Trinity-Wesleyan Track Meet To-morrow

FIRST TRACK MEETING SINCE 1904

To-morrow afternoon for the first time in four years the old rivals, Wesleyan and Trinity, will meet each other in what promises to be one of the most interesting track meets of the year. If the weather conditions are good a large crowd is expected to witness the contest and Manager Roberts is making arrangements accordingly. The whole undergraduate body and many of the local alumni as well as a number from out of town will doubtless fill the Trinity cheering section and they will have a band to assist them in encouraging the wearers of the "Old gold and blue."

Wesleyan is expected to send up a large body of loyal rooters and they will occupy seats in the south stand.

The boys from down the valley seem confident that they will return to Middletown with a large proportion of the medals and an ample revenge for their foot ball defeat of last fall. The Trinity followers, while not supremely confident of victory, nevertheless expect to see Captain Olmsted's men give a good account of themselves.

Coach O'Connor has been very busy since the meet with Rensselaer rounding the men into shape and they now are all in good trim for to-morrow.

The Wesleyan supporters are pinning all their faith on the dashes and the distance events up to the two mile run. In the field events they expect to capture both the broad and high jumps. The hurdles are expected to be very close events, while the weights are conceded to Trinity. It is expected that both Bacon and Connor, who have been laid off on account of injuries, will be able to run for Wesleyan. The "dope sheets" have been much in evidence during the past week and the knowing ones predict that despite all reports to the contrary the meet will be close and that the winning team will have to go to the limit of its ability. TRINITY LOSES TO DART-MOUTH.

In a Close and Snappy Game.

Trinity was outplayed on Wednesday when Dartmouth took the game by a score of 3-1. The Green seemed to be in the game from start to finish, and nothing that the home team could do, was able to even tie the score, although sufficient chances were given.

Trinity lost on account of the frequency with which Dartmouth was allowed to go to first on balls, and thereby giving them many chances to make

The game was unusually fast, and well played, as far as errors go, only one being made by Trinity, against two for Dartmouth. The crowd was larger than usual and undoubtedly enjoyed the exhibition.

Trinity had a chance of tying the score in the eighth, with a man on first and second. Xanders came to bat. The fans called "Over the fence," but Xanders flied out to that wonderful center fielder, Glaze, the Dartmouth captain. Glaze ran like a madman, did a double roll, and stood up, with the ball put snugly away in his glove.

The visitors outfielded and outbatted Trinity, and Mitchell outpitched Woodle, who, feeling charitable, was determined to give at least one base on balls each inning. He did, on the average-all but one inning. Mitchell was the recipient of three bee-lines, all of which he handled in a creditable fash-

All of Dartmouth's runs were made by men who were given their base, and this was the way of it: In the second, Mitchell flied out, Eaton drew his base, stole second, and was advanced to third on a sacrifice hit by Brady. Hobart then drew his base, and stole second. Woodle then passed Emerson, and when Conroy made his hit Eaton and Hobart crossed the plate. Conroy then managed to be hit by a batted ball and the side was retired. It was the same story in the eighth, Leonard got a base on balls, stole second, made third on a sacrifice, and home on a hit by Brady. Trinity's run was made by Connor, who reached first on an error by Schildmiller, stole second, and came home on Carroll's hit. Abbey, aside from making the only error for Trinity, played a good game, and A. L. Gildersleeve did fine work on the bases. Conroy at short played the best game for Dartmouth.

EDITORIAL.

On Tuesday evening the third college sing was held in the music room. Mr. Davis was present and coached the singing, so that it went with consider-· able snap and vim. At the base ball game with Dartmouth on Wednesday two songs were tried, both of which had been practiced the evening before. These were far below the standard of what was expected after the sing. The cheering was also of a poor order compared to what Trinity did when we beat Wesleyan in foot ball last fall. As everyone knows we have a track meet with Wesleyan to-morrow, everyman in college must be there to aid the team with his support.

The team will do the best to a man and it is up to us to show them that we are behind them by being in the cheering section early and staying there until the last event is run off. If this is done we feel sure that tomorrow evening we will have just cause to be proud of ourselves.

Dartmouth was defeated by the Harvard University track team in the dual meet on Soldiers field recently by the score of 68 points to 49. The Dartmouth team proved much stronger than had been expected, and in several cases won events which had previously been conceded to Harvard. The University team, on the other hand, showed weaknesses in the events in which it was thought to be the strongest, as for instance the quarter and half-mile. As a result of the hard rains during the past week the track was rather heavy and slow, and a downpour, which came just before the 220-yard hurdles and 220-yard dash were run off, left the track in very poor condition and caused slow time in these two events.

Dartmouth secured 6 first, 5 second and 4 third places to Harvard's 7 first, 8 second and 9 third places.



INTERCOLLEGIATE NOTES.

In the closest race in the annals of rowing at Annapolis both Columbia crews were defeated by the Midshipmen in a four-cornered race on the inner course of the Severn Saturday after-noon. The contest between the two first boats was undoubtedly the most hotly contested and prettiest race ever rowed on the Severn and was well worth the long wait and delay caused by the high wind and rough water. The latter was also responsible for the slow time that was made, the Navy covering the two mile course in 10 minutes 23% seconds, the Columbia first eight finishing three feet and a half behind in 10:23%.

In a notly contested meet the Boston Tech track team defeated Brown University recently by a margin of 17 Tech scored seven firsts, ten seconds and six thirds, while Brown captured seven firsts, four seconds and seven thirds. With one point split between the two teams the score was 71½ to 54½.

Because of general ability in all events, and superior head work, Amherst won the first dual meet held with Williams in ten years, on Pratt field last week, by a score of 69 to 57. closeness of the score, though Amherst won by a larger margin than was expected, is indicative of the general nature of the meet, in which the attention was held from start to finish. The meet was, however, marred by the most unfavorable weather conditions, the track was soggy from recent rains, and showers were frequent during the afternoon. Taking into consideration these facts, the times of some of the events were remarkably good. The opposing captains, White of Amherst, and Horrax of Williams, were clearly the stars of the meet, for the Williams leader was an easy winner in the broad jump, pole vault and high hurdles and tied for first in the high jump, while the Amherst man romped away from the other contestants in the mile and two mile. An existing record of each college was broken during the after-



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

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
