#### RUTGERS WON DEBATE

Labor Unions were the Subject of Discussion.

The first annual debate between Trinity and Rutgers was held in Alumni Hall on Friday evening, June 2. Dr. Luther presided and the subject was as follows:

"Resolved, That the workingmen who refuse to join a union act in furtherance of the best interests of the country.

Rutgers upheld the affirmative and was represented by Louis Bevier, 'o6, Welcome W. Bender, '05, and Simon Blocker, '05.

For Trinity the speakers were Philip E. Curtiss, '06, H. DeWolf de Mauriac, '07, and C. Jarvis Harriman, '05.

The affirmative maintained that unions are a bad thing in three ways, politically, economically and socially. Unions teach the emigrant to oppose what is good. They are always seek-The whole ing class legislation. spirit of unionism is to create a power within a power, for the union is within and opposed to the government.

On economic grounds the affirmative upheld that the union follows a wrong wage theory and attempted to manage the employer's business. On social grounds it was claimed that the union is an un-American institution. This is shown partly by its secrecy. If the union is such an advantage for all workingmen why is it secret and exclusive?

The Trinity speakers in defending the negative, showed that the conditions of the laboring classes are today not improving, but are even in danger of serious depression. This is because of the great rush of immigration and because of the increasing strength of employers' associations. While the general wealth of the country has vastly increased in the last twenty years, wages are no higher. A stronger union could improve these conditions, and the union is the only way of bringing about such improvement. The union needs a larger membership for this purpose.

Whatever evils of unionism there are, the negative claimed that they would be lessened rather than increased by a larger membership. Larger memberships will cause recognition by the employer and this is the foundation of good feeling, which improves all relations between labor and capital.

Dr. Luther as temporary chairman appointed the following committee to act in accordance with Mr. Morris' motion: Professor Edwards, Mr. Shiras Morris, and Mr. A. D. Haight.

#### TRINITY VS. WILLIAMS

Trinity was defeated at baseball by Williams last Saturday, by the score of 10 to 3. The team as a whole played very good ball, but Bowman had hard luck in the last two innings, when the visitors punished him se-

Randall, at third, seemed to have gained more self-confidence than he has shown heretofore and put up a very good game.

The feature of the game was the home run of Westervelt in the first inning. This is the first home run knocked on the Trinity field this year.

In the first inning, Burwell fielded McCarty's grounder, but fumbled one from Wadsworth. Nesbitt was out on a fly to Badgley. Westervelt knocked out a home run, scoring Wadsworth. Watson hit safely, and Hogan was passed, but Neild struck out. For Trinity, Morgan flied out to Wadsworth and Landefeld struck out. Powell hit safe, stole second, and came home on Madden's single.

Nesbitt threw Clement's grounder to second, but Wadsworth fumbled it and Madden was safe. Bowman, however, struck out.

Neither side scored again till the eighth inning, when Nesbitt led off for Williams with a two-bagger, which Westervelt duplicated, scoring the former. Watson walked. Hogan fanned, but Neild knocked a twoformer. base hit, scoring Westervelt and Watson, and was himself brought home by a single from Austin. Pierce made a base hit and both he and Austin advanced a base each on a passed ball Austin came home on McCarty's grounder to Burwell, who fielded it to Landefeld; Landefeld failed to touch his man and was too late to catch McCarty at first. Wadsworth struck out and Nesbitt flied out to Burwell.

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
