RINITY COLLEGE Extension Courses are open to both men and women. These courses are of college grade, and are open to all High School graduates. Others will be admitted who seem to have sufficient ability to profit from them.

College credit is given for these courses—toward a Bachelor's degree for all and toward a Master's degree for many. Although Trinity College does not award the Bachelor's degree to women, credit for these courses can be transferred to other colleges awarding such a degree.

Classes will be held in late afternoon and evening hours from Monday to Friday. Information concerning the place of meeting of each class may be obtained at the time of registration. The director of Extension, Dr. Irwin A. Buell, will be glad to confer with prospective students about any of the courses listed below, or with those who desire other courses. Dr. Buell may be reached at Trinity College, telephone 7-3156.

Courses begin the week of September 25, 1944. The registration period will be Monday, September 25, from 2:30 to 8:00 P. M. at the office of the Director of Extension, Trinity College, Hartford, Connecticut. Fees should be paid at the time of registration.

### CREDIT

A course meeting once a week throughout the year for one and a half hours each session carries three semester hours of credit. If the number of times per week is greater or the length of the class period is extended, the credit is increased pro rata.

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## SCHEDULE OF CLASSES

CREATIVE ART: A study of the Fine Arts through practical work in the various media. No previous training required.

Time: 7:15 Tuesdays, second semester.

Credit: Two semester hours. Fee: \$18.00

BIOLOGY: HUMAN BIOLOGY. The structures and functions of the human body. Physiological and morphological systems in relation to man: discussion of growth, evolution, inheritance, disease, et cetera. No previous biology required.

Credit: Six semester hours. Fee: \$25.00 a semester.

ECONOMICS: ELEMENTARY ECONOMICS. Basic to further specialization in the field.

Professor in charge: Lawrence William Towle, Ph.D. Credit: Six semester hours. Fee: \$25.00 a semester.

EDUCATION: A seminar course in the modern problems of education. Round-table discussions, readings, and reports.

Credit: Two semester hours. Fee: \$18.00

EDUCATION: HISTORY OF EDUCATION. A history and evaluation of the changes in thought and philosophy that have controlled education from earlier times to the present. Earlier theories,

problems, and procedures in the light of the present. The story of the evolution of present American educational institutions and ideals.

EDUCATIONAL TESTS AND MEASUREMENTS: A course dealing with the educational principles involved in testing and with standard achievement tests in various school subjects. A critical survey of available educational and vocational tests; methods of testing; checking and compiling the results; and discussing the values of the data obtained for both the student and the teacher. Statistical methods used will not be based on previous advanced mathematical knowledge.

EDUCATION: EDUCATIONAL AND VOCATIONAL GUIDANCE. The principles and methods involved in advising pupils concerning their choices of subjects, schools, vocations, et cetera. Educational and vocational information of special value. Testing the pupil for the vocation.

EDUCATIONAL PSYCHOLOGY: PSYCHOLOGY OF THE LEARNING PROCESS. A study of the psychology involved in learning, motivation, economical methods of learning, et cetera.

PSYCHOLOGY: EDUCATIONAL PSYCHOLOGY. The psychology of childhood and adolescence. A consideration of the physical and mental development of the child, noting the influences of heredity and environment.

A presentation of the problems of the adolescent period, considering the rise of new instincts and emotions, the development of self-consciousness and social traits, and indicating the content and method of pedagogical procedure for the children of this period.

ENGINEERING: ELEMENTS OF STRUCTURAL DESIGN. A basic course in engineering, frequent discussion of practical problems by a practicing engineer.

ENGINEERING: AERODYNAMICS AND AERIAL NAVIGATION. An elementary course requiring only secondary school mathematics as prerequisite.

Professor in charge: Feodor Thalheimer, Ph.D.

Credit: Four semester hours.

Fee: \$35.00

ENGLISH: ELEMENTARY COMPOSITION. Lectures, assigned reading, conferences, and themes. The content of this course stresses narration, essays, poetry, and criticism; but opportunity will be given for individual students to devote time to the kind of writing in which they are particularly interested.

ENGLISH: CREATIVE WRITING. Designed for those who have a desire to write originally. Assignments will be adapted to individual desires, for essay, narrative, poetic, or dramatic work. The manuscripts submitted in the course will be read and criticized in class: the standards of criticism will approximate those which might be applied to manuscripts submitted to a good periodical.

ENGLISH: SHAKESPEARE. A study in some detail of several of the major plays.

FRENCH: Conversational French. A course emphasizing the speaking and writing of French. Prerequisite, three years of French in a secondary school or two years in college.

GEOLOGY: REGIONAL GEOLOGY. A study of the geology of our own country, together with lectures on the physiography of foreign lands including the Pacific area.

HISTORY: AMERICAN HISTORY TO THE CIVIL WAR. A general survey of European backgrounds and the economic, social and political evolutions to the Civil War.

### POLITICAL SCIENCE: PRINCIPLES OF GOVERNMENT.

MATHEMATICS: ELEMENTS OF ANALYTIC GEOMETRY AND THE CALCULUS. An elementary mathematical foundation for the study of engineering, sciences, statistics, and higher mathematics. Algebra through quadratics, plane geometry, and trigonometry are prerequisite for admission. A student who has not had a course in trigonometry may be admitted, with the consent of the instructor.

PHILOSOPHY: INTRODUCTION TO PHILOSOPHY. A critical consideration of some of the more important philosophical questions of today including the problems of the interpretation of science, religion, freedom of the will, et cetera.

PHILOSOPHY: PHILOSOPHY OF THE STATE. Lectures, readings, and discussions in the field of governmental philosophy.

PSYCHOLOGY: ELEMENTARY GENERAL PSYCHOLOGY. Part I, An analysis of consciousness. The consideration of sensation, perception, memory, imagination, thinking, and emotion. Part II, An analysis of behavior. The consideration of the nervous system, reflex, instinct, volition, habit, and motivation.

SOCIAL PSYCHOLOGY: A study of the psychological aspects of group living, of interaction between individuals, between individuals and groups, between groups.

Fee: \$25.00 Credit: Three semester hours.

PSYCHOLOGY: ADVANCED GENERAL PSYCHOLOGY. The first semester is a study of General Psychology supplementing work done in introductory psychology. The second semester is a course of advanced study in the individual student's major field.

Credit: Two semester hours each semester.

SOCIAL GEOGRAPHY: THE FAR EAST AND PACIFIC AREA. After a study of the physical and political geography and some attention to historical background, the course will deal with social and economic conditions and problems in each area.

SPANISH: An elementary course of college grade for those who have had little or no Spanish.

ADVANCED SPANISH. This course has as prerequisite two years of Spanish in a preparatory school or one year in college.

The following two courses are being offered without degree credit. They are at the secondary school level. They are for people who took a non-college course in high school, who left high school before graduating, or who have been out of school for some time. This last group may include several Veterans. Satisfactory completion of these courses will be evidence of ability to enter Trinity College as regular students.

PRE-COLLEGE MATHEMATICS. A course covering the more important parts of secondary school mathematics. Algebra, geometry, trigonometry with most of the attention to algebra and trigonometry. See above explanation.
