TRINITY COLLEGE offers the following courses for its summer school of 1945. Credit is given for these courses—toward a Bachelor's Degree for all and toward a Master's Degree for some. Although Trinity College does not award the Bachelor's Degree to women, all summer school classes are open to both men and women, and credit can be transferred to other colleges awarding such a degree.

All classes will be held at the indicated hours in classrooms and laboratories on the campus. These buildings are fairly cool even on hottest days. Information concerning the exact building and room may be obtained at the time of registration.

The summer school of 1945 is divisible into two 6-week periods. One is from June 25 to August 4 and the other is from August 6 to September 15. A few courses extend over the entire twelve weeks and are not divisible. Most courses, however, offer credit for just one period and are followed or preceded by other courses, so that a student may secure credit in any one of a number of courses during each section of the summer school if he so desires. Registration may be made by mail or on June 23 or June 25 from 9:00 to 12:00 in Jarvis Hall, Room 1. Classes start June 25.

The director of the Summer School, Dr. Irwin A. Buell, will be glad to answer any questions concerning credits, admission requirements, et cetera.

FEES

Tuition is charged in general at the rate of \$10.00 for each semester hour of credit. A small laboratory fee is necessary in a few courses to cover the cost of materials. A registration fee of two dollars must be paid by all students. Fees should be paid at the time of registration.

CAFETERIA

A cafeteria on the campus will be open to all summer school students, both men and women.

DORMITORIES

Dormitory rooms are available for all young men in attendance at the summer school. Young women will have to live off-campus. Attempts will be made to find suitable rooms for them.

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SCHEDULE OF COURSES

THE FOLLOWING COURSES WILL MEET FOR A TWELVE-WEEK PERIOD FROM JUNE 25 TO SEPTEM-BER 15.

BIOLOGY: ELEMENTARY BIOLOGY. An elementary course of college grade for those who have had no Biology in college.

Thursday.Thursday.1:30-4:00Monday, Tuesday and Thursday.Professor in charge:James Wendell Burger, Ph.D.Credit:Eight semester hours.Fee: \$85.00

CHEMISTRY: ELEMENTARY CHEMISTRY. An elementary course of college grade for those who have had little or no Chemistry.

Time:11:30-12:30 Monday through Saturday.1:30-3:30Monday, Wednesday, and Friday.Professor in charge:Edgar I. Emerson, Ph.D.Credit:Eight semester hours.Fee: \$85.00

ENGLISH: ELEMENTARY COMPOSITION. Lectures, assigned readings, conferences, and themes. The content of the course stresses narration, essays, poetry, and criticism, but each student will be given an opportunity to devote time to the kind of writing in which he is particularly interested.

This is a divisible course with credit for either the first six weeks or the second six weeks or both.

MATHEMATICS: ANALYTICAL GEOMETRY AND ELEMEN-TARY CALCULUS.

GREEK: An elementary course for those who have not studied Greek previously.

LATIN B.: Selected readings in prose, readings from Virgil and Ovid, prose composition. Open to anyone who has had two years of Latin in secondary school or one year in college.

PSYCHOLOGY: ELEMENTARY PSYCHOLOGY. The basic first course in Psychology.

THE FOLLOWING COURSES ARE SCHEDULED FOR THE PERIOD FROM JUNE 25 TO AUGUST 4.

FINE ARTS: APPRECIATION OF FINE ARTS. A survey course in the history and appreciation of the Fine Arts.

Time: 11:30-12:30 Monday through Saturday. *Professor in charge*: John C. E. Taylor, M.A. *Credit*: Three semester hours. *Fee*: \$30.00

FINE ARTS: CREATIVE ART. A study of the Fine Arts through practical work in the various media. No previous training required.

Time: 9:10-10:10 Monday through Saturday. *Professor in charge*: John C. E. Taylor, M.A. *Credit*: Three semester hours. *Fee*: \$30.00

ELEMENTARY ECONOMICS: Basic to further specialization in the field of Economics.

> Professor in charge: Lawrence William Towle, Ph.D. Credit: Six semester hours. Fee: \$60.00

BIOLOGY: GENETICS. The genetics and variations of plants and animals, including man; family histories, eugenics.

EDUCATION: EDUCATIONAL AND VOCATIONAL GUID-ANCE. The principles and methods involved in advising pupils concerning thier choices of subjects, schools, vocations, et cetera. Educational and vocational information of special value. Testing the pupil for the vocation.

