

# Trinity College.

This College has no medical, law, divinity or other professional school or department connected with it; but is intended to give a Liberal Education, adapted to fit young men to enter most advantageously upon the study of the Learned Professions after graduation. By a Liberal Education is meant a non-professional education conducted without reference to any future particular profession, calling or special pursuit on the part of the student in question, and designed not to make men specially clergymen, lawyers, physicians, soldiers, to merchants or engineers, but so to train and educate the mental faculties as put them into their most efficient condition, and to qualify a student to enter with success upon the study of any of the professions, or upon any other pursuit in life. Its course of study is similar to that pursued at Harvard, Yale and other leading Colleges, but somewhat more conformed to that of Oxford and Cambridge, and leads to the degree of Bachelor of Arts.

Those students, however, who wish to obtain simply the degree of Bachelor of Science can do so by taking the whole of the regular course except the Greek, and in addition certain prescribed scientific studies. Special students are also sometimes received, who are allowed to pursue their studies without reference to any degree.

## EXPENSES

The amount of the Treasurer's bills each year is as follows:

The cost of board (for 37 weeks at \$4.50 per week) is \$166.50. To this must be added laundry charges, together with the expense of books, furniture, travel, and society fees, which vary according to the taste and habits of the student, and of which no estimate can be given.

## SCHOLARSHIPS

The amount of the Treasurer's bill can be considerably reduced to holders of scholarships. The scholarships vary in value, some remitting the charge for tuition, and others both the charge for tuition and that for room-rent in whole or in part, while others yield a cash income. These scholarships are not limited to those studying with a view to any special profession. The Toucey scholarships, for students for the ministry, are awarded after competition. For sons of clergymen of limited means there are special scholarships.

For holders of scholarships remitting the entire charges for tuition and room-rent, the Treasurer's bill is reduced to \$47.50; and the necessary expenses of such students, including board and other personal items, will not exceed \$250 or \$300 a year.

Application for any scholarship should be made in writing to the President by the parent or guardian, at or before the beginning of the term in which the student intends to enter.

#### EXAMINATIONS FOR ADMISSION

Two Examinations for admission are held at the College in each year: the first, in Commencement-Week; and the second, immediately before the beginning of Christmas Term.

Examinations for Admission will also be held on the specified days of June in Chicago and San Francisco, and in other cities, due notice of which will be given.

*Commencement is Thursday, June 29, 1882.*

#### ROOMS AND BUILDINGS

The new buildings were commenced in 1875. They are thoroughly drained, well ventilated and unsurpassed for convenience and comfort. In 1881 the Northam gateway was begun, and the western side of the great quadrangle is now completed. Easy access from the city is secured by means of street-cars running to the College grounds. An excellent athletic ground is provided for ball playing and other out door sports: there are also several tennis courts, and a gymnasium. The rooms are arranged so as to provide for two students rooming together, a common study and separate bed-rooms. They are heated by steam, and lighted by gas, and ventilation is secured by open fire places. Water is carried to every floor. By means of special scholarships the charges for room rent are brought within the reach of all the students.

The site of the buildings is remarkable for its healthfulness.





## EDITORIAL

Herewith we present to all to whom it may be of interest, another issue of the Ivy, the tenth since its foundation. It has been our aim in the preparation of this number to be as accurate as possible, and to introduce such improvements as we could, considering the high degree of excellence to which the book has been brought in previous years. No pains have been spared in the attempt to accomplish these ends. Many of the old illustrations which have amused (?) the readers of the Ivy for many years past, have been placed in honorable retirement and new ones have taken their places. They are not as frivolous as their predecessors, but have perhaps somewhat more artistic merit. Beside this several new features have been introduced. But we have said enough about ourselves, and must turn our attention to a broader field, namely, the events which have occurred since the Ivy last made its appearance.

