PROSPECTS FOR STEVENS' GAME.

Team in Good Condition.

As far as such a matter can be judged, the prospects of Trinity against Stevens to-morrow look very bright. We have not met the Stevens team for two years, but the last game was won by Trinity 5-0. Another point which can perhaps be taken into consideration is the fact that Stevens played Rutgers a tie game this year, a team which Trinity has easily defeated for a number of years.

Mason will be in this game at left half, and this fact, with the experience which the team derived from the West Point game, ought to put the team on a much better footing than heretofore.

The men are all in the best of condition, having, for the most part, recovered from the injuries which they received in the West Point game.

Coach Landefeld has given the team a number of new formations and trick plays which will undoubtedly be used to good effect on Saturday.

PROF. MERRILL'S OCCUPATION DURING THE SUMMER.

As was stated in a previous issue, Professor Merrill spent the summer in Europe. The greater portion of the time he was in England where he examined as many as possible of the manuscripts of Pliny's Letters that could be found in that country. He collected such of them as seemed to be of primary importance and incidentally noted other manuscripts of especial interest. Professor Merrill studied in Oxford, Cambridge and London, and made some very important discoveries.

The last two weeks of his stay abroad were spent along the old German frontier of the Roman Empire where the great rampart, with its occasional forts, stretched all the way from the Rhine to the Danube. He says that this rampart can still be traced in some places in the hill country.

LIBRARY RECEIVES GIFT.

Donor is Mr. George H. Clark, Jr.

The Trinity College Library has recently received a valuable gift of books from George H. Clark, Jr., of Newark, N. J., son of the late Rev. George H. Clark, D.D., of this city. The gift also includes a bequest from the late Charles Washburn Clark, and comprises his fine collection of books, chiefly in French and German, relating to international law, political science, and European administration and polity. The books given number over 900 volumes and form the largest and most important gift of books received by the Library since 1901.

This table, taking into consideration the general condition of the team now in contrast to its condition last year at this time, gives good promise for the four games. The Stevens team which we play to-morrow was defeated 5-0 in the last game Trinity played with it. Springfield Training School may be expected to put up stiff opposition if they maintain their reputation, but with two more games and the same improvement of the team which has taken place in the past week, the Training School will probably be disappointed.

NOTES.

The Sophomore-Freshman baseball game which was scheduled for Tuesday afternoon was called at the end of the third inning on account of rain with no score. Xanders who pitched for 1909 and Olson who did similar service for 1910 were both in good form and no hits were secured. There were four errors but the game gave promise of good baseball material for next spring. A deciding game will be played soon.

A meeting of the nominating committee was held to-day at 12:45. The names of second assistant managers for the football team will be submitted.

A notice has been posted on the bulletin board calling for entries to the fall tennis tournament. Judging from the number of entrants the tournament will surely be a great success.

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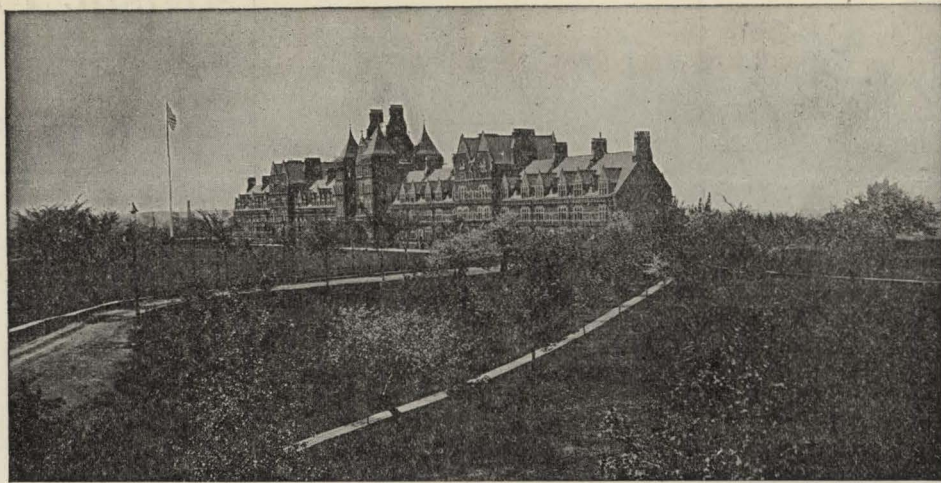
