PRESIDENT LUTHER WILL TAKE A WESTERN TRIP.

Left Hartford Yesterday Afternoon.

President Luther left Hartford yesterday afternoon for a two weeks' trip, to extend west as far as Wisconsin. He will go direct to Racine, Wisconsin. Among his engagements there is an address to the boys in Racine School, of which he was for several years the rector.

He will stop at Chicago on his return and will speak at the annual banquet of the Chicago Association of Trinity Alumni on Tuesday evening.

Dr. Luther purposes to visit the Howe School at Lima, Indiana, and from there to go for several days to Detroit. On Sunday, March 11th, he will preach to the students of Michigan University at Ann Arbor. He will also visit Orchard Lake Academy, near Detroit. While in Detroit he will address the University School and three high schools of that city. This will practically complete his trip. He hopes to return before the fifteenth of the month.

DR. URBAN WILL SPEAK AT BERKELEY.

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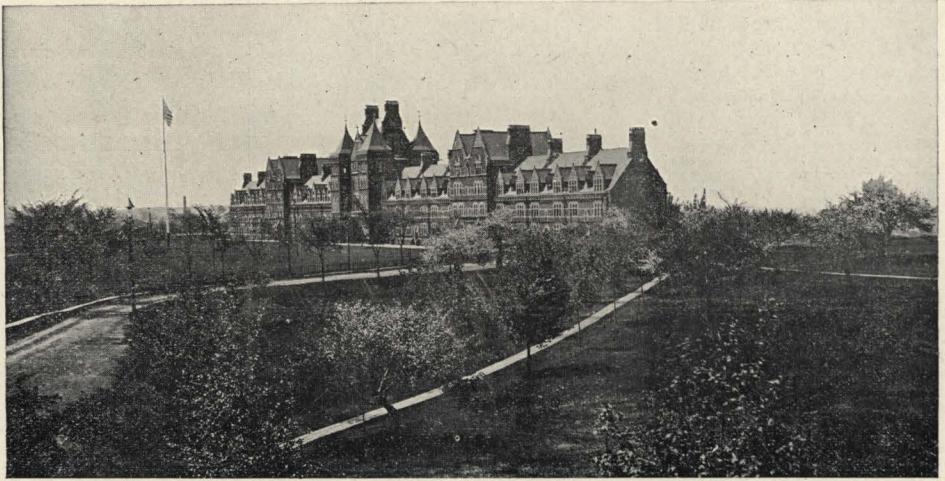
