#### FOOTBALL PROSPECTS.

## Practice on Trinity Field-Large Squad Appears.

The first regular foot-ball practice of the 1909 season was held on Trinity Field last Thursday morning, and a large number of candidates responded to Coach Gettel's summons. About thirty men appeared, including the remainder of last year's 'varsity, the second team, and the new material.

This year, as has been the custom of two years just past, the old men were taken to the shore at Westbrook, Ct., and any promising material among the freshmen that was known was obtained at the same time. There were practically twenty men, including Manager Groves and Coach Gettell, who were given the immense benefits which accrue from such a trip. What is known as the summer camp for the football team was opened up for business on the thirteenth of the month, and the team only returned for the opening of College yesterday. sojourning at camp the squad was put through a practice beginning at ten in the morning, and lasting as long as was deemed advisable. In the afternoon and evening the men took swims, tramps around the country, rides of different kinds, and also spent some time at the village drug store to the detriment of that place.

The entering class cannot be yet judged exactly as to weight, ability and the other requirements, but so far those men that have appeared have been up to the general standard, and in some cases seem superior to those who generally appear at the first call for candidates.

Five of last year's 'varsity were on the field at the first practice, nine old second team men, several men who have not been out for the team before and a number of freshmen filled the complement. Capt. Henshaw, Ramsdell, A. L. Gildersleeve, Breed and Burdick all seem to be in good shape, while W. G. Oliver, H. C. Neff, S. W. Green, W. J. Nelson, C. R. Bassford, O. Gildersleeve, McElroy, Capen, W. W. Buck and a few others appear in good form as far as can be judged. The old men in college who were on the field were Bleecker, A. Howell, both of whom have played good football in their prep. schools. The new men are Woodward, Moore, Williams, Barney, Leavenworth, C. Howell, Loveland, McCreery, all men who look good as far as preliminary work is concerned. No exact lineup can be given at present, as Coach Gettell is shifting the men to suit their respective abilities. While at camp, Naedel the Yale end of a year ago, played a bit with the men, showing them a few stunts of an old timer. As an assistant, Coach Gettell will have Harvey Pond '08, who played on Trinity's football team his four years in college, and who coached Holderness last year. So far the prospects for a winning team are favorable.

#### ALUMNI DEPARTMENT.

'78-The Rev. J. D. Hills, D.D., for many years rector of Christ Church, Oil City, Pa., has taken charge of the Church of the Epiphany in Pittsburg.

The library has recently received, through President Luther, a work by Rev. Henry Swift, Trinity, class of 1869, entitled "A Study of the Iloco Language." The Iloco is the principal language of Northern Luzon and with the Tagalog and Bisayan tongues, occupies a position of first importance in the group of about thirty languages spoken in the Philippine Islands.

Mr. Swift is a major and chaplain of the Thirteenth United States Infantry, which was stationed in the Philippine Islands in 1907. The work is brought out by the War Department and continues other valuable contributions made by officers of the army, which, with the work being performed by the American teachers in the public schools is bringing about the educational conquest of the Filipino peoples.
