PRESIDENT'S STATEMENT

TRINITY COLLEGE extension courses, now in their 17th year, have been expanded since World War II to offer full time freshman and sophomore liberal arts programs in the late afternoon and evening.

Increased extension offerings follow a 72 per cent expansion in the regular college. In matriculating almost 400 additional students above pre-war enrollment averages, Trinity reached the limit of her resources in teachers, classroom space, equipment, and endowment. The maximum size of a college is controlled largely by upperclass facilities, for these specialized courses, by nature, must be smaller and more personal than elementary classes. And they require more space and equipment per student.

But by late afternoon and evening use of buildings and equipment, by over-time work of regular faculty members, and by the recruiting of former teachers now in business and industry for part-time teaching, Trinity is able to offer an emergency extension program for those veterans and high school graduates who were unable to gain admission as regular students at Trinity or other veteran-crowded colleges.

These late classes are on the same standard and offer the same credit as do corresponding courses in the regular college. They are given on the Trinity campus by qualified teachers. If unanticipated openings permit admission of some extension students to the regular college, full credit may be transferred. This was done with 35 men in 1947. Trinity College will also transfer such credit if the student is admitted to another college or university.

It should be noted that admission to the extension courses in no way carries any implication that the registrant will be able to transfer at a later date into the regular college; because of the present size of the regular college, it is anticipated that there will be little or no opportunity to do so. Nor does admission imply that the College will furnish a full curriculum of junior or senior extension courses in succeeding years for it is beyond our resources to do so.

It is only by utilizing its resources to the utmost that Trinity is able to offer underclass college education in extension for some 200 young men and women of the Hartford area while expanding the four year program to teach an all time high of 900 students.

TRINITY COLLEGE Extension Courses are open to both men and women. The courses are of college grade and are open to all High School graduates. College credit is given for these courses—toward a Bachelor's degree for all and toward a Master's degree for some. Courses which are starred may be taken for graduate credit. Although Trinity College does not award the Bachelor's degree to women, credit for these courses will be transferred to other colleges awarding such a degree. Courses may be taken on a full-time or part-time basis. At present, to meet the demand, most courses are elementary in nature. A number of more advanced courses are, however, included in the list.

All courses meet on the campus in the later afternoon and evening. Boardman Hall and Jarvis Laboratory at the southern end of the campus will be open for this purpose. There is a large parking space near Boardman Hall for all cars. The dining hall will be open for students in Extension who have courses in both afternoon and evening.

The Director of Extension, Professor Irwin A. Buell, will be glad to confer with prospective students about any of the courses listed below.

A study of the mechanical and statistical aspects of accounting; books of records; accounts; fiscal period and adjustments; working papers; form, preparation, and interpretation of financial statements; followed by an intensive and critical study of the problems of valuation as they affect the preparation of the balance sheet and income statements.

Statistical methods used do not demand advanced mathematical knowledge.