ENGLISH. HISTORY OF THE ENGLISH LANGUAGE. Its vocabulary, including proper names, the development of words and meanings, standard and dialectical English.

Time: 10:20-11:20 Monday through Saturday. Professor in charge: Morse Shepard Allen, Ph.D. Credit: Three semester hours. Fee: \$30.00

ENGLISH: THE BIBLE AS LITERATURE. This course starts with the prophets and follows a course offered previously, but is also complete in itself.

GEOGRAPHY: SOCIAL GEOGRAPHY OF LATIN AMERICA. After some attention to the physical and political geography and the historical background of the various areas a study will be made of the social and economic conditions and problems in each nation.

HISTORY: MODERN HISTORY. The modern period, 1650 to the present. Lectures and assigned readings.

Time:10:20-11:20Monday through Saturday.Professor in charge:To be announced.Credit:Three semester hours.Fee: \$30.00

MATHEMATICS: TRIGONOMETRY. A knowledge of Algebra and Geometry is prerequisite.

> Time: 9:10-10:10 Monday through Saturday. Professor in charge: Feodor Theilheimer, Ph.D. Credit: Three semester hours. Fee: \$30.00

GREEK PHILOSOPHY: Particular attention to the Philosophy of Plato.

> Time: 11:30-12:30 Monday through Saturday. Professor in charge: James A. Notopoulos, M.A. (Oxon.) Credit: Three semester hours. Fee: \$30.00

PSYCHOLOGY: EDUCATIONAL PSYCHOLOGY. The psychology of Childhood and of Adolescence. A consideration of the physical and mental development of the child, noting influences of heredity and environment. A presentation of the problems of the adolescent period, indicating the content and method of pedagogical procedure for the children of this period.

Time:9:00-10:15Monday through Friday.Professor in charge:Irwin Alfred Buell, Ph.D.Credit:Three semester hours.Fee: \$30.00

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GEOLOGY: ELEMENTARY GEOLOGY. The structure and makeup of the earth and the processes that shape it. The origin of the earth and its place in the universe.

> Time: 10:20-11:20 Monday through Saturday. Professor in charge: Edward L. Troxell, Ph.D. Credit: Three semester hours. Fee: \$30.00

GEOLOGY: FIELD AND LABORATORY GEOLOGY. A study and examination of local geology first hand through field trips. Laboratory work in the use of maps, the nature of minerals and rocks, and the meaning of fossils.

> Time: 8:00-9:00 Monday through Saturday. Professor in charge: Edward L. Troxell, Ph.D. Credit: Three semester hours. Fee: \$32.50

Students in this course should keep free the period from nine to ten.

GREEK CIVILIZATION: A study of the civilization of the classical Greeks; their art, literature, philosophy, government, and ways of life. Special attention to those elements in their civilization with most bearing on modern civilization.

HISTORY: ANCIENT HISTORY. A study of the civilizations of the Ancient East and of Greece and Rome. Lectures and assigned readings.

> Time: 10:20-11:20 Monday through Saturday. Professor in charge: To be announced. Credit: Three semester hours. Fee: \$30.00

MATHEMATICS: PRE-College MATHEMATICS. A study of secondary school mathematics, algebra and geometry. For those who have had little mathematics in high school and for those who need a review of secondary school mathematics before going on with more advanced courses.

SOCIOLOGY: COMPARATIVE SOCIOLOGY. A study of the distinctive characteristics of the people in several nations, of their varying ways of life, standards, philosophies, folkways, et cetera, Lectures and assigned readings.

SPANISH: An elementary course of college grade for those who have had little or no Spanish.

THE FOLLOWING COURSES ARE SCHEDULED FOR THE PERIOD FROM AUGUST 6 to SEPTEMBER 15

ENGLISH: CONTEMPORARY DRAMA. The revival of the English and Irish theater in the 1890's; the plays of ideas and modern ideals, especially those of Shaw; realism between the wars; plays of Coward, Maugham and others. Modern drama in other countries.

> Time: 11:30-12:30 Monday through Saturday. Professor in charge: Morse Shepard Allen, Ph.D. Credit: Three semester hours. Fee: \$30.00

ENGLISH: CREATIVE WRITING. Designed for those who have a desire to write originally. Assignments will be adapted to individual desires, for essay, narrative, poetic, or dramatic work. The manuscripts submitted in the course will be read and criticized in class; the standards of criticism will approximate those which might be applied to manuscripts submitted to a good periodical.
