#### TRINITY---WESLEYAN.

#### SERIES WON BY TRINITY

#### Each Took One Game Tuesday.

The teams of Wesleyan and Trinity played a double header Decoration day, each team winning one game. The morning game was played on Trinity field at 10:30 and resulted in a victory for Wesleyan, 3 to 2; the afternoon game played on Andrus field, Middletown, resulted in a victory for Trinity, 3 to o. This, therefore, gives Trinity two victories out of three games played with Wesleyan this

Both contests yesterday, as their scores indicate, were close and exciting, and the greatest credit is due to Badgley who pitched both games. His steady, persistent work through the eighteen innings of hard playing, during which he gave but two bases on balls, counted more than anything else for the good work of the Trinity team. Dravo pluckily played the afternoon game, though weak from his serious accident less than two weeks ago, and made the hit that brought in the first run. The whole team, especially in the afternoon game, played almost perfect ball and worked hard

#### Morning Game, Wesleyan 3, Trinity 2.

The weather in the early morning threatened rain, but cleared up about 10 o'clock, and just before the game the sun came out, making ideal base-ball weather. The line-up of Trinity was weakened in this game by the absence of Dravo and the men did not play with the confidence that characterized the first Wesleyan game.

Landefeld was placed in the catcher's box, Powell played third and Randall took Powell's regular place at short and played a good game. Wesleyan had rather the best of the game until the sixth inning, when Trinity scored. In the eighth Wesleyan made three runs, winning the game. They were the result of two hits and poor fielding. Burwell batted well, getting two hits out of three times up. Badgley struck out eight men.

In the fifth Wesleyan went out, Hancock to Landefeld, Monroe fanned, Morgan, Burwell to Clement. For Trinity, Madden got a hit, but Randall, who ran for him, was caught off first on a double play of Clement's fly, Clark to Taylor. Bowman was out, Clark to Taylor.

The first scoring was done in the sixth. Wesleyan went out with but three men at bat, Anderson got a hit, but was caught off first on Haley's fly

Smith led off for Wesleyan in the fourth with a hit. Day knocked a grounder to Badgley, who threw Smith out at second. Taylor was out to Landefeld, Clark to Powell, Anderson to Taylor.

The first man at bat was Hancock, to Clement, who made the double play Burwell's error. Morgan knocked a Taylor. Burwell led off for Trinity with a two-base hit. Randall was out to Taylor.

> Day was the first man up for Wesleyan in the seventh, but was out Burwell to Clement. Taylor went out to Clement unassisted. Clark got a hit over third, but Hancock flew out to Randall. Trinity made another run in this inning. Madden struck out. Clement got a hit over first. Bowman struck out. Burwell got a hit over short, scoring Clement. Randall flew out to Morgan.

> Wesleyan made her score in the next inning. Monroe led off with a hit, but was put out at second by Randall on Morgan's grounder. Anderson got a hit over short. Haley reached first on poor judgment by Randall, filling the bases. Smith was out on a high fly to Bowman, but Morgan came home on the throw in. Day knocked a fly over short, which Randall failed to get, allowing Anderson and Haley to score. Taylor was out, Burwell to Clement.

#### TRINITY'S BASEBALL SEASON.

Trinity has completed the principal part of her baseball season. Twentytwo games have been played, and but three remain. Of these, two are sceduled with Williams and the other with Amherst.

The season just closing may well be considered the most successful that Trinity has had for years. Out of twenty-two games played we have lost eleven, won ten, and tied one. We have scored 106 runs against opponents, and had eighty-five scored against us

The remarkable point about this season's successes is that the schedule is the hardest that Trinity has had for years. She has crossed bats, or will have when her season has closed with most of the strongest eastern collegiate nines, and the manner in which the Trinity Bantam has tack-led, and at times beaten, opponents many times her size, has caused a stir

To lower the colors of such colleges as the University of Pennsylvania and Holy Cross, and not only to defeat, but to shut out, our old rival, Wesleyan, twice in one season is glory enough for any Trinity team.

We have published herein, pictures of every man on the team, and they deserve all the honor that can be given to them. They have worked hard and faithfully for Trinity, and they have won for her much honor and glory.

We cannot forbear to mention especially two men on the team as worthy of the highest praise. Badgley and Captain Clement.

Badgley yesterday did an act which very few pitchers would have done. 



#### CROWDS AND CHEERING.

Fine Weather, Large Crowds and Lively Cheering at Both Games-Dr. Hart Entertains Trinity Supporters.

The day was perfect for both games and large crowds witnessed the two most interesting contests of Trinity's baseball schedule. At the morning game a fair sized representation from Middletown supported the Wesleyan players, and cheered them to victory. The cheering on the part of Trinity was one of the most gratifying particulars of the day's success. At the morning game most enthusiastic support was given the last men who came to bat, and after this nearly every man found his way by one means or another to be present at the afternoon game, determined that Trinity should give a good account of herself.

The crowd in the afternoon at Middletown was larger, as was naturally to be expected of an afternoon game, and especially since Trinity took such a large crowd of supporters. leyan player was caught out, Trinity supporters rushed across the field directly to the gymnasium and gathering there cheered the team and each individual player. After this they marched in single file, cheering and singing, downtown, where they formed abreast, and proceeded to the Berkeley Divinity School.

Dr. Hart had previously invited the college to attend an informal reception at his home after the game (not the first of these invitations to the college by Dr. Hart), and more than seventy-five men enjoyed his generous hospitality until it was time for them to take the train for Hartford.

Needless to say, everybody along the road from Middletown to Hartford, by way of Berlin, was made to know the score. On arriving at Hartford, after organized cheering at the station, a large crowd walked up Asylum street to Main street, and gathered on the corner for still another "long Trin." After this the students separated in groups to the different theaters and to the college.
