Undergraduate Course Announcement

REGISTRATION:

Registration opens May 1. Full payment of all fees must accompany each registration. Registration must be completed five days prior to the beginning of the course. Late registrations will be accepted through the first day of classes for courses in which openings remain and a late fee of \$5 per course will be assessed. Registration may be accomplished by mail or in person at the Summer Term Office.

If a student is forced to withdraw, he must notify the Summer Term Office immediately. Failure to appear in classes does not constitute withdrawal. A student who withdraws from a course without permission will receive a grade of Fail. No withdrawals will be permitted during the last week of the class. No tuition refunds will be granted for courses dropped after the second day of class.

HOUSING:

No single or double rooms will be available; each apartment will house three or four persons. Air-conditioning and full kitchens are included in each apartment, but no kitchen utensils are provided by the College. Resident students must furnish their own linen, pillows, blankets, waste baskets, and desk lamps, if desired. Linen service will be available. Residents will be expected to arrive on campus between 1:00 and 8:00 p.m. on the day preceding the opening of classes, and may pick up room keys at the Mather Campus Center desk.

FEES:

Registration fee (non-refundable): \$10.

Tuition: \$210 per course credit. (One course credit equals 3 semester hours.)

Dormitory fee: \$17 per week per person.

Automobile registration fee: \$5.

Limited snack bar service may be available in Mather Campus Center on Monday through Friday. Hours will be posted. There are several other eating places within walking distance of the College.

Schedule of Courses...

CHEMISTRY 211L, 212L. Elementary Organic Chemistry. June 9 to August 8.

A systematic study of the compounds of carbon, including methods of synthesis, correlation of chemical and physical properties with structure, and an introduction to selected theoretical concepts. A two session course, equivalent to the standard two semester course offered during the academic year. Prerequisites: Chemistry 112L with a grade of at least C—, and permission of the instructor. Two and one-half course credits (8 semester hours).

Lecture: M, T, W, Th, F. 8:30–10:30 a.m. Lab: T, Th 10:30–5:00. Enrollment limited to 50. Tuition \$420. Lab fees \$25 per session. Mr. Sasson.

GERMAN 101–102. Elementary German. June 23 to July 25.

A course designed to develop basic ability in the four skills of understanding, speaking, reading and writing German. Equivalent to the two semester course during the academic year. Lab work is included. Two course credits (6 semester hours).

8:30–10:00 a.m. and 10:30 a.m.–12:00 noon, M, T, W, Th, F. Mr. Hook.

PHILOSOPHY 203. Ethics. June 30 to July 29.

An introduction to some major concepts of ethical theory (goodness, responsibility, freedom, justification, rationality) a study of Aristotle, Kant and Mill. More recent questions dealing with cultural relativism will be considered, and the course will conclude with a reading of Skinner's *Walden Two*. One course credit (3 semester hours).

6:00–8:00 p.m., M, T, Th, F. Mr. Luty.

PHILOSOPHY 204. Philosophy and Modern Society. June 30 to July 29.

An examination of philosophical controversies arising out of rival conceptions of class-structure, alienation, women's liberation and the family, democracy, ethical and scientific rationality, egoism and morality, human nature and human liberation. Radical (Marxist and anarchist) and liberal points of view will be compared and contrasted. One course credit (3 semester hours).

1:30–3:30 p.m., M, T, Th, F. Mr. Barglow.

PHILOSOPHY 210. Philosophy of Art. June 30 to July 29.

Beauty and truth: levels of identity and contradiction; art as alienation versus art as self-realization; art and science as (competing?) modes of understanding; the relation of art to the intentions and personality of the artist. These issues will be examined through an analysis of visual art since the Renaissance. As we shall see, painters such as Bruegel, Rembrandt, Manet, and Warhol live in their art (and each in a different way) the contradictions and crises of their age. Time permitting, we shall also examine Brecht's conception of theater. Philosophical background not required. One course credit (3 semester hours).

9:30–11:30 a.m., M, T, Th, F. Mr. Barglow.

PHILOSOPHY 309. The Concept of Madness. July 31 to August 29.

A philosophical inquiry into the concept of madness and related topics such as human agency, freedom, rationality, and health. Background reading will include sources from psychology, sociology, and anthropology. The focal reading will include works of Szasz, Laing, Goffman, Foucault, and Fingarette. Enrollment limited to 20. One course credit (3 semester hours).

9:30–11:30 a.m., M, T, Th, F. Mr. Brown.

Under certain circumstances, undergraduate students who have completed a minimum of two years of college may be eligible to enroll in graduate level courses for undergraduate credit. If you wish to receive the Graduate Studies Bulletin, please contact the address given below.
