## WORCESTER TECH. DEFEATED.

Heavy Red Eleven Fails to Terrorize Trinity.  
Home Goal Never in Danger.

Trinity opened her football season Saturday by defeating Worcester Tech. 6 to 0. The play, while interesting, was ragged and uncertain, and Trinity's work was a little disappointing to her followers. Smith at quarter was slow and sometimes at a loss for signals, and Hudson, Collett and Lawlor, while they did splendid individual work, did not move together and often failed in their interference. Hudson was the most consistent ground gainer and he and Howell and Ahern starred for Trinity. Collett and Lawlor, while they made several good runs, were also several times thrown for losses. The line men without exception did splendidly on the defense as is shown by the fact that Worcester did not make a first down until the end of the fourth quarter. Perhaps the most noticeable point in Trinity's play was her absolute inability to make successful use of the forward pass and onside kick. It will take a week of the hardest kind of work to smooth off the rough places and put Trinity in shape to defeat Amherst next Saturday, but if hard work and good coaching will do it, we can look for another victory then.

For Worcester Clough and Halligan did the best work, the former's kicking and Halligan's long run giving Worcester her only substantial gains. Worcester also showed poor team work, but still she was up against a line-up decidedly too strong for her.

The game in detail:

### First Period—

Clough kicked to Hudson, who ran the ball back 20 yds. Collett lost 5 on an end run and Howell kicked 35 yds. to Halligan. Collett broke through and tackled Wolf for a loss and on the next play Clough kicked to Smith. Kinney went around tackle for 5 yds. and then Hudson fumbled. Ahern kicked but Howell was offside and the ball was brought back. Howell then kicked 35 yards to Wolf. Wolf and Baxter made 3 each and then Clough kicked to Collett who made a pretty run of 20 yards. Trinity was penalized on this play for blocking inside the 20-yard limit, and on the next play the ball went to Worcester. They failed to gain and Clough dropped back for a punt. Howell came through the line and blocked the kick, recovering himself in time to fall on the ball on Worcester's 40-yard line. The ball was then worked up to the 10-yard line where Smith fumbled and a Worcester man fell on the ball. Clough immediately kicked to Smith on the 40-yard line. Lawlor then tore around right end for over 35 yards and on the next play Hudson went through center for a touchdown. Kinney kicked goal. Trinity then kicked off to Worcester, held for downs and the period ended with the ball in Trinity's possession on Worcester's 37-yard line.

### Second Period—

Hudson made 20 yards on a line shift. The ball then went to Worcester after losses by Collett, and Kinney made an incomplete pass to Howell. However, Worcester didn't keep it long, a fumble, a bad pass and a pretty tackle by Collett forcing Clough to kick. He booted the ball a good 55 yards to Collett who ran it back to mid-field. Lawlor failed to gain and Ahern kicked 35 yards. Wolf and Powers made only small gains for Worcester and Clough kicked 50 yards to Smith. Howell then kicked 35 yards to Halligan who was downed by Lawlor. Halligan then made an incomplete forward pass and it was Worcester's second down. Howart made 9 yards through tackle, but Moore broke through on the next play and tackled Baxter for a loss, the ball changing hands on downs. Runs by Lawlor and Hudson and a pretty forward pass by Smith to Dunsford netted Trinity 40 yards, but then Ahern was forced to kick and the half ended with the ball in Worcester's possession on their own 20-yard line. Score, Trinity 6, Worcester 0.

The second half opened when Kinney kicked to Halligan. After two downs Clough kicked to Collett, who fumbled, Fitzpatrick however recovering the ball. Howell was thrown for a loss and after Hudson had made 6 kicked to Halligan. Worcester could not make first down and Clough kicked to Smith who ran back 10 yards. Collett then tore around end for 25 yards and was only stopped when he was forced out of bounds. Hudson failed to gain, Smith fumbled, and Ahern kicked out of bounds the ball going to Worcester in the center of the field. They tried an unsuccessful forward pass and then Clough tried a short kick. Collett came up under the kick, caught the ball while he was running at full speed and dashed 45 yards before he was tackled. Lawlor made 10 around end. A forward pass failed and the ball went to Worcester on their 20-yard line.

### Fourth Quarter—

Worcester started the last period by gaining 10 yards on a forward pass to Drake, this being the first time in the game that they made their first down. Halligan followed this by a pretty quarter-back run for a gain of 20 yards, but then the ball went to Trinity and Hudson made 1 yard through center and Ahern three around end and then Howell kicked to Halligan. Worcester again tried a forward pass which failed being blocked by Howell and Lawlor. Clough punted back to Smith. Hudson and Collett carried the ball 20 yards to three rushes and then Ahern punted to Halligan who was downed by Howell. Worcester made first down in two rushes and then Clough kicked 45 yards to Collett who returned it 10 yards. Lawlor made 15 around end, Smith failed to gain, and the game ended with the ball in Trinity's possession.

## SOPHOMORES 83—FRESHMEN 34.

Not much Track Material  
in New Class.

In a rather slow and decidedly one-sided meet, the sophomores defeated the freshmen by the overwhelming score of eighty-three points to thirty four. The contest makes 1914 appear in a favorable light, but the sophomores themselves, though wishing to win, would have preferred a closer rub. The showing made by the new men does not augur well for fresh material for the track team next spring.

