TRINITY AGAIN VICTORIOUS.

Haverford Loses 27 to 0.

Last Home Game of The Season.

Trinity won her third consecutive victory Saturday afternoon by defeating Haverford on Trinity field by the score of 27 to 0. This was the last home game of the season. Trinity gave a good exhibition of the open game, much to the admiration of the Hartford followers of the leading college sport.

The day was an ideal one for football, as it was not too warm to be disagreeable for the players, nor was it too cold for the comfort of the largest crowd of the season which witnessed the game.

The Philadelphian collegians were much lighter than the Trinity eleven, though they were a fast team, especially the backfield. The Haverford team was the gamiest aggregation that Trinity has played this year, and they were also the cleanest players. The game lacked any degree of unsportsmanlike conduct; several men were more or less severely injured; these injuries came simply as a matter of course, and were not outcomes of "slugging."

In the first half Trinity resorted to the use of straight football, and succeeded in making one touchdown. Gildersleeve, in the opening period, kicked a beautiful kick from placement, the ball being held by Captain Henshaw. The Trinity eleven did not display an overamount of aggressiveness in this half; they did not seem to be able to get started soon enough and the interference was somewhat weak. Haverford showed surprising strength in the line for their weight, though the continual smashing of the Trinity backs was too much. In this half Haverford played better than in the second period.

The second period was an exhibition of the new football, the Trinity team making continual use of the forward pass. The work of Backus and Xanders in passing the ball accurately to Ramsdell was commendable; many yards were gained in this way. Haverford attempted the onside kick several times, but several times the ball fell in the arms of one of Trinity's aggressive backfield.

Both teams were forced to kick frequently, though not as many times as in the Wesleyan game. Trinity kicked 10 times and Haverford 9 times during the game. In the kicking game, Maxson had the better of the argument with Tomlinson. The Trinity men ran the punts back far better than did the Haverford men; Maxson's work in this respect being one of the features of the game.

The Haverford team were better as far as clean tackling was concerned; often they broke through the line and stopped the Trinity play before it was well started.

Ramsdell and Xanders in the forward pass, Captain Henshaw in interference and defense, and Maxson in punting and running back kicks, played the best for Trinity. Tomlinson, Birdsall and Captain Bard played the best game for the Scarlet and Black.

First Half.

Haverford won the toss and defended the south goal. At 2.40, Bard kicked off to Backus on the 25-yard line, who made 10 yards before downed. On the next play Xanders went around left end for 8 yards; Carroll was unable to gain, but Xanders made first down with a gain of 4 yards. Xanders was thrown back for a loss on the next play, but Henshaw made up 10 yards. Maxson on the third down punted 35 yards to Sharpless, who was downed in his tracks. Haverford fumbled, Henshaw recovered the ball on the Haverford 38yard line. Trinity was penalized 15 yards for holding. Xanders made a forward pass to Ramsdell, which netted 15 yards. Again Trinity was penalized 15 yards for holding. Xanders by a clever run around left end cleared 27 vards, Backus on a slow play lost 5 yards, Ramsdell made 6 yards, Captain Henshaw called for a place kick, and Gildersleeve placed the ball squarely between the goal posts from the 40-yard line. Score: Trinity 4, Haverford 0.

With 23 minutes to play, Bard kicked to Xanders on the 10-vard line, but when the ball was downed it was on the 22-yard line. Lewis, who received a bad sprain of the knee, was replaced by Birdsall at left end for Haverford. Henshaw went through tackle for 5 yards and Xanders followed with 15 Ramsdell made 3 yards. vards more. Trinity could not make the distance so Maxson punted to Haverford's 35-yard line and Tomlinson ran the kick back but 2 yards. Haverford tried a forward pass, but was penalized 15 yards, because the ball touched the ground. Tomlinson punted outside at his own 35-vard line. Trinity was thrown for a loss and Maxson kicked to the 7-yard line, then Tomlinson booted the ball to the 40-vard line. Ramsdell and Xanders were unable to gain, so Maxson punted outside at the 20-yard line. Meyers made 3 yards through the line, en the next play the Trinity line held and Tomlinson punted to the 52-yard line. Henshaw made 5 yards, Maxson 3 yards, and Maxson kicked to the 18yard line. Bard made 4 yards, an onside kick followed which gave Haverford first down. Bard gained 1 yard,

EFFECTIVENESS OF PLAYS.

