INTERCOLLEGIATE NOTES.

Princeton's baseball team defeated the Syracuse 'varsity lately by the score of 3 to 1. Syracuse lost the game chiefly through lack of headwork on bases. Despite the muddiness of the Stadium diamond, both nines played fast ball. For four innings the teams battled without a score until Syracuse made her first run in the latter part of the fifth. Prince on came back in the sixth with two runs and then added another in the eighth.

The Yale track team has sustained a loss which, it is feared, may cost the college the dual games with Princeton next Saturday, and the games with Harvard at Cambridge a week later. Lester Barber Stevens, the best sprinter at Yale, has injured his knee and will be unable to compete in the sprints. He has been running the 100 yards in ten seconds flat, and was counted upon to win the sprints in both sets of games.


By the close margin of two points, Williams was defeated by Brown in the dual track meet held on Weston field last Saturday. As the results of the events were announced, the score in almost every case sent the standing of the contestants alternately to the head. At the last event, the discus throw, Brown led by one point. The result, a first for Brown and second and third for Williams, gave Brown a The weather conditions were such as to make a fast meet impossible, the wind being against the runners, on the home stretch in the distance events, and the track heavy.

The result of the meet showed Williams unexpectedly strong in the runs, vaulting, and jumps, though weak in the dashes and weight events, in which more points had been counted on.


Holy Cross defeated the Harvard University baseball team at Worcester on Saturday by the score of 3 to 2. The home team played much better in the field than the university team, and at the bat secured eight hits to Harvard's six. The first three Holy Cross batters were exceptional hitters, and were responsible for six clean hits and three runs. Harvard was unfortunate at the bat, and it was only the hardest kind of luck that prevented more runs being scored. With the exception of the third inning Hicks pitched excel-lent ball. In the sixth he struck out all three men. Dowd for Holy Cross received excellent support.

In the interclass track meet at Columbia University a week ago the feature was the breaking of the university record of 4 minutes 35 seconds for the mile run held by C. B. Marshall 'o2L. G. W. Hoyns 'o8S covered the distance in the fine time of 4 minutes 32% seconds, in spite of the chilly atmosphere and raw wind which blew across the field, hindering the great majority of the runners and jumpers.

The senior class day committee has selected Colt's Armory Band to give the customary concert on the campus on Class Day. The members of the committee are also securing the autograph of each member of the class. These will appear on a page in the class day program and will make a unique feature for Trinity commencements.

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


