TWO GAMES NEXT WEEK.

Baseball Team to Meet Columbia, and Worcester Tech.

Two out-of-town baseball games are scheduled for this week, one with Columbia in New York on Wednesday, and one with Worcester Tech. in Worcester on Saturday. Trinity has at least a fair chance in both games, Worcester's team especially being below the standard this year.

WESLEYAN MEET SATURDAY. Track Team to journey Down to Middletown.

The Wesleyan track meet is scheduled for next Saturday, in Middletown. So far, neither team has had a chance to show very much real form. Wesleyan was beaten by Williams, 96 to 29 last Saturday, so that would lead to the belief that chances for Trinity's success are favorable, especially if the weather permits continuous practice this week.

CONSTITUTION OF INTRA-MURAL LEAGUE.

The constitution of the Intramural Baseball League is as follows:

Article 1—The name of this league shall be the Intramural Baseball League of Trinity College.

Article 2—The object of this league shall be the promotion of good feeling among the students of the college.

Article 3—The league shall consist of ten members, namely, the eight (8) fraternities, the Hartford Club and the neutral body.

Article 4—The league shall be governed by a board of ten (10) directors, each chosen by one of the ten members. The board of directors shall be the sole legislative and judicial body of the league, and from its decisions there shall be no appeal.

Article 5—The officers of the league shall be a chairman and a secretary-treasurer, who shall be annually elected by the board of directors from their number.

Article 6—Meetings of the board of directors shall be called by the chairman at his discretion or on the request of two (2) directors.

Article 7—The league shall be divided by the board of directors into two (2) equal parts, namely Division A and Division B, and a schedule shall be arranged and published for each division, so that each team shall be required to meet each other team in that division in one (1) game. At the end of the season the championship of the league shall be determined by a game or series of games, as the board of directors shall decide.

Article 9—Games scheduled may not be postponed except by the umpire, on account of unfavorable weather or ground conditions. Failure of a team to appear on time shall result in forfeiture, provided the opposing team is on the field and ready to play.

Article 10—The entrance fees, dues, and other assessments shall be levied

DEATH OF ALUMNUS. Hinsdill Parsons, '83, Victim of Auto Accident.

Hinsdill Parsons, '83, of Schenectady, N. Y., vice-president and general counsel of the General Electric Co., was instantly killed in an automobile accident near Albany. Mr. Parsons was driving a new machine from New York to his home, and had reached Clinton Heights, near Albany, when suddenly a rear tire blew out, causing the car to swerve and then turn completely over, the rear of the tonneau crushing Mr. Parsons' head and causing instant death.

equally upon all members by the board of directors, who shall also have sole authority to expend moneys from the treasury of the league. Provision shall be made for the purchase and award of a trophy annually to the championship team.

Article 11—The umpires for all games shall be appointed by the chairman from a list approved by the directors. So far as possible the umpire shall be from an organization not affected by the outcome of the game in question.

Article 12—The league season shall be open as soon after the Easter recess as the board of directors can conveniently arrange.

Article 13—Each team participating in a game shall be required to furnish to the umpire a new regulation league ball, before said game.

Article 14—Games, except for the championship, shall be of seven (7) innings when possible, but the umpire shall call a game at eight (8) o'clock a. m., except that an inning then in progress shall be completed when such completion may affect the result.

Article 15—All disputes, tie-games, postponements, forfeitures, and the like shall be referred to the board of directors whose decision shall be final.

Article 16—This constitution shall become operative when signed by a majority of the directors, and may be amended at any meeting of the directors by concurrence of seven (7) members of the hoard

OWEN JOHNSON OFFERS PRIZES. Author of "Stover at Yale" wants Plans for Social Organization of Colleges.

Mr. Owen Johnson, the well-known writer of college and school stories, has just announced through the columns of *The New York Times*, an offer of two prizes, one of \$150 to undergraduates of any American college or university, and another of \$100 to any graduate for "the best constructive plan for the social organization of a university or college."

The manuscripts should be submitted in typewritten form and signed by a nom de querre, the real name being enclosed in a separate envelope.

The competition will close June 2 and the announcement of the winners will be made in the Sunday *Times* of June 9. The judges are the Hon. Otto T. Barnard, Mr. Norman Hapgood and Prof. Henry Fairfield Osborn.

Mr. Johnson is very much interested in the social organizations of colleges, and in announcing these prizes he says in part, "I hope that strong papers may be submitted in behalf of all existing systems, (with suggested improvements in the matter of detail) and that equally there may be plans submitted for an entirely different system of division, as well as plans that would argue for no system at all."

TRIANGULAR TRACK MEET.

Brown Victorious by Large Margin. Worcester Second.

In the Triangular Track Meet between Brown, Worcester Tech. and Trinity on Saturday, April 27th, Brown took 89 points, Worcester 22 and Trinity 15. Brown won first and second in six events, first and third in four others, in all eleven first and six seconds. On account of the heavy condition of the track no big records were in danger of being broken. Bartlett of Brown broke the New England Intercollegiate record for the discus, making a throw of 129 feet. 9-10 inches.

Trinity's showing was good considering the lack of practice and the amount of new material.

According to the Berkeley Gazette, they decided by a vote of 5 to 1 against the use of liquors at any of their functions in fraternity or clubhouses, or elsewhere about the institution. The local paper says, "In consequence of this action the annual sophomore "beerbust" is probably a thing of the past. If the prohibitionists care to strain a point, the members of the faculty residing at the Faculty Club will have to do without the little "sip" which it has been openly charged has been served with meals. There is every reason to believe that the point will be strained, for President Benjamin Ide Wheeler has been appealed to in the past by the Woman's Christian Temperance Union to use his influence to stop the use of liquor there." 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
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Alumni Potes.

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
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
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