Not as any indication of the effectiveness of certain plays or players on the Trinity team but merely as a matter of interest, the "Tripod" publishes the ground gained by each man in carrying the ball in the Wesleyan game and the number of plays in which it took him to do it.

Of course in any compilation of figures of this sort certain men have a great advantage over others in that they are the only men who work in certain plays, such as Ramdsell on the forward pass, and Xanders in circling the ends. Still the figures may be of interest. In case of a loss, the distance lost is taken from the man carrying the ball, although oftentimes it was through no fault of his that the loss occurred. Two plays in which Xanders after a run passed to Ramsdell are credited to the former.

To say that it was a hard fought, fast game is not putting it too strongly for there was very little delay throughout the course of the game, neither were there any lazy streaks on either side.

The Haverford team played exceedingly clean football, and a great deal of praise is due them for the pluck and stick-to-it-iveness, which they showed even after they were surely beaten, for with a man like Captain Bard at the head, there was no faltering.

Trinity showed up in the usual amazing way, getting off on the jump, making several of the long forward passes, which were executed well, and Xanders succeeded in making some thrilling end runs.

So since we are entirely satisfied with the result of last Saturday's game, and expect to be well satisfied also with that of this week, there should be some demonstration upon the leaving of the team for Ithaca, in order that the players may know and feel that the college is behind them, until the last minute of play is over on the twenty-first.

and a forward pass, Sharpless to Birdsall, netted 9 yards and first down. Another onside kick was tried, but Backus got the ball and ran 8 yards. Haverford captured the ball on a fumble in midfield. Sharpless attempted a forward pass but Xanders got the ball. Trinity at this point took a brace and rushed the ball over for a touchdown with the following gains: Carroll 15 yards. Xanders 9 yards and 8 yards, Backus 5 yards, Xanders 6 yards, Gildersleeve 3 yards, Ramsdell 5 yards, Xanders 7 yards, Ramsdell 3 yards, and Xanders carried the ball over for a score. Maxson punted out to Ramsdell on the 15-yard line. Gildersleeve kicked an easy goal. Score: Trinity 10, Haverford 0.

Bard kicked off to Maxson on the 5yard line, who returned 20 yards. Trinity was unable to gain and Maxson punted to Tomlinson on the Haverford 50-yard line, where he was downed. On the next play Haverford fumbled and Carroll fell on the ball, which gave Trinity first down. Xanders circled left end for 30 yards, Gildersleeve tried a goal from placement, but the ball went short and Haverford gathered it in on the 8-yard line. punted to the 45-yard line, Backus carried the ball back 10 yards. Ramsdell gained 2 yards, Xanders 5 yards, but on the next play Haverford got the ball on downs. Bard made 6 yards and time was up.

Second Half.

Xanders started the second half by kicking the pigskin over the goal line. Tomlinson punted out from the 25-yard line to Ramsdell at midfield. Xanders cleared 38 yards by clever dodging. Ramsdell made 5 yards and Haverford held for downs on its 8-yard line. Tomlinson punted to the 38-yard line and recovered the ball on a fumble. An onside kick went to Backus on Trinity's 40-yard line. Henshaw made 10 yards, Xanders 5 yards, and Ramsdell was thrown back, Maxson punted to the 35vard line. Tomlinson made 3 yards, and a Haverford forward pass went wrong and a penalty of 15 yards was inflicted. Tomlinson punted to Maxson on the 38-yard line. Xanders gained 12 yards, Ramsdell 15 yards, Carroll 1 yard, Ramsdell 6 yards. Haverford was penalized 1 yard, half of the distance to the goal line, for offside play. On the next play the Haverford line took a brace, but Xanders with the heavier team of Trinity carried the ball over for a touchdown by a few inches. Gildersleeve kicked the goal. Score: Trinity 16, Haverford 0.