The year has for the most part been a pleasant one, though shadows here and there have crossed our path. The first event of any interest was the extra spring vacation, lasting for three weeks, which the College enjoyed. This was caused by the breaking out of a case of varioloid among us. Fortunately no serious results followed, as the sick man recovered and no one else suffered any harm, except discomfort from vaccination, (an operation which was indulged in pretty freely about that time). Class day passed off very pleasantly, as did also Commencement. The present year opened in somewhat a disappointing manner, for the incoming class was not as large as we had fondly anticipated. It has however shown itself to be a spirited class, and one which has many points in its favor, even if it has not as many men in it, as was desirable. We saw the usual number of rushes, bon-fires and enforced goings to bed last fall, but finally things settled down, and in inter-class matters comparative quiet has reigned. The Commons, which have passed through so many vicissitudes exist no longer, and there seems to be no immediate prospect of their revival. In many ways this is unfortunate, but all the students have succeeded in finding boarding places near the College. Whitehead, who with his "bus" seemed almost an institution of the College has passed away, and in his place we have the horse-cars—a decided improvement. The College has received a generous gift from one, who during his life always showed himself to be her warm friend, the late Charles H. Northam. Part of it is in the shape of a beautiful building, which is now approaching completion, and which will add very much to the appearance of the present buildings; the remainder in a liberal bequest of money. The one event of the year for which we have most reason to be thankful is the change in the matter of required attendance at Chapel. For this action, the Faculty can not be too highly praised, and it has tended to increase the good feeling already existing between the students and that body.

Our Professor, who has been absent for a year on account of sickness, returned, we are happy to say, after the Christmas vacation, in perfect health and ready to take up his work again.

In Athletics, our Cricket Eleven did fairly, and we now have a base ball nine in training, which we have every reason to hope will do us credit. Lawn-tennis is as popular as ever.

As our work of compilation draws to a close, and we look back over it, we cannot but say that it has been pleasant, though occasionally burdensome labor. If in other things we have failed, we have the satisfaction of knowing this at least, that we have the honor of placing before our readers the largest number of the Ivy as yet issued.

Asking pardon for our mistakes, we commend the Ivy into the hands of '84, trusting that they will strive to improve it wherever an opportunity presents itself.

## REQUIREMENTS FOR ADMISSION.

---

### GREEK.

Grammar (Hadley or Goodwin).

Xenophon: *Anabasis*, four Books.

Homer: *Iliad*, three Books, with Prosody.

Prose Composition (Jones or White: the exercises in the first half of the book).

History of Greece.

[The translation of average passages, not previously read, from Xenophon and Homer will be accepted as an alternative to the above-mentioned quantities in these authors.]

### LATIN.

Grammar (Harkness).

Caesar: *Gallic War*, Books I.-IV. inclusive; with questions on the subject-matter and on grammar.

Virgil: *Aeneid*, Books I.-VI. inclusive; with questions on the subject-matter and on prosody.

Cicero: the *Orations against Catiline*, and that for the Poet Archias; with questions on the subject-matter and on grammar.

Prose Composition: Translation into Latin of a passage of connected English narrative, based upon some passage in Caesar's *Gallic War*.

Roman History: Outlines, to the death of Marcus Aurelius (Creighton).

Ancient Geography.

Candidates will also be examined at sight upon average passages from Caesar's works, from Virgil's *Aeneid* and Ovid's *Metamorphoses*, and from Cicero's *Orations*, with general questions on grammar, history, and antiquities, suggested by the passages set.

### MATHEMATICS.

Arithmetic, including the Metric System.

Algebra, through Radicals and Quadratic Equations, together with Proportion, Progressions, and the Binomial Theorem.

Plane Geometry.

### ENGLISH.

Each candidate will be required to write a short English composition, correct in spelling, punctuation, grammar, division by paragraphs, and expression, upon a subject to be announced at the time of the examination. In 1882 the subject will be chosen from one of the following works: Shakespeare's *Othello*; Goldsmith's *Vicar of Wakefield*; Scott's *Bride of Lammermoor*.

Each candidate will also be required to criticize specimens of English composition.

[The works from which the subject of the composition will be chosen in the following years are:

1883. Shakespeare's *Julius Caesar*; Sir Roger de Coverley, in the *Spectator*; Macaulay's *Addison*; Thackeray's *Henry Esmond*; Scott's *Marmion*.

1884. Shakespeare's *Julius Caesar* and *Merchant of Venice*; Thackeray's *Henry Esmond*; Irving's *Sketch-Book*; Scott's *Lady of the Lake*; Carlyle's *Essay on Burns*; Burns's *Cotter's Saturday Night*.

1885. Shakespeare's *Merchant of Venice* and *Macbeth*; Irving's *Sketch-Book*; and others to be hereafter announced.]


Instead of the text-books mentioned above, any others, if fully equivalent, will be accepted.