The stars for the sophomores were: Sage, Wessels, Daley and Hudson. For 1915 Boehm succeeded in securing ten points.

## PROSPECTS FOR SATURDAY'S GAME.

Teams about Even in Weight, with  
Slight Advantage on Trinity's  
Side.

On Saturday the team will take the field against the strong Amherst eleven. Just what the result will be is of course hard to determine at this time, but the team will have to go through some very hard work this week in order to attain a speed and versatility equal to that of Amherst. The game on Saturday showed in what condition the team is at present. The defense was good, especially on the ends, and the backs were fast in getting off. The whole team showed speed, but the most noticeable weakness was the failure of the backfield to make proper protection for the runners. Time and again a Worcester end, or one of the secondary defense, would sift through the interference and tackle the man carrying the ball before he was fairly started. However, aside from this, the team showed good possibilities. Howell was a little slow in getting his punts off, but the line at all times gave him good protection. Kinney's work at tackle was admirable and Collett's clever running was a feature, as was also the way that Captain Howell covered ground, and got into almost every play.

It is unfortunate that Fitzpatrick will probably be kept out of the game by a slight attack of water on the knee. In that case, Bleeker will play center, with J. B. Moore substituting for Bleeker.

In the game against Wesleyan last Saturday Amherst showed good speed and clever versatility of attack. Amherst has six veterans of last year's team playing this year. Captain Madden is a true star at end and is a dangerous man when within striking distance of the opponent's goal, as his drop-kicking is admirable. The two teams are practically the same in weight with our backfield slightly heavier than Amherst's.

The Tripod urges that every man who can play the game report this week so that the 'varsity may have a strong scrub team to play against, and finally let it be known that it is the absolute duty of every Trinity man in college to be present at Saturday's game and help cheer the team on to victory. To defeat Amherst is perfectly possible, so let every man in college do what he can this week and on Saturday to help the team accomplish this.

## Y. M. C. A. RECEPTION A SUCCESS.

Speeches by Alumni and Members  
of the Faculty.

On Thursday evening the Trinity Students' Young Men's Christian Association opened its active year with its first annual reception to the freshman class. The attendance was very fair including many students as well as professors and their wives. The program was headed by a welcoming speech by President Luther, who congratulated the association on its sturdy determination to do something, and who urged every freshman and upper classman to connect himself with and help on the work of the association. The next speaker was W. S. Schultz, '94, who gave an inspiring account of the Men and Religion Forward Movement, one of the conferences of which he had attended. Then came the hit of the evening, Mr. Briggs, our librarian. He made a witty speech which kept the audience in an uproar of laughter. He welcomed the incoming men to his own domain,—the library. In one of his serious passages he compared the Y. M. C. A. with the wireless telegraph, saying that although the energies of the association be sent out in one direction, the effects will spread and influence those who were not in mind at all to begin with. The last speech was made by Professor Gettell, professor of history and of football. He warned the students not to expect too much of the football team, even though it contains good material. He urged every man to help all he could positively, and to refrain from influencing it negatively,—positively by giving the team all the support possible, and by getting out for the second team; to refrain from the negative influence of tempting the members in any way to break training.

After the speeches, refreshments were served, and these were the final influence in turning the students' sympathies, temporarily at least, towards the welfare of the Y. M. C. A.



## "T" CLUB TO BE FORMED.

Organization to Keep Up Enthusiasm for Athletics.

Last Thursday night at the Y.M.C.A. reception in Alumni Hall, Professor Gettell outlined briefly plans for the formation of a "T" club. This society, when organized, will consist of all Trinity men, graduates and undergraduates, who are entitled to wear the much-coveted "T".

**COMPARATIVE SCORES.****Saturday's Results and the Trinity  
Schedule.**

The football results of Saturday's  
games showed few high scores in the  
contests among the larger colleges.  
Wesleyan and Amherst played a score-  
less game against each other, neither  
side being able to cross the line of  
the other or drop a kick from place-  
ment. The muddy field was suited  
to the heavy Wesleyan team, but  
there was no advantage for either side in  
the first three periods. In the fourth  
period the Amherst attack proved too  
speedy for the slower Wesleyan eleven  
and the Methodists were forced to punt  
frequently to save their goal. The Wes-  
leyan ends were very effective. Fum-  
bles were frequent by both teams.

Colgate, whom Trinity defeated by  
the score of 23 to 0 last year, over-  
whelmed Hobart at Hamilton by the  
score of 29 to 0. Brown, the latest  
addition to Trinity's schedule, defeated  
the Mass. Aggies 26 to 0. New York  
University defeated Muhlenberg 5 to 0.  
Haverford was defeated by Rutgers  
10 to 6.

Trinity's next game is with Amherst  
at Hartford. The outcome of the game  
is anxiously awaited as the Trinity and  
Wesleyan elevens may then be compared  
somewhat.

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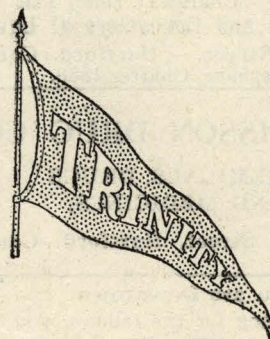
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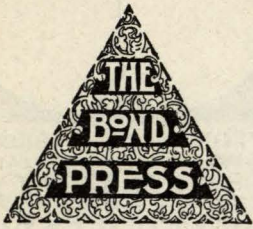
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
