TRUSTEES' MEETING.

Changes in Faculty.

To fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Professor C. F. Johnson from the chair of English, Assitant Professor Cranston Brenton was elevated to the full professorship. Professor Brenton has had an exceptionally fine career.

After graduation he entered Berkeley. He accepted the rectorship of a church in New Milford, which he held until September, 1904, when he came to Trinity as an instructor in English. He is well known as an attractive preacher and speaker and is full of enthusiasm and capacity for hard work.

Cecil Fairfield Lavell, M. A., professor of history and economics at Bates College, Lewiston, Me., was elected to the chair of history to take the place of Professor Henry Ferguson, who has resigned. Mr. Lavell was graduated from Queen's Colege, University of Toronto, in 1894. He has published a volume on Italian cities and has in press a series of nine lectures, entitled, "Imperial England."

To fill the vacancy created by the promotion of Professor Brenton, Dr. Arthur Adams was elected to the assistprofessorship of English. Adams is a graduate of Rutgers, in the class of 1902. He received a Ph.D. at Yale in 1905. He has specialized in English studies. For the past year he has been an instructor in English at the University of Colorado. He will also give instruction in public speaking.

The trustees also authorized the faculty to recommend for the degree of bachelor of arts, men who have completed a satisfactory amount of work in one ancient language. Hitherto both Latin and Greek have been required for an arts degee. In making this change, Trinity adopts the plan now pursued at all the New England colleges, with perhaps a single exception. The degree of bachelor of letters is no longer to be

At the session, two new trustees were elected, Rev. Henry Ferguson, who resigned from the chair of history, and Edgar F. Waterman '08, treasurer of the college. Mr. Waterman, who has been assistant treasurer of the college, was elected to the office of treasurer, to take the place of C. E. Graves, 1850, deceased.

ALUMNI ASSOCIATION.

The Alumni Association spent most of the morning in eulogising members who have died during the last year. step was made concerning the floating laboratory which was proposed last year by Prof. Charles L. Edwards of the chair of natural history and biology.

The committee which was appointed at that time to raise funds for this expedition reported that \$3,500 had been raised, and while about twice that amount was needed, the committee hoped that as early as next year the experiment could be made.

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
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
