### CLASS DAY OFFICERS.

Elected by Class of 1909.

On Wednesday afternoon, January 13, the Senior Class held a meeting for the purpose of electing the officers for Class Day.

A committee composed of S. E. Mc-Graley, L. G. Harriman, A. W. Creedon, H. O. Hinkel, M. A. Connor, W. Eastman, W. Dwyer and G. E. Elwell had been appointed previously to prepare a list of nominations for the various offices. This committee made its report, which was accepted, and the class proceeded to the election of officers.

The highest class day honor, that of President, went to James S. Carpenter, Jr., of Pottsville, Pa. Carpenter has always been prominent in college and class matters, having been manager of the football team, chairman of the junior promenade committee, president of the German Club, and a member of the Glee and Mandolin Clubs. He is a member of the I. K. A. fraternity, the Sophomore Dining Club, and the Senior Honorary Society.

Henry O. Peck, of Pittsfield, Mass., was elected secretary and treasurer. Since entering college Peck has been prominently identified with the "Tripod," holding the position of treasurer at the present time. He is a member of the Alpha Delta Phi fraternity.

Alexander W. Creedon, of Hartford, was unanimously elected orator. He is the manager of the basket ball team and a member of the Mandolin Club, having at one time been the leader of the same. He was a member of the junior promenade committee. He is a member of the Phi Gamma Delta fraternity and the Sophomore Dining Club.

Welles Eastman of St. Paul, Minn., was the choice of the class for the position of historian. Eastman entered college in his sophomore year. He was a member of the 1909 Ivy board and the junior promenade committee. He is the advertising manager of the "Tripod" and a member of the Alpha Delta Phi fraternity.

G. Edward Ewell, Jr., of Bloomsburg, Pa., was the unanimous choice of the class for the class poet. Elwell was the editor-in-chief of the 1909 Ivy, a member of the sophomore smoker committee, and the Tablet Board. He is on the Glee Club and is a member of the Delta Psi fraternity.

The class statistics will be delivered by Michael A. Connor, of Hartford, Ct. Connor has been on the baseball team for the past three years and will captain the 1909 team. He is a member of the Alpha Chi Rho fraternity.

Second Annual Conference to be Held at Trinity.

A meeting of the Missionary Society was held Tuesday evening, Jan. 12, in the history room. The society this year is studying the missionary conditions in our far-off territory of Alaska. For each meeting three of the members volunteer to write short papers or give short talks which are not to exceed ten minutes each. The study of Alaska is particularly interesting, and the whole college body is cordially invited to attend the meetings. The papers read Tuesday evening were the first ones on the subject of Alaska. Barbour, '09, spoke on "Alaska, Geographically and Politically"; John Clark, '10, had for his subject "Alaska, Historically"; while Kedney, '10, read an article on "Alaska, Industrially." All the talks were very interesting and showed a great deal of preparation on the part of the speakers. After the reading of the papers there was a short informal discussion on the talks.

The Missionary Society and the Brotherhood Chapter are going to hold a conference of college men on February 20, 21 and 22, lasting from Saturday until Monday. The conference last year was held at Harvard. Some of the colleges which will probably be represented are: Yale, Harvard, Princeton, Amherst, Williams and M. I. T. The list of speakers will probably include President Gardiner, of the Brotherhood of St. Andrew, Bishop Hall, of Vermont, and Bishop Brewster, of Connecticut, and several other prominent churchmen. The number present at the conference will probably be in the neighborhood of fifty. The advantage which this conference will be in bringing Trinity College into the public eye can hardly be overestimated.

The committee on entertaining the visiting delegates is composed of A. S. Kean, '09, John B. Clark, '10 and F. S. Kedney, '10.

Y.

The following extract from a letter written by J. W. Curtiss, the graduate advisory rowing coach at Yale, to the "Yale Alumni Weekly" regarding the collapse and subsequent death of Griswold, the stroke of last year's crew, during the Harvard-Yale race at New London last year, in which he attributes his death to typhoid fever, is interesting:

"The collapse," he writes, "has been very generally misunderstood. It was purely nervous and not physical. His nervous condition was supplemented by the false start. Long after the race was over he told me that during the same he felt something clutching at his throat; that he did not feel physically exhausted at all, but that this unknown something was preventing him from breathing. Physicians have since told me that this was a sign of nervous collapse."

'94. Guy Andrew Hubbard, '94, died at his home, 136 St. Paul's Ave., Tomkinsville, N. Y., on December 28, 1908. He was born April 23, 1871, at Oakland, Me., and entered the junior class here, receiving the B.A. degree in 1894. He taught in St. Mark's, and the New York Military Academy, and at the time of his death was a professor in DeWitt Clinton High School, New York City. He was an uncle of G. H. Newhall, '12.

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### ALUMNI DEPARTMENT.

'76. Col. W. C. Skinner, '76, at the recent reorganization of the Colt Fire-Arms Co., of Hartford, was elected to the presidency of that firm, having previously been vice-president and very active in the management. He is also one of the five members of the board of directors.

Col. Skinner is a trustee of the college, and an ex-president of the Alumni Association. He is director in many Hartford banking and trust companies.

Dr. Lorin Webster, '80, the headmaster of Holderness school, will visit President Luther over Sunday and preach in the chapel on that day. It was incorrectly stated in last Friday's issue of the "Tripod" that he would preach last Sunday. Dr. Webster holds a special interest for Trinity men as being the headmaster of a school which sends a great majority of its graduates to Trinity.

'91. A. C. Graves, '91, is the author of a lengthy article on "Railroad Accounting and the Hepburn Law," which appeared in the Railroad Age Gazette, December 11, 1908 to January 1, 1909. He deals in full with the working of this law, and the changes caused by it. He says:

"In the very unfortunate results which have ensued after one brief year of railroad operation under the Hepburn Law and which we have briefly rehearsed, all people suffer, the shipper as well as the investor. But the investor and stockholder, whose rights are seldom regarded by politicians and never by commissions, have a complaint also against the president and directors of our railroad companies. It is that, while objecting in speech and written statement they have yielded with a singular facile compliance to the unlawful demands of the Commission in respect of railroad accounting. To protest by speech and public interview when partisan feeling is running high is of little avail. We think that, regardless of fears and personal inconvenience, in a broader and higher appreciation of their position, as trustees of the transportation interests of the country in which are invested thirteen thousand millions of dollars of private capital and personal savings, the most tremendous industry, perhaps, in the entire world, they should appeal to the protection of the Federal courts to check the autocratic assumption of unconstitutional power on the part of the Interstate Commerce Commission.'

'93. On January 5th James Cullen tendered a banquet at the Business Men's Club, Cincinnati, to members of the Alpha Delta Phi Fraternity, residing in Cincinnati and several adjacent cities. The twenty-two guests present embraced graduates of ten colleges. During the evening a movement was started to adopt the plan which has proven so popular among the New York Trinity men of having monthly meetings on informal lines. Trinity was also represented by the Rev. John Moore McGann, '95, now located at Columbus, O.

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
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
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
