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

FOREWORD

N spite of the dislocation of our traditional academic schedule because of the Naval Training School to be established at Trinity College on or about July 1st, we have decided to go ahead with our plans for our usual summer session for the benefit of those who wish to continue their education during the months of July and August. Classes will begin on Monday, June 28, continuing for six or eight weeks, depending on the course elected.

As can readily be understood, it is not easy to plan now just what courses will be offered, for we do not yet know definitely just what demands will be made upon our faculty. Since needs for the war effort take precedence in these days, it is possible that we shall have to withdraw some of the courses listed in this pamphlet. We shall do everything in our power, however, to meet the demands made upon us, and suggest that those who are planning to take summer work at Trinity communicate as soon as possible with Dr. Buell, so that we can determine what is desired. In these uncertain days, financial investments may be precarious, but it is certain that any investment of time in study will bring rewards.

RINITY COLLEGE offers the following courses for its summer school of 1943. Credit is given for these courses—toward a Bachelor's Degree for all and toward a Master's Degree for some. Although Trinity College does not award the Bachelor's Degree to women, all summer school classes are open to both men and women, and credit can be transferred to other colleges awarding such a degree.

All classes will be held in classrooms and laboratories on the campus. These buildings are fairly cool even on hottest days. Information concerning the exact building and room may be obtained at the time of registration.

Early registration is desired. If the blank is sent in by June 12 with a registration fee of one dollar, this fee will be deducted later from the charge for tuition. The registration fee will be retained if paid later than this date. Final registration may be made June 26 and June 28 from 9:00 to 12:00 in Boardman Hall. Classes will start June 28.

If sufficient demand develops other courses may be added. On the other hand a few of the following courses cannot be absolutely guaranteed. A naval unit to start at the college about July 1 might make unexpected demand on our staff. This would not affect many courses and is not anticipated for any.

The Director of the Summer School, Dr. Irwin A. Buell, will be glad to answer any questions concerning credits, admission requirements, et cetera. There are no extra fees for laboratory courses or for graduate credit.

SCHEDULE OF CLASSES

BIOLOGY: GENETICS. The genetics and variations of plants and animals, including man; family histories; eugenics; with their

cytological, experimental, and statistical bases. Readings, lectures, and laboratory experiments.

Professor in charge: Frederick C. Copeland, Ph.D.

Gredit: Three semester hours.

Fee: \$37.50.

CHEMISTRY: ELEMENTARY GENERAL CHEMISTRY. An elementary course of college grade for those who have had little or no Chemistry.

Time: June 28-Aug. 21; hours to be arranged.

Professor in charge: Charles David Starr, Ph.D.

Credit: Six semester hours.

Fee: \$75.00.

EDUCATION: A seminar course in the problems of modern education in our public schools. Readings, lectures, discussions, and reports. Students will be encouraged to specialize in some field in which they are interested.

Professor in charge: Irwin Alfred Buell, Ph.D.

Credit: Three semester hours.

Fee: \$37.50.

ENGLISH: CONTEMPORARY PROSE LITERATURE. A general survey of recent prose literature, a discussion of modern tendencies, and a critical study of selections from the better authors of the present time.

Professor in charge: Morse Shepard Allen, Ph.D.

Credit: Three semester hours.

Fee: \$37.50.

ENGLISH: MILTON. The poetry of Milton with special emphasis on "Paradise Lost". Readings, lectures, and discussions.

Time: June 28-Aug. 7; Mon. through Fri.; 9:40-10.55.

Professor in charge: John Bard McNulty, M.A.

Credit: Three semester hours.

Fee: \$37.50.

FINE ARTS: An introductory course in the history and appreciation of Fine Arts with special emphasis on the graphic arts.

Time: June 28-Aug. 7; Mon. through Fri.; 11:15-12:30.

Professor in charge: John C. E. Taylor, M.A.

Credit: Three semester hours. Fee: \$37.50.

HISTORY: CONTEMPORARY CIVILIZATIONS. A study of the various nations of the world in the 20th century for an understanding of present conditions.

Time: June 28-Aug. 7; Mon. through Fri.; 8:20-9:35.

Professor in charge: Edward F. Humphrey, Ph.D.

Credit: Three semester hours. Fee: \$37.50.

HISTORY: AMERICAN HISTORY. A social, political, and economic history of the United States since the Civil War.

Time: June 28-Aug. 7; Mon. through Fri.; 11:00-12:15.

Professor in charge: Edward F. Humphrey, Ph.D.

Credit: Three semester hours. Fee: \$37.50.

INTERNATIONAL RELATIONS: POST WAR PROBLEMS. A study of the conditions and problems likely to exist in the immediate post war period with attention to adjustments that may have to be made in relations among the nations.

Time: June 28-Aug. 7; Mon. through Fri.; 9:40-10.55.

Professor in charge: Hans W. Weigert, Doctor of Laws,
Freiburg.

Credit: Three semester hours. Fee: \$37.50.

ITALIAN: An elementary course of college grade for those who have had little or no Italian.

Time: June 28-Aug. 21; Mon. through Fri.; 8:30-10:20.

Professor in charge: Louis Hastings Naylor, Ph.D.

Credit: Six semester hours. Fee: \$75.00

METEOROLOGY: A study of the factors and conditions influencing weather with attention to their relative importance; use of weather maps and instruments in foretelling weather; etc.

Time: June 28-Aug. 21; Mon. through Fri.; 8:30-10:20.

Professor in charge: Edward L. Troxell, Ph.D.

Credit: Six semester hours. Fee: \$75.00.

MUSIC: MUSIC APPRECIATION. An elementary course in music appreciation; no prerequisite.

Time: June 28-Aug. 7; Mon. through Fri.; 8:40-10:20.

Professor in charge: Clarence E. Watters, M.Mus.

Credit: Four semester hours. Fee: \$50.00.

PSYCHOLOGY: ELEMENTARY GENERAL. Part I. An analysis of consciousness. The consideration of sensation, perception, memory, imagination, thinking, and emotion. Part II. An analysis of behavior. The consideration of the nervous system, reflex, instinct, volition, habit, and motivation. Attention will be given to the application of the principles of psychology to educational methods.

This is a foundation course which must be completed successfully by all who would take more advanced courses in psychology.

Credit: Six semester hours. Fee: \$75.00.

PSYCHOLOGY: Social Psychology. A study of the psychological aspects of group living, of interaction between individuals, between individuals and groups, and between groups. Although it would be advantageous for the student to have prior knowledge of psychology and sociology, there are no prerequisites and the course shall be given in such a way as to be comprehensible to persons lacking knowledge of those subjects.

Professor in charge: Edward DeLos Myers, Ph.D.

Credit: Three semester hours. Fee: \$37.50.

SPANISH: An elementary course of college grade for those who have had little or no Spanish.

Time: June 28-Aug. 21; Mon. through Fri.; 8:30-10:20.

Professor in charge: Ralph Walker Scott, Ph.D.

Credit: Six semester hours. Fee: \$75.00.

SOCIOLOGY: COMPARATIVE SOCIOLOGY. A study of social conditions and problems in the different countries of Latin America. A comparison of standards of living and economic conditions, social philosophies, institutions, educational and cultural levels, folkways, et cetera. Geography and history as background for present conditions.

Time: June 28-Aug. 7; Mon. through Fri.; 11:00-12:15.
