TO-MORROW.

Our annual football game with New York University will be played on Ohio Field at University Heights, New York, to-morrow afternoon. So far as can be learned the New York team is up to the standard of its former teams. Having changed coaches the early part of last week the team was set back some, but now, under the coaching of Fultz, the former Brown player, is rapidly rounding into shape. It has plenty of weight in the line and, as its back field is practically the same as that of last year, the team is in a position where it can advance the ball considerably. The team averages almost 175 pounds.

Our team is in worse shape than for any of its previous games this season. Donnelly's injury keeps from the game one of the best tackles Trinity has ever had. Owing to parental objections Bowne, who has been playing a strong game at guard, is unable to play. Ozon refused to obey the orders of Coach Welsh and has suffered the ignominy and disgrace of being driven off the squad,—the first time that this has ever happened at Trinity. Lycett has a bad ankle but will start in the game.

Coach Welsh has spent the greater part of the week endeavoring to develop suitable substitutes for those who are prevented from playing. How well he has succeeded, Saturday's game will tell.

The practice has at times been spirited but a palpable attempt to shirk work is noticeable in a number, and the result is that the development of team work has been greatly hindered.

AWARD OF HARTFORD ADMIT-TITUR PRIZE.

The Faculty have announced that the Hartford Admittitur Prize has been awarded to Frederic Joseph Corbett. This prize of fifty dollars is awarded annually to that student from Hartford who passes the best examination for admission to the Freshman Class. In view of the fact that all students entering Trinity from the Hartford High School are required to pass entrance examinations, and that this year an unusually large number have entered from Hartford, this achievement of Mr. Corbett's is the more credit-Mr. Corbett made a very good record at the High School, standing second in his class for the four years.

an undergraduate project. But the serious necessity of all Trinity Alumni understanding and appreciating the peculiar nature of our plan, the extent of our ambitions, and the immense advantage to our College of the successful completion of what we have undertaken, emboldens us to trespass a little upon your time and good nature, to the end that we may bring you into closer touch with us and to a fuller understanding of our undertaking.

It is not long since you were all informed of the birth of THE TRI-POD. This event, in all probability, caused you pleasure, but would hardly have been a matter for serious consideration had its announcement not been accompanied by a request for your photograph for insertion in what we termed the Inauguration Number. To some the issuing of such a book as we purpose to issue seemed an impossibility, but actually such is not the case. Permit us to refer you to THE TRI-POD of September 27th; we then said: "Trinity men can do all that the men of any other college can do, and do it better." Upon that assumption we based our assurance of success. We did not mean that we would do better, we meant that you would. We meant that we believed that if any enterprise advantageous to your College were undertaken you would support it, not half-heartedly, but thoroughly. And, let us say right here that it is not to complain that we write. We have heard from an abundance of graduates, and enthusiastically; but it is not our ambition to have a partial success, we desire unanimous approval, and respectfully but firmly will force ourselves upon your attention, until we obtain it. If earnestness of purpose be a guarantee of success, then success is ours.

Briefly, our plan is this: We shall issue a beautiful 100-page book that will be all Trinity. Trinity College will be held up to the eyes of the world as no college ever was. Its history, its location, its tradition, its ideals, its present power and hopes of future success, its principles; in a word, that basis upon which all men judge each other and institutions, its character, will be held up before the people of the country. But chief of all, over and above every other consideration, Trinity men will undergo an inspection, both thorough and complete, but eminently fair. Trinity men will be presented just as will be the College, their history, their words and deeds, their work in the world, the principles for which they are standing, the ideals for which they strive, and, here in a word again, their character, the manner of

men they are; all will be told in the volume, if not directly, at least by implication. Does any one doubt the result of this? If so it is not the ones whose pleasure it has been to receive the communications thus far from the Alumni. To them it has been a revelation of what Trinity men are, and it is our belief that the Graduates will, themselves, be astounded at what Trinity men are in the world today, when all this information is condensed and placed before them between the covers of one book. If this be so, what will be the effect of thus presenting such information to the world, which has not yet learned that Trinity College men are the most successful of any in the country.

But practically, as an advertising scheme, nothing could be devised that would so attract attention. We want all the world to know that we have a new President and what a man he is. It is not necessary to tell you, but it is necessary to tell the world the new facts concerning this College and how could it better be done than by the distribution of this book among schools, colleges, and university clubs, as we purpose to do.

Passing over this fact, let us say, briefly, what more it will do in the way of things that come nearer home. It will draw you all, Alumni, nearer together, and more precious yet, nearer to us undergraduates, and there after all, is its real excuse for being, its true mission. Should it in any degree accomplish this, then, indeed, its work is well done, its duty fulfilled.

And so we say that we beg you to have confidence in us, to leave it to us to do, but to contribute to the degree that you can by each, individually, sending his photograph. We do not ask you, necessarily, to subscribe, but we do insist that we are entitled to enough consideration from you for you to send your photographs, and there is no excuse for anyone failing to comply. Whatever be your individual opinion of the scheme, it is now well launched, bound to go through (as we have photographs of men from nearly all the classes) and now it rests with you, not whether it shall be done or not, but whether or not it shall be well done.

We are very determined, we are very much in earnest, and, up to date, we have been, in a measure, successful. But, when it is all accomplished, our object achieved, our duty done, our book published, the world will not say that the Editors of The Tripod were successful in publishing a book with the pictures of a vast number of their Alumni in it, but what it will say is this, - Trinity Alumni are so

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united, are so strong, are so full of love and good fellowship for and with one another, that it was possible for them to produce what no other college could produce, that it was possible for them to accomplish what no other college has accomplished, and in the production of this book Trinity Alumni, not THE TRIPOD, will show their might and power; the success will be theirs, and, above all things, it will be a real and forceful success.

And now that you are all in possession of the facts, THE TRIPOD earnestly requests that you give this matter your early attention, for ours is a worthy project. With best of wishes to you all, we feel that we can in no way bring home to you your true duty, or so thoroughly make you realize that you and we are one, as to quote the words of our noble President that have become our motto, - "Now then, Trinity.'
