At the last meeting of the faculty the senior appointments for this commencement were made. The following men were elected: to deliver the valedictory address, Harold Nathaniel Chandler of Fitchburg, Massachusetts, the salutatory address, Hollis Smith Candee of Hartford, the third oration, Clinton Jiriah Backus, Jr., of St. Paul, Minnesota. Any other seniors desiring to compete for a place on the commencement stage should confer with Professor Brenton of the English department immediately. Ordinarily there are two other members of the senior class who take part in the commencement exercises.

Harold N. Chandler has been during his college course prominent both in scholastic work and also on the campus. In his freshman year he won the Holland Scholarship. This year Chandler was awarded second prize in the Alumni English Competition and received the first Frank W. Whitlock Prize. Mr. Chandler was soloist on the glee club for the first three years of his course and also leader during his junior year. He was a member of the Tripod board and the Sophomore Dining Club. He is a member of the Delta Psi fraternity and leader of the college singing.

Hollis S. Candee has won several scholastic prizes during his course. This year he holds the Holland Scholarship and was recently appointed to be the Mary A. Terry Fellow.

Clinton J. Backus, who will deliver the third oration, entered Trinity in 1907 from the University of Minnesota. He played quarter-back on the 1908 football team and is a distance man on this year's track team. Backus is president of the Dramatic Club and a member of the Phi Gamma Delta fraternity.

COLLEGE NOTES.


