## DEFEATED AT HOCKEY.

#### West Point 6-Trinity o.

West Point defeated Trinity at hockey Saturday, January 25th, at West Point by the score of six to nothing. Trinity put up the poorest sort of an exhibition, due largely to being "kneesprung" after the long journey on the train. At no time did they show anything of their true form, and in the second half the Army scored almost at will.

The first half proved a very close thing and neither side scored until a few seconds before the close, when Beavers put one in, which should have been an easy stop for Budd. The second period was simply a rout, neither Trinity's forward line nor the defense being able to cope with the cadets at The surprising thing about the reall. sult is that West Point didn't roll up a larger score.

## HARTFORD ALUMNI DINE. Seventh Annual Banquet Jan. 24.

There were seventy-five Trinity alumni present at the seventh annual banquet of the Alumni Association of Hartford, which was held at the Allyn House, Friday evening, January 24th. It was very informal, with a notable tendency to singing and reminiscense of college days. The presence of a glee club quartet, composed of H. N. Chandler, H. C. Goodrich, Paul Roberts and J. S. Carpenter, Jr., lent a lively and tuneful note to the singing.

J. Humphrey Green '91 was toastmaster, and President Luther, the principal speaker. He spoke of his twenty-five years' of service at Trinity and of the development of the college. He dwelt at length upon the support of the college, which must depend upon the gifts of its alumni and its friends for its existence and its growth. For gifts must be given in part as payment of a debt every man feels toward his college, but mainly because of the pride the giver will feel in helping to make his college a great college.

A number of other alumni talked informally, among them George E. Beers '86, professor of jurisprudence in the Yale Law School, Percy S. Bryant '70 and Robert H. Schutz '89. Captain E. J. Donnelly 'o8 of last fall's football team spoke encouragingly of the football outlook, predicting the coming of a number of preparatory school stars to strengthen the squad.

Davis of Middletown, trainer of the Glee club. President Luther in a brief address welcomed the visitors to the college. He said in part :--

"The chapel in which we are gathered has been consecrated by more than a quarter of a century of college services. Who can tell what great thoughts or dreams of youth have had their birth within these walls? Many who are now foremost among the world's workers have occupied these chapel seats. It is in the dreams and aspirations of youths that history is made and many of you young men and women who are here to-day are doubtless destined to leave your names on record in the history of this, our common country. See to it, my friends, that your dreams and aspirations are of such pure and noble nature that when you take up the work of this hard world which we who are older must soon leave to you, a lofty and untiring purpose on your part may enable you to correct our mistakes and to finish worthily the work in which we have achieved partial success. Some of you, doubtless, are destined to be great; others may be forgotten soon after they are laid beneath the sod. But all of you will have accomplished something worth while if you faithfully fill your place, important or unimportant, in the complex world of deeds."

#### Football.

The manager of the football team shall be eligible to wear the football T.

At the end of the football season any man who has started or played a full half in five games, or who has started or played a full half in the Wesleyan game shall be eligible to wear the football T.

At the end of the football season the right to wear the football 2d shall be granted to the eleven most deserving members of the scrub at the discretion of the coach, captain and manager.

#### Baseball.

The manager of the baseball team shall be eligible to wear the baseball T.

At the end of the season any man who has played in at least eight games for at least five innings of each game shall be eligible to wear the baseball T.

At the end of the season any man who has pitched in at least five games for at least five innings shall be eligible to wear the baseball T.

In this reckoning five innings of the Wesleyan game shall count as two of the eight games.

#### Track.

The manager shall be eligible to wear the track T.

At the end of the track season any man shall be eligible to wear the track T who:

Has won one or more points or a fraction of a point in the N. E .I. A. A. meet.

Has won a first place or tied for a first place in the Wesleyan meet.

Has won points equivalent to a first place and second place in all the meets during the track season, or any man who has tied for points equivalent to a first and second place.

Has been a member of a relay team which has won in an intercollegiate competition.

Any man who has won a point or fraction of a point in any meet during the track season shall be eligible to wear the track ATA. Basketball. The manager of the basketball team

shall be eligible to the basketball T. At the end of the season any man who has started or played during one

full half in ten games shall be eligible to wear the basketball T. Class Teams.

Any man who has represented his class in any interclass football, basketball and baseball game shall be allowed to wear his numerals.

Any man who has won or tied for first place in the fall Freshman-Sophomore meet, or who has won first, second or third place or tied for first, second or third place in the spring interclass meet shall be eligible to wear his class numerals.



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
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