Bard kicked to the Trinity goal line, Xanders made 18 yards on the return. The next two plays netted nothing and Maxson punted to the 50-yard line, where the ball was downed. Bard made no gain, but Tomlinson went through the line for 5 yards. Haverford punted to the Trinity 10-yard line, where Maxson got the ball and returned it 40 yards. A forward pass, Xanders to Ramsdell, netted 25 yards, Burdick made 15 yards and Henshaw 5 yards on forward passes. Xanders went around left end for 15 yards and a touchdown. Gildersleeve missed the goal. This is the first goal that he has failed to kick this season, which is an excellent record. Score: Trinity 21, Haverford 0.

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
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
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ALUMNI DEPARTMENT.

'70. The Rev. Dr. George Brinley Morgan, rector of Christ Church, New Haven, was run into by an automobile Saturday afternoon, and died at 11.45 without regaining consciousness. Dr. Morgan had just left his church, and was crossing the street, when he was hit by the rear fender of an automobile driven by Sam Campbell, an automobile dealer.

After being carried to a drug store, Dr. Morgan was almost immediately removed to Dr. L. W. Bacon's sanitarium, where his skull was found to have been fractured. Despite the efforts of the four doctors in attendance, little could be done for him, and he died at 11.45.

Dr. Morgan was born in Hartford on January 9, 1848, and graduated from Trinity in 1870. After teaching in Racine, Wis., he went to the Nashotah Divinity School, and began his church work in New Hampshire. He was rector of Christ Church, Exeter, N. H., from 1878 to 1887, and since then has been rector of Christ Church, New Haven.

He received the Doctor of Divinity degree from this college in 1903, and the same year was elected bishop-coadjutor of Springfield, Ill., which he declined. He was quite active in church affairs, being one of the best known clergymen in the state.

His brother, Dr. W. D. Morgan, '72, of Hartford, and his wife, were with him when he died, and he is survived by four children. The funeral will be held tomorrow forenoon at 11.30, from Christ Church, New Haven, and he will be buried in Spring Grove Cemetery, Hartford.

Dr. Luther, Bishop Nichols of California, Rev. Dr. George McFiske of Providence, Rev. Henry Barbour of New York, and Arthur K. Brocklesby and Percy S. Bryant of Hartford were his classmates.


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

Bard kicked off to Maxson on the 13yard line and he was down at the 25yard chalk mark. The next two plays netted nothing and Maxson punted to the 50-yard line, where the Haverford man was thrown back 3 yards. Capen went in at right guard in place of Breed for Trinity and Post took Ramsey's right tackle on the Haverford team. Tomlinson punted to 34-yard line and Maxson made 12 yards. No gain, so Maxson punted to Haverford's 35-yard line and the ball was returned 10 yards. Bard punted on the third down to Maxson on the 35-yard line, a gain of 5 yards was made. Carroll made 9 yards. Trinity was penalized 20-yards for continued holding, Xanders cleared 30 yards around end. A forward pass, Backus to Ramsdell, netted 20 yards. Henshaw made 2 yards. Trinity tried a forward pass, but Bard got the ball and returned it 18 yards. Tomlinson punted to Trinity's 40-yard line, Maxson ran the kick back 30 yards. The next play was the feature of the game. Xanders started around right end and made 15 yards, but on the point of being tackled, he threw the ball to Ramsdell, who was 10 yards away. Ramsdell caught the ball and placed it between the goal posts for the last touchdown of the day. Gildersleeve kicked the goal. Score: Trinity 27. Haverford 0.

Bard kicked to Trinity's goal line, and Maxson ran the kick back 25 yards. Gildersleeve made 1 yard, on a delayed pass Henshaw made 11 yards, Carroll made 18 yards; a forward pass, Xanders to Backus, netted 8 yards. Gildersleeve caught Maxson's onside kick and the ball was on the Haveford 30yard line. Time was called for the end of the last home game that Trinity plays this season.

During the game Trinity carried the ball 687 yards to Haverford's 75 yards. Trinity made first down 19 times and Trinity was pen-Haverford twice. alized 50 yards, all for holding, while Haverford lost 31 yards by penalties. The summary:



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
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
