PRESIDENT'S STATEMENT

or the 19th year, Trinity College in 1949-50 will offer Hartford area residents an opportunity to further their education by evening study of college subjects. Although Trinity is primarily a liberal arts college for young men, the College has always shared its resources of plant and scholarship with the people of Hartford. This willingness to broaden its service in the community in 1930 prompted the first Trinity Extension courses.

The extension courses today offer particular opportunity to several groups,—school teachers, psychological technicians, business people, and men and women who wish to secure degree credit by full or part time study.

The extension classes are on the same standard and offer the same credit as corresponding courses in the regular college. Both graduate and undergraduate programs are available. They are all given on the campus by regular faculty members or by equally qualified part-time teachers.

The College is particularly proud of its record in offering freshman and sophomore college work to several hundred Hartford area men and women who were caught in the veteran-crowded "bulge" of higher education. This evening program, now entering its fourth year, was started after a 72 per cent expansion of the regular college which used to the limit all daytime facilities. Of the young men in the late afternoon and evening programs, it was possible to admit to the regular college 35 men in 1947, 65 in 1948, and 25 in 1949. It should be clearly noted, however, that admission to the extension courses in no way carries an implication that the registrant will be able to transfer at a later date to the regular college. Neither has it been found possible to offer a full curriculum of junior or senior extension courses. Trinity will, however, transfer credit to any college or university to which extension students are admitted.

ECONOMICS 3: Principles of Accounting. EDUCATION 20: Practice Teaching. This course is open to Extension students although the teaching must be done during the morning and/or afternoon hours when public schools are in session. This course is required by the State for teacher certification. The course may be completed in from five to twelve weeks depending on the amount of time devoted each day to the course. It carries six semester hours of credit. Anyone desiring to register in the course should consult with Professor Buell at the earliest possible date.

*EDUCATION 21b: PRINCIPLES AND METHODS OF SECONDARY EDUCATION. This course, although not required as such, supplements the above course but may be taken separately.
