TRINITY DEFEATS M. A. C.

Score 4 to 3.

Trinity succeeded in adding one more to its string of victories last Wednesday, by defeating the Massachusetts Agricultural College, 4-3. The game was not so close as the score would indicate, since the "Aggies" had a rally in the ninth, and scored twice on a combination of two hits, a fielder's choice, and two errors.

The weather was a little too cool for perfect baseball and comfort, but the fielding was not retarded by wind. The game was called at four o'clock on Trinity Field, and proved to be exciting at times. In the ninth inning it looked bad for a short time for the home team, as the playing was decidedly loose.

The "Aggies" were unable to overcome Trinity's slight lead, however, and the game ended without further incident. The features of the game were the excellent base-running, and the successful working of the squeeze play, two runs being attained by this by Trinity.

Cook pitched well for the home team, allowing but five scattered hits, and giving no bases on balls. The best support was given by Abbey, who played his usual heady game. Hubbard of M. A. C. was taken out of the box in the fourth inning, and was relieved by Williams. The box-score and summary:

Nine Trinity Men to Compete.

The track team left last night on the 6.35 train for Boston where the team will compete in the New England Intercollegiate Athletic Association meet, in which nearly all the colleges of New England are entered. Only nine men will be taken on the trip, including Captain Maxson in the hammer throw and broad jump, George Buck '09 in the 220 and 440 yards dashes, Backus '09 in the two mile run, Manager Judge '10, who besides accompanying the team, will run in the high hurdles, D. Clark '10 in the 220 yards hurdles, Burdick '11 in the 100 and 220 yards dashes, Bleecker '12 in the shot put, and Breed '12 and Wessels '12 in the pole vault. Coach Coholan will also accompany the team, which will make its headquarters while in Boston at the Hotel Lenox. All the men are in excellent condition, with the exception of Breed and Wessels, who are both suffering from sprained ankles, although it is hoped that they may be able to pole vault in good style. The team is entered in this meet more for the experience, as the majority of the men will be here next year, than to score points as there are no individual stars on this year's

TRINITY WINS AT TENNIS.

Brown Defeated 4 to 2; Two Singles and Two Doubles go to Trinity.

On Wednesday morning at Providence, the tennis team of Brown University was defeated by Trinity, four matches to two, Trinity winning two singles and both of the double events. The result was a surprise to everyone, as the team at Trinity had not been regarded with much seriousness. Brown last week played a tie match with Wesleyan, so the prospect for the latter's defeat at the hands of Trinity is exceedingly bright.

For Trinity Nelson and Pulford played star games, winning both their singles and doubles. Nelson in particular played a strong game, getting in many swift shots which his opponent found impossible to cope with.

The play was opened by Young of Brown and Carpenter for Trinity. Young won in straight sets, 7-5, 7-5, although the play was exciting throughout as the scores indicate. Young exceled at the net and was able to pass Carpenter at critical moments.

Burgwin, Trinity, and Richmond, Brown, the captains of the respective teams, engaged in a finely contested match, although Burgwin was handicapped by a burn upon his hand, and failed to get in his fore-hand drives, losing two of the three sets by the scores of 4-6, 6-3, 3-6.

Nelson, Trinity, and Champlin, Brown, were the next contestants, and for the first time a Trinity victory was accomplished. At no stage of the game was Nelson pressed and by his splendid placing and good all-around work easily defeated his opponent 6-3, 6-1.

Burgwin and Nelson, Trinity, against Richmond and Champlin, Brown, had a close match and the play here was the fastest of the day. The Brown men were driven back by the steady net work of the Trinity representatives, Burgwin in particular being very certain on his overhand smashes. The final score was 6-3, 6-4, in Trinity's favor, with Brown at no time dangerous.

Pulford and Carpenter, Trinity, also defeated the Brown second team in doubles, Pyle and Young, after a close match, 6-4, 6-4. The lobbing which the Trinity pair indulged in was entirely too much for their opponents, and Brown was outclassed, although the playing was hard until the end of the match.

At this stage the score was three to two in Trinity's favor, and on the remaining match between Pulford, Trinity, and Pyle, Brown, depended whether the meet would be a tie or a victory for the Hartford collegians. Pulford was equal to the occasion, and won, although the match was the most closely contested of the day. After Pulford had won the first set with ease, 6-3, the Brown man braced and forced the second set to 11-9 before Pulford was victorious.

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EDITORIAL.

As this collegiate year is rapidly nearing the end, a few words concerning the examinations seem necessary. As everyone knows, "exam" time is a period which everyone dreads. About every student in every college has at the beginning of each term the good intentions to start work right off and not leave things until the last minute. Those intentions are made in good faith, but are somewhat difficult to follow; hence there is now a vast amount of work to be done before the year is finished. It is certainly up to every man to weather these coming examinations in a satisfactory manner. To do this is everybody's duty to himself and to his college. At mid-year's several men who were promising athletes were necessarily dropped because of marked scholastic deficiency. Trinity man wants anything like this to happen again this term. The athletic teams will need you next year, and therefore it isn't only "flunking out" that is to be considered; it is also that everyone should keep off probation. There are still two weeks left before the examinations begin, and during these intervening weeks many of the professors are holding reviews in the various courses. These reviews undoubtedly are the best means of becoming thoroughly prepared for the examinations, and hence these next two weeks are the best time to work.

It is hoped that the undergraduates will come to the aid of the tennis team and join the association, as by their victory Wednesday over Brown they have shown that they are worth being supported. The expenses involved on the trips are heavy, and in addition to the entrance fees at the intercollegiates, make too much of a burden for the men themselves to shoulder. The dues are not large, and in the next week a great number of the undergraduate body should be enrolled in the Tennis Association.

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
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
