

Such is the reputation of this president of the Scott Paper Company of Chester, Pennsylvania, who not only is gifted with Midas' touch but also appears on Diogenes' radar screen of

honesty (his lantern, you know, is old fashioned these days). Time would fail me to tell of his other distinguished public services, as Deputy Director of Priorities, Deputy Lend Lease Administrator, and as Liquidation Commissioner in charge of Army and Navy surplus disposal overseas. I therefore present to you this alumnus of Swarthmore, who also served his country as captain in the First World War, a man honored for meritorious service by our country's Medal for Merit; honor likewise, Mr. President, this distinguished man — Thomas Bayard McCabe.

Hunc igitur alumnum Illinoiensem, doctissimum rerum nostrum scriptorem, non raro praemiis ornatum Pulitzeriensibus quod, ut poeta Veronensis dicit, plus uno manebit perenne saeclo, professorem quoque Columbiae qui etiam non usitata nec tenui penna ad turritas Isidis ripas Oxoniensis volavit ad te duco ut Trinitensi lauro cingas volens comam illius historici qui dulce scribit de aetherio remigio nostrae aquilae—Allan Nevins.

The career of this distinguished man, Mr. President, brings to our mind a witty story in Plutarch with whose biographical talent he is graced. A young man once aimed at a dog with a stone, missed it and hit his mother-in-law! As he consoled himself he said, "Not bad, not bad!" And of this man also who aimed at Journalism and hit upon History, in which he has won immortal fame, may it be said, "Not bad, not bad." I therefore present to you this alumnus of the University of Illinois; a distinguished American historian who has won the Pulitzer Prize several times because, to quote Catullus, his works will live and last for more than one century; a professor at Columbia University; a Harmsworth professor of American History at Oxford, or, as Horace would put it, one who has flown with no common wing nor weakly plied to the banks of the Isis towered with Oxford's colleges. Gladly bind with Trinity's garland of honor, Mr. President, the brow of this historian who writes well about the soaring of our American eagle—Allan Nevins.

That famous Church Father, Saint Chrysostom, he of the golden mouth, once said, Mr. President: "A priest

should combine the qualities of dignity and humility, authority and sociability, and keep a single eye to the glory of Christ and the welfare of the Church." Such a one is this rector of Saint Chrysostom's Church in Chicago, our alumnus who went forth from our halls honored with philosophy as well as the key of the Phi Beta Kappa Society. Since completing his evangelical preparation at the Episcopal Theological School, he has been the servant of Christ's Way and Truth and Life in many cities. I now present to you this faithful alumnus who is president of Trinity Scholarships for Residents of Illinois Incorporated, a man who is worthy of our honor because of his distinguished service to the Church and to Trinity—Dudley Scott Stark.

This man also, Mr. President, when he held a high executive position in business, heard Christ say: "Lovest thou me more than these? . . . tend to my sheep," and has since dedicated himself to the mission of the Church, serving Christ with distinction and nourishing his brothers with the bread of life. This graduate of the Western Theological Seminary of Chicago has been for the past sixteen years rector of the Trinity Church of New York, whose spire symbolizes its spiritual influence and aspiration, a church bound to our college ever since its founding by the closest ties of friendship. He has declined election as Bishop in various dioceses in order that he may, through his spiritual leadership and executive management, lead Trinity Church to even greater heights. Such is the man, Mr. President, that I present to you, one who through merit deserves to be called one of our own, *honoris causa*—Frederic Sydney Fleming.

This alumnus, Mr. President, has once more made us mindful of him through merit even as when in college he won the McCook trophy for excellence in football, track, and hockey, for character and for high standards of scholarship, ideals which have characterized his subsequent career. After completing his higher education at the Berkeley Divinity School, he carried on his Christian mission for many years in your home state of South Dakota, where from churches in the cities to chapels in Indian reservations he has worked to bring the meaning of the Gospel into the lives of his people. He was then called to Colorado, where, amidst those mountains which are the neighbors of the stars, he ministers unto his people. Because he performed this mission with distinction he was elected Dean of St. John's Cathedral in Denver. I now present to you, Mr. President, the son and brother of alumni clergymen, a faithful servant of the Church, an alumnus who is worthy through merit of receiving our diploma for a second time—Paul Roberts.
