## BASEBALL TEAM WINS TWO GAMES.

### Yale Proves Too Much.

Three games were played in the vacation by the baseball team, two of which were victories, over Stevens and Pratt, while Yale proved too much for Trinity. In the first game at Stevens the hitting of Trinity was the feature, about eleven hits being placed to their credit. Otherwise the game was of a listless character, the final score being Trinity 4, Stevens 2.

Pratt Institute of Brooklyn, was next defeated in a highly exciting contest at the Ridgewood grounds, Brooklyn. The day was cold and a stiff biting wind chilled both players and spectators to the marrow. A big delegation of Pratt rooters was on hand and they stayed to the finish, encouraging their favorites in spite of the unpropitious weather.

Holtorf struck out fourteen Trinity men, but his freedom with passes to first base was a big factor in his team's defeat. Oleson was in the box for Trinity, and was invincible in all innings but the seventh. He gave two passes and struck out five men. Trinity was the first to score, when in the fourth inning Webster, Turner and Abbey were passed, and Cook's timely double sent in two runners. In the sixth inning Abbey traveled around the bases, on being hit stealing second, and coming home on O'Donnel's poor throw of Gildersleeve's bounder. Pratt evened matters in the seventh by making three runs on a pass to Brodhead, Terry's single and Dayton's two-bagger. Connors tried to double up Dayton on Hoffmann's liner, but hurled wide and the runner scored.

The eighth gave Trinity the deciding run. Smith received four balls and stole second, Abbey's single scoring him. Abbey, Buck, Hoffmann and O'Donnel excelled in the field. Final score, Trinity 4, Pratt 3.

## TERRY FELLOW APPOINTED.

The Mary A. Terry Fellowship has been awarded by vote of the faculty to Hollis Smith Candee '09 of Hartford.

Mr. Candee is the holder of the Holland Prize Scholarship in the senior class.

The Mary A. Terry Fellowship, endowed by a legacy from Miss Mary A. Terry, of Hartford, yields an annual income of about six hundred dollars. It is awarded annually, by the president, upon the recommendation of the faculty, to a member of the graduating class who gives evidence of superior ability and who engages to pursue an approved course of graduate study at Trinity College or at some other college or university approved by the faculty. The incumbent holds the Fellowship for one year and is known as the Mary A. Terry Fellow.

## LEFFINGWELL TO HEAD POLAR EXPEDITION.

### Will Renew Work Begun by Himself and Mikkelsen.

Ernest DeKoven Leffingwell '95 has left Pasadena for Seattle, where he begins his preparations for his tour of two years into the Alaskan Territory in the interest of the University of Chicago, and the hydrographic office of the United States Government. He will outfit his steamer, the Argo, and with four assistants start up the coast May 1st to Behring Straits, thence to Point Barrow and Flaxman Island, the headquarters for his prospective trips of exploration in the wilds of the northern coast.

Ernest DeKoven Leffingwell of the University of Chicago is the son of the rector of St. Mary's Academy, Knoxville, Ill. He is 6 feet tall and weighs 175 pounds. During his student days at Trinity College, where he took his bachelor's degree in 1895, he was captain of the track team. Since leaving college most of his life has been spent in adventurous hunting trips and arduous scientific expeditions. During the Spanish-American war he served as a volunteer sailor on board the battleship Oregon.

Mr. Leffingwell in 1897 was joint commander with Capt. Ejnar Mikkelsen in his polar expedition of 1906-8. Prior to that, in 1901, he was a member of the first Zeigler expedition to Franz Josef Land, on which expedition he first met Capt. Mikkelsen.

The Duchess of Bedford expedition sailed from Victoria, B. C. Its purpose was to search for a possible seventh continent on the far north, Mikkelsen and Leffingwell both believing in the existence of the theoretical polar continent. Leffingwell, with First Mate Storkerson, left the vessel behind Flaxman Island, when it was determined to spend the winter of 1906-7 there, and with a dog sledge "mushed" to Herschell Island, bringing out the first news of the expedition. Subsequently and after Leffingwell's return to the ship, the expedition had to be abandoned because the vessel was crushed in the ice pack off Flaxman Island. Mikkelsen left her there, mushed along the coast to Nome, and thence out by way of Valdez, Alaska, arriving in Seattle April 2, 1908.

Mr. Leffingwell's present expedition is to carry on the work abandoned when the Duchess of Bedford was lost.

Thus it may be seen that this meet has a double purpose, so let everyone be around and do what he can for his college and his class. Trinity has a good baseball team this year as may be seen by the results of the opening games and the college also needs and must have a good team to represent it on the track and in the field. In order to do this more men than have been out must put in an appearance on Saturday. Even if a man cannot make the team this year, he should at least try and thereby have the advantage of the good training that Coach Coholan is giving the men.

Festus Morgan, the secretary, was born at Lynn, Mass., attended the Boston Latin School and was graduated from Trinity College at Hartford in 1888. Coming to Cooperstown, he became a director in the First National Bank, has been a member of the school board since 1904 and the work in preparation for the new school building was commenced soon after that date. Mr. Morgan is a gentleman of large means, public spirit and has been deeply interested in the improvement of the Cooperstown school system. He presented the school with its fine library furniture, costing \$500 and has been active in improving the standard of the teaching force. Mr. Morgan purchased the Nichols mansion on Fair and Lake streets, where he resides with his wife and three sons. He visited Europe in 1893 and has seen much of this country. He is a member of Christ Church (Episcopal). Mr. Morgan represents the best type of the true American gentleman. Intellectual in his tastes, kindly in his manner and generous in his gifts, his influence has been of great practical benefit to the community.
