#### TRINITY vs. TUFTS.

#### Trinity Plays Excellent Ball.

Trinity played a tie thirteen innning game with Tufts at Medford last Wednesday. The score was 4 to 4 when the game was called on account of darkness. Watson pitched a remarkable game, striking out nineteen Trinity men. He used the spit ball throughout the game with excellent control. Badgley also pitched good ball, striking out fourteen men. This was by far the most interesting game Trinity has played this year and all through the last four innings it looked like Trinity's game. Four or five times we got men on second and third by able sacrifices but Roper fielded the ball with such accuracy, not a man got in. It was his exceptionally good work that saved Tufts from defeat. All of our players showed the results of regular practice and their improvement since their last game was remarkable. Cunningham caught his best game this year, Burwell, on second, made an exceedingly difficult catch, Donnelly a two base hit, and Powell hammered the ball for one, two, and three base hits. On a different field Powell's three base hit would undoubtedly have been a home run.

# PROF. McCOOK LECTURES TO POLITICAL CLUB.

The speaker explained the nature of the Corrupt Practices Act—a law designed to prohibit votes. The spring elections were briefly reviewed, Dr. McCook telling about the mass meeting held just previous to the election for the enforcement of the law. The committee of twenty-four appointed to see that the elections were lawfully held, had the following men from Trinity who took a very active interest in the campaign. Dr. Luther, Prof. McCook, and Walter Schutz. The work of this committee was dwelt upon as described in a previous number of the "Tripod."

#### PRESIDENT LUTHER'S WEST-ERN TRIP.

#### Effects of His Visit on One School.

The following article is taken from "The Adjutant," the paper of the Michigan Military Academy:

"What's the matter with Dr. Luther? He's all right!" Such was the greeting President Flavel S. Luther of Trinity College received from a hundred lusty voices when he stepped upon the platform before the cadets just before dinner on March 9th; and it is needless to say that Dr. Luther fulfilled the prophecy. No other speech such as Dr. Luther's has been heard at the Michigan Military Academy this year. It seemed that the Doctor was fairly brimming over with wit and humor, and he could hardly make a sentence without a joke lurking in it somewhere. And President Luther was even more wise than he was witty. He told us that the watchword of the advancing age is accuracy, care. We now measure in the thousandths of an inch where we formerly measured in sixteenths. In chemistry, in manufacture, in art, accuracy, care counts for everything. Our advanced knowledge of atomic weights is revolutionizing our theory of matter, the by-products of our factories are paying our dividends, the millionth of an inch by which a line varies on the painter's canvas constitutes the difference between the artist and the "duffer." We need men of accuracy, men who when two courses of action are proposed, can see the inevitable end of each at the "parting of the ways." Men, too, are needed with courage to do the thing after it is seen to be right. It costs as much to educate a loafer as it does to train a scholar. A Pullman parlor car costs as much as a locomotive. A parlor car is a very elegant thing, but a locomotive is a great deal more useful. A parlor car never gets anywhere except it is hauled about; a locomotive, with its heart of flame, has an energy of its own. The man of the future will be of the locomotive type; his heart will be aflame with a purpose, he will be honest, true, industrious, and faithful. We need men who have accuracy, care, ability to discern rightly, and also men with energy to do the thing after it is seen to be right.

"We all hope to see Dr. Luther at least once a year."

#### EDITORIAL.

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

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
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
