## UNION 8, TRINITY 2.

Trinity lost to Union at Schenectady, N. Y., Saturday by six points. The unfavorable weather conditions made it impossible to play good ball, snow falling during a part of the game.

Trinity made its two runs in the first inning. Rich made a hit and was advanced to third by a sacrifice by Smith, but was put out trying to reach home. Smith managed to get to first on fielder's choice. Xanders, next at the bat, knocked a long drive to left field, but it was caught. With Smith on base, Badgley made a good hit, afterwards stealing from second to third. Potter next made a hit, sending Smith and Badgley home. With Potter on second, Connor knocked a two-bagger but Potter was unable to reach home. Gildersleeve was out on a fly to left field. That is the story of the game as far as Trinity is concerned.

For Union, one run was made in the first, two in the second, two in the fifth, and three in the seventh.

Smith, Badgley, Xanders and Connor were the only Trinity players that made no errors. Connors did well at the bat, getting two hits out of three times up.

The spirit shown at Union was very commendable and showed what enormous steps in this direction we must take to regain the spirit and enthusiasm which we surely have lost to a great degree. The Trinity men were received with the greatest respect and hospitality, and were shown every attention.

Several large bonfires were made the night before, and the whole college body turned out to see the game, despite the sleet and freezing weather.

## INTER-COLLEGIATE NOTES.

The feature of the baseball game Saturday, when Cornell defeated Yale, was a home run made by Deshon, the Cornell pitcher, which won the game.

Haskell Noyes '08, of Milwaukee, Wis., has been elected captain of the Yale basketball team for next season. Noyes has played on the 'varsity team two seasons.

The U. S. Naval Academy defeated Johns-Hopkins in a field and track meet held at Annapolis Saturday, by 51 to 45 points. The time for the running events was mediocre and no new records were established.

At Cambridge, Mass., Saturday Harvard defeated Dartmouth in a dual track meet by a score of 83 to 34.

At Williamstown, Mass., Saturday, Williams defeated Brown in a dual track meet by a score of 75 to 51.

A movement is on foot to organize an intercollegiate gun club. It is proposed to hold a competition June 21-22 at Creedmoor, N. Y. Teams are expected from Yale, Princeton, Cornell, Columbia, George Washington, M. I. T., C. C. N. Y. and St. John's.

The Cornell track team defeated Princeton, Saturday, by the decisive score of 71 to 46.

Columbia lost to the Pennsylvania track team, winning but nine places.

## TRIPOD BOARD MEETING.

## EDITORIAL.

With to-day's issue we, the old board, give up the paper to the new board which is to be elected this evening. This is our last issue and we are sorry that the year has gone by and that the same staff will not be together as a unit again. We have all enjoyed our life in connection with one another and in bringing forward this paper twice a week. Things have not always run smoothly, many times we have felt discouraged, but we have persisted and striven to the best that was in us. Now that it is all over we are conscious of our defects as perhaps no one else is but we are proud at the same time, and think that we have done our little mite towards keeping the paper upon a high plane, and bringing our Trinity before the world in a larger circle than in other years.

A thing that reconciles us to giving up the paper to the next staff, is that we too shall be on it, perhaps in different capacity, but nevertheless we shall be on it just the same, with the addition of several new men who have shown great ability and interest, and by the

suffusing of new life we feel that we will be able to improve the paper and extend its range of usefulness.

The Tripod received a letter recently from an alumnus which said, in part, "You don't seem to be able to give very cheerful reports of the baseball games. What is the matter with the team? I understood when I was last at college that we were to have splendid success this spring. The records so far don't seem to bear out the prophecy. Stir up the men. Get some ambition into them. Just make them win. That's the way we beat Columbia back in the early 90's to the tune of 54 to 0."

Now the Tripod certainly wishes it could "make" the team win. We have said just as much as we possibly can to bring about that result, but the whole trouble seems to be a lack of enthusiasm. No real Trinity spirit can be aroused. The men play as if they were being paid for doing some disagreeable work; not as if they were straining every muscle to do honor to their Alma Mater. Let us have some real Trinity spirit and no more humiliating defeats.

Since this discussion of the baseball team has been brought to our attention we think it well to mention the matter of the entire disregard of the first principles of training which has been manifested by the baseball team this year. We had hoped the men would realize the necessity of training without a prod from another person, but that hope seems past. In our next issue we shall discuss this question with the thoroughness it deserves.

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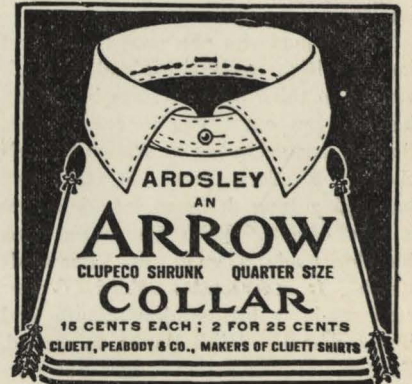

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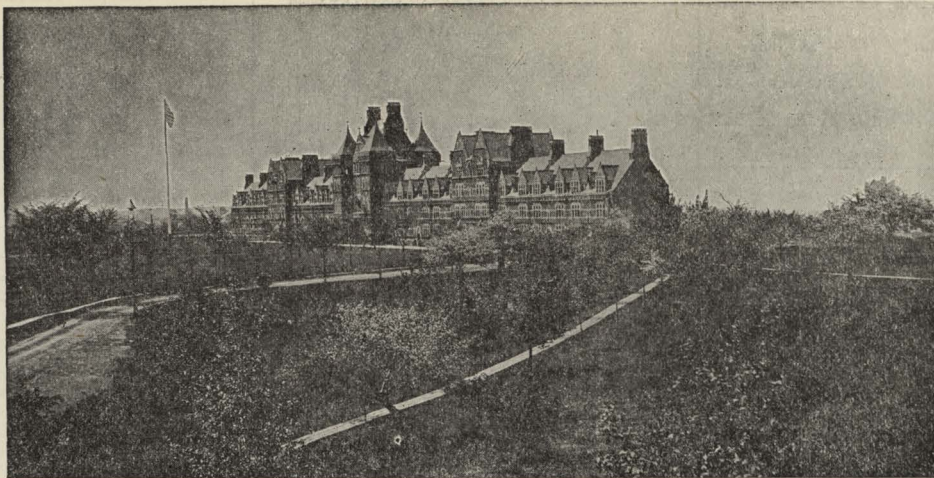
