# FOREWORD TO THE REPORT OF THE LIBRARIAN, TRINITY COLLEGE

ALMOST three hundred years ago, a young man of thirty-one, dying in a struggling little settlement on the inhospitable coast of New England, left four hundred books to be used by others, eager as he was for the pursuit of learning. A group of young men, gathered under wise guidance around a few books—that was the genesis of Harvard College, as it has been the story of the origin and development of many an institution of higher learning since that time. If a faculty, a library, and a body of students are the three essential elements in a college, it follows that marked weakness in any one of the three makes healthy growth impossible

and may even threaten intellectual life itself.

The faculty of Trinity College is a group of able teachers, well trained and devoted to their calling. During the last few years the undergraduate body has steadily improved in capacity, and increased in members, until it has reached a previously designated limit of effectiveness. The library has not kept pace with this growth. Twenty-one years ago the late J. Pierpont Morgan gave the College a building entirely adequate to house the library and the administration of that day, and, together with his son, made provision for its endowment. The needs of the present day, however, far exceeded the anticipations of Mr. Morgan's generosity, and accordingly steps must be taken now to meet the vital need of Trinity for facility for study.

I am therefore commending to the attention of the friends of Trinity College this report of our Librarian. It tells the story of insufficient space already over-crowded and inadequate resources carefully husbanded. A generous grant from the Carnegie Corporation for the last five years for the purchase of books has enabled us to fill up some of the more glaring gaps in important departments, but this serves only to make clearer the needs of the immediate future. There is in the report ample evidence of

scrupulous care of what we have.

The academic welfare of Trinity College is conditioned in large measure by the resources of the Library.

## REPORT OF THE LIBRARIAN

July 1, 1935.

## To the Trustees of Trinity College:

In accordance with Section Three of Article Fifteen of the Statutes of the College, I submit herewith the report of the Librarian for the year ending June 30, 1935, the twentieth it

has been my privilege to submit.

The Library has been kept open seventy-seven and one-half hours per week, as against fifty-four hours in other recent years. The additional hours have been a convenience for many students, but have not resulted in any large increase in the total attendance for the year. The usual statistics in regard to attendance are given:

These figures are about average for the last four years, excluding the year 1931-1932, when for some unknown reason, the attendance was abnormally high.

#### GRANT FROM THE CARNEGIE CORPORATION

We have purchased during the year with the Grant from the Carnegie Corporation 833 volumes.

To our unspeakable regret, this generous grant expires this year. It is impossible to exaggerate its value and usefulness, and it will be difficult—impossible—to meet our needs without it.

The situation brings home to us with increased force the imperative need for new endowment funds, the income of which is to be used for the purchase of books and periodicals. No less than \$200,000 should be added to our Library funds. One of the many things we have learned from the Carnegie Grant is the stimulating effect on the College in all its activities of receiving currently the most important new books in the fields covered by the courses of instruction. We simply cannot afford to permit this need to be met less adequately than it has been met the last five years.

#### INCREASE OF THE LIBRARY

During the year, there have been added to the Library 3,502 volumes and 5,726 pamphlets. Of these, 1,745 volumes were purchased. All the pamphlets and 1,754 volumes were presented. Included in the purchase are 226 volumes of unbound periodicals and the 833 volumes purchased with the grant from the Carnegie Corporation. Of the volumes added to the Library, 2,583 are bound and 919 unbound. It should be added that most of the volumes of unbound periodicals and many of the other volumes will be bound during the summer.

It is obvious from what was said in commenting on the Grant from the Carnegie Corporation that but for this Grant and the appropriation of the Trustees from the general income of the College, we should be unable to purchase even the books essential to the carrying on of the work of instruction. Books, especially periodicals, cost much more and more of them are needed, than ever before. Our growth in number of students and in faculty are straining our slender resources to the breaking point.

Among the more important purchases of the year may be mentioned: Dictionary of American Biography, 13-15; Encyclopedia of the Social Sciences, 13-15; Enciclopedia Italiana, 21-24; Meyers Kleines Lexikon, 1-3; Baker's Principles of Geometry, 1-6; Robert Browning, Works, Centenary Ed., 1-10; William Hazlitt, Works, ed. Howe, 1-21; Young, Drama of the Medieval Church, 1-2; Maupassant, Works (English translation), 1-10; English Historical Review, 15-46; Toynbee, Study of History, 1-3; Gairdner, Lollardy and the Reformation in England, 1-4; Gairdner, History of the Commonwealth and Protectorate, 1-4; Stevenson, Works, 1-25; John Quincy Adams, Writings, ed. W. Ford, 1-7; Halévy, History of the English People, 1-5; Lang, History of Scotland, 1-4; Sorel, L'Europe et la Revolution Française, 1-8; Lavisse, Histoire de France Contemporaire, 1-10; John Burroughs, Writings, 1-23; Hart, Commonwealth History of Massachusetts, 1-5; and Pareto, Mind and Society, 1-4.

#### GIFTS

Appendix II gives the names of donors during the year; to them should be added the names of donors of current periodicals

given in Appendix I.

The gifts this year have been neither so numerous nor important as those of last year. That is, we have had no single gift so large or so valuable as President Ogilby's gift, through the book store, of Professor John A. Spaulding's library or the bequest of Miss Rearden's library. However, many gifts of useful and even valuable volumes were received, and we are grateful for them. The most important single gift was one of 562 volumes from the library of the late Professor Edwin Knox Mitchell, of the Hartford Seminary Foundation, made by his family. It includes books in general literature, travel, history, and some Theology, and contains many useful books. Professor Mitchell was a good friend of the College, and the Library is a fitting repository for some of his treasured volumes.

