TRINITY 3—COLUMBIA 1.

Victory Comes in the Eighth Inning.

Trinity defeated Columbia last Tuesday on Trinity field by a score of 3 to 1. The game was interesting from start to finish and too much credit cannot be given to Capt. Powell for the splendid showing of our team. Badgley pitched excellent ball and as usual showed his ability at critical times. The game was devoid of spectacular points with the exception of two three-base hits by Collins and Armstrong. Umpire Rority called the game at 4.15 and Trinity took the field.

Lyons, the first man up, received his base on balls, took second on a sacrifice hit by Armstrong, and came home on a three-base hit by Collins. The hit placed between left and center fields was one of the features of the game and brought in Columbia's only run. Collins, however, did not make a base after this inning. Young and Mittenberger struck out.

Morgan, first up for Trinity, knocked a high fly to Oxman and Burwell also flied out. Powell walked to first and Badgley followed by a hit advancing Powell to second. The inning closed when Xanders flied out to Collins.

In the second inning both sides went down in one, two, three order, not a man making a hit.

Badgley struck out Lee and Lyons in the third, Armstrong made a one-base hit to left field, and Collins went out to Burwell.

Morgan brought in our first run in this inning. He followed Cunningham, who struck out, with a short hit. A wild throw to first allowed him to pass second and third and he crossed the plate on an error by Young. Burwell flied out to Kimbel. Powell sent a grounder to Collins and was put out at first.

The fourth inning was nearly a repetition of the second. Young and Kimbel were out at first and Mittenberger flied out to Donnelly. In our half Badgley, Xanders and Connor flied out to Schmidt, Kimbel and Collins respectively.

Oxman started the fifth by knocking a slow grounder which Badgley easily got to first, Schmidt struck out, Lee received his base on balls and Cunningham caught Lyons' high foul. For Trinity, Marlor made a hit to center, Cunningham sacrificed, Donnelly and Morgan struck out.

It looked as though Columbia would score in the sixth as Armstrong, the first man up, made the second three-base hit of the game to right field, but here our team showed its capability of backing its pitcher. Xanders caught Collins' foul near third, Marlor caught an extremely difficult fly by Young and Mittenberger was put out by a grounder from Xanders to Donnelly.

In the second half Powell struck out and Burwell and Badgley flied out.

In the seventh one man on each side got to first, Schmidt on a hit and Xanders on Collins' error.

Armstrong made another hit in the eighth but failed to get around.

Cunningham, first up for Trinity, re-

ceived his base on balls, Morgan sacrificed, Burwell bunted along the third base line and made first on a fielder's choice. Cunningham came home on Oxman's error and Burwell followed him to third. Powell drove the ball nearly to the fence in center, but Kimbel caught it. Burwell came home on the throw-in. Badgley found the ball and got his base on Oxman's error. Xanders flied out to Kimbel.

In the ninth Columbia could get only three men at the bat. Mittenberger and Oxman struck out and Kimbel knocked a grounder to Burwell, who easily got it to Donnelly.

The annual election of officers of the Trinity College Athletic Association was held Tuesday night in the Latin room. Immediately preceding the meeting, a college meeting was held with D. W. Gateson '06 presiding, for the purpose of electing a junior college marshal. This honor carries with it the distinction of leading the procession of seniors on Class Day and on Commencement Day. Oliver W. Badgley was enthusiastically elected to the office.

In the Athletic Association elections, Gerald A. Cunningham, who has acted as secretary and treasurer of the association, was unanimously elected president. Cunningham is one of the most prominent men in the class of 1907. He was a member of the Sophomore Dining Club in his sophomore year, he was a member of the Junior Promenade Committee, is literary editor of the "Ivy" and is catcher on the base ball team. He is a member of Delta Psi.

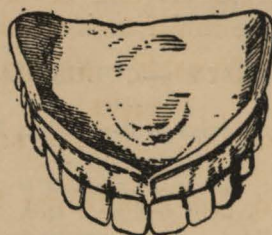

Lawson Purdy, Trinity '84, has had
the honor conferred upon him of being
appointed by Governor Higgins of the
state of New York a member of a
special tax commission to inquire into
the subject of assessment and taxation
for state and local purposes. The com-
mission is composed of fifteen members,
five senators, five assemblymen and five
persons appointed by the governor.

Mr. Purdy is particularly well fitted
to fulfill the duties of his position as
he is an expert in taxation and as an
editorial in the "Auburn Citizen" ex-
presses it, "he is a high minded man of
radical ideas and conservative applica-
tion." At present Mr. Purdy is secre-
tary of the New York Tax Reform As-
sociation. The "Buffalo Express" con-
siders him the best authority in New
York state on questions which the com-
mission is to consider.

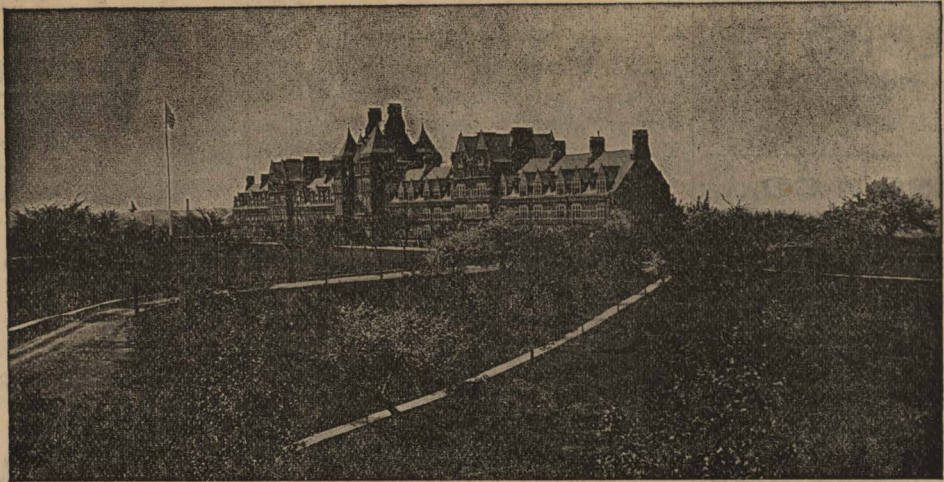