We have received gifts of their publications from Richardson Wright, '10, the Reverend William Grime, '18, and Victor Cox Pedersen, '91. From Charles G. Woodward, '98, we received seven volumes and 9 pamphlets; from Joseph Buffington, '75, three volumes; from Grenville Kane, '75, a copy of "Commodore John Barry, Father of the American Navy, by Joseph Gurn; from R. McClellan Brady, '90, a copy of Jeremy Taylor's "Holy Living and Holy Dying" from the library of the late President Flavel S. Luther, '70; from Frances C. and Lucy E. McCook, a copy of Lillian L. Bissel's "Music in Cultural Education"; from Professor Samuel Morison, L.H.D., 1935, the manuscript of the Inaugural Address of his grandfather, Samuel Eliot, as Pres-

ident of Trinity College; from Charles Lathrop Pack, LL.D., 1918, a copy of the Autobiography of John Hays Hammond; from Ernest H. Brownell, the Ancestry of Bishop Brownell, compiled by him (MS.); from Arnold Henry Moses, Jr., '28, thirty-two volumes; and from the Olin Library of Wesleyan University their useful and handsome publication, "Four Hundred Familiar Quotations." Gifts were received from these members of the faculty: Arthur Adams, Morse S. Allen, Archie R. Bangs, LeRoy C. Barret, Thomas H. Bissonnette, Harry T. Costello, Robert B. W. Hutt, Gustav A. Kleene, Henry A. Perkins, Edward Pousland, and Horace C. Swan.

We acknowledge with grateful appreciation the gifts of their publications by the Carnegie Endowment for International Peace, the Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Teaching, the Carnegie Institution of Washington, the Smithsonian Institution, the State of Connecticut, and the Government of the United States. We are also indebted to the Connecticut State Board of Educaion for eight unbound volumes of Town reports.

#### CATALOGUING

Again, the year has been a hard one in this department of the work of the Library. Our staff is still inadequate, though Mr. Tobin is a great help.

Reviewing the work of the last nineteen and one-half years, we have the following figures:

During the year, our small collection of old newspapers was recatalogued. We have about one hundred titles, for the most part represented only by single volumes or short "runs," but including a number of interesting items. The earliest newspaper is of 1774 (The Connecticut Courant); a number bear dates in the early 1800's, and there are several of the Civil War period.

#### BINDING

As usual, the greater part of the appropriation for binding has been spent in caring for current periodicals. Nevertheless, the amount available enables us to bind a considerable number of other volumes. It is necessary that, if possible, the appropriation be increased.

#### **FUNDS**

The need for additional Funds has been spoken of in the paragraph dealing with the Grant from the Carnegie Corporation. Briefly, we need not less than \$200,000, of which the income should be used for the purchase of books and periodicals. We need also funds for administration to enable us to increase the staff to keep pace with the growth of the collection and with the increase

in the number of faculty and students.

The placing of shelving during the last summer in the basement room under the offices and the removal of the Government documents from the top floor of the stacks to this space has relieved the congestion in the stacks for the present. The contemplated removal of the Chemistry periodicals to the new Chemistry laboratory when completed will give us a little more breathing space, but the only possible solution of the problem is the enlargement of the building to provide room for additional stacks. When this is done, and it must soon be done, room for not less than 500,000 volumes should be provided.

At times, also, the Reading Room is overcrowded. When the addition to connect the Williams Library with the Chapel is built, the Reading Room should be enlarged and adequate working

quarters for the staff provided.

#### THE STAFF

Miss Louise M. Bailey, as Cataloguer, and Mrs. Harold Schatz, as Assistant, as always, have given faithful and highly commendable service. Mr. James Golden Tobin, as General Assist-

ant, or "man of all work," is invaluable.

Some of the tasks to which they were assigned were: cleaning floors, dusting shelves and books, moving books, repairing books, arranging Government documents, relief work on the desk, replacing books on the shelves, pasting pockets for charging cards in backs of books, typing, "oiling" leather bindings with "leather-vita", compiling bibliographical lists for members of the faculty, etc.

They were of very real assistance and, on the whole, the spirit in which they worked was wholesome and creditable to them. If the Government does not continue its help, we shall miss them. If we may have some of the same young men again, they will be even more useful.

#### THE LIBRARY COMMITTEE

Your Librarian takes pleasure in expressing his appreciation of the interest and helpfulness of the members of the Library Committee. President Ogilby is always helpful, particularly with counsel and with gifts of money from the profits of the Book Store. Professor Costello gives without stint of his time to the selection of books; he is invaluable. Professors Helmbold and Mitchell make suggestions from time to time as to needed purchases and as to matters of administration. Their interest and service help much to make the Library useful to the whole college community.

### CONCLUSION

The period during which we have had the Carnegie Grant has been one of unparalleled growth and improvement in the Library. Now that it is about to terminate, we feel more than ever before the desperate need for additional endowment for the Library. It is but natural that your Librarian should feel, now that the Chemistry Laboratory is a reality, that this is the greatest single need of the College. It is good to know, however, that this opinion is shared by many. We need also additions to the staff, we need more space in the Reading Room, we need more stack space. These things simply must be had if the Library is to meet even as well as it is doing at present, the needs of those, both students and faculty, who depend on the Library for the successful carrying on of their

work, and these needs should be met much more adequately than they can be now.

We must hope earnestly that the Friends of the College will meet these needs at no distant day.

As in some States a bequest for charitable purposes is void unless the will is executed at least a certain length of time (varying in different States) before the death of the testator, and is attested by two or more credible, and at the same time disinterested witnesses, it is advisable to ascertain first the requirements of the law in the State in which the testator resides, and to be careful that such requirements are complied with.
