MOORE MADE PRESIDENT.

Will Head the Undergraduates During the Coming Year.

At a meeting of the college body held in the history room at noon today, John Bigelow Moore, '13, of Geneva, N. Y., was elected president of the college body and of the Senate. Moore has been widely prominent in all campus activities since he entered college. He has been a member of the Senate for two years, played guard on the football team last fall, and center on the basketball team a year ago. He was president of his class last fall and a member of the Junior Promenade Committee. He belongs to the Sophomore Dining Club and the Alpha Delta Phi fraternity.

Scrub Team Defeated.

A scrub team from Trinity was defeated on Saturday by the South Manchester High School team by the score of 7-5. The game was an unusually good one under the circumstances, as both teams played in fine form, the Trinity team showing no sign of the fact that it was not a regularly practiced organization. The scrub's battery was composed of Beardsley and Kyle.

Y. M. C. A. MISSION STUDY CLASS Finishes Year's Work. Freshman Bible Coming in Summer.

The Y. M. C. A. mission study class, under the leadership of Mr. Briggs, finished its season's program last Friday, having completed an enlightening study of a thoroughly up-to-date book on the subject of missions. Mr. Briggs has proved to be an enthusiastic and capable leader, and the class has been fortunate indeed in having had him volunteer his services. During the summer, the members are planning to make studies of mission work, each investigating a particular field, the results of the investigations to furnish the basis for next year's studies.

The association is making plans for the issue of the second volume of the "freshman Bible." It was hoped that this could be printed early enough to distribute copies among the sub-freshmen who may be here for commencement, but owing to delay in starting its revision, it is improbable that this can be done. During the past year, four hundred of the books were distributed in many sections of the country to young men in search of the "best college." The prospective edition should not incur as great an expense as the last one, as the same cuts and form will be used, and it should prove possible to obtain sufficient advertisements to make it self-paying. However, there is a small deficit left over from the publication of the last issue, and the association will appreciate any financial support. Remittances should be sent to C. E. WESLEYAN TAKES SECOND GAME.

Trinity Fails to Score After First Inning.

In spite of the fact that Trinity scored a run in the first inning of the second game of the series with Wesleyan, played Saturday on Trinity Field, and kept that lead for four innings, there was, as usual, one fatal inning, in this case the fifth, and Wesleyan carried off the game 9-1. Bacon's splendid pitching and the excellent support he received, combined with Cook's lack of his usual control largely account for the victory. The Trinity fielding was good, far ahead of the work shown by the team in the last Wesleyan game; Gildersleeve especially fielding several hot liners that might have gone for hits.

Trinity started off with a rush. Murray beat out a short hit by speedy running, stole second, and reached third on McCue's sacrifice. L'Heureux hit to short, and reached first as the shortstop threw home to catch Murray, who slid safe. L'Heureux was caught stealing second and Bleecker struck out. Score: Trinity 1, Wesleyan 0.

In Wesleyan's half of the first, and in the second and third, neither team got a man past second. Both Warner and Bacon did splendid work in this part of the game. In the fourth, Wright was given his base on balls, but was caught at second, and Durling and Bacon sent fouls to Sporer and L'Heureux. L'Heureux, the first man up for Trinity, knocked a two-bagger to left field, but was left on base.

In the fifth, Campbell got a hit, Martin was passed, and Holden was hit, thus filling the bases. At this point Cook was put in Warner's place. He had not had time to warm up and was a little wild for some time, beside being put in a difficult situation. McCarthy got his base on balls, forcing Campbell home, and Diamond got to first on a wild third strike which L'Heureux could not catch. Davidson's sacrifice brought Martin home, and another wild throw home scored Holden and McCarthy. The next two men went out on fouls. Score: Wesleyan 4, Trinity 1.

In Trinity's remaining innings it seemed impossible to score, although Cook made two hits and L'Heureux one. Bacon kept the hits scattered, besides striking out seven men and was backed up by almost errorless support. Wesleyan hit pretty freely the rest of the game, and succeeded in getting over two runs in the seventh, two in the eighth, and one in the ninth. Final score, Wesleyan 9, Trinity 1.

CLOSE MEET WITH UNION.

Trinity Loses 62 to 55. Four Records Broken.

The meet with Union at Schnectady Saturday, May 25th, was one of the closest and most exciting the Trinity track team has entered in recent years. In many cases races were exceedingly close, and the final score, Union 62, Trinity 55, might have been materially changed by the fraction of a second's difference in speed. The ideal weather made possible the breaking of four records. Hudson threw the hammer 137 feet 9 inches, winning the event, and raising the college record five inches. Crehore hit his real pace in the mile, and did the distance in four minutes forty seconds, gaining four seconds on the old record. For Union, Baker broke their high jump record, going 5 feet 9 1/2 inches and their running broad jump, doing 22 feet 1 1/2 inches. Spofford in the two-mile and Wessels in the half also beat the college records, but as they did not win the events, their time does not stand.

The quarter was perhaps the closest race of the day, resulting in a real "blanket finish." Furnivall secured second, and Hall missed third by a mere fraction of a second. In the half and two miles, Wessels and Spofford kept well ahead of their men until near the finish when both were defeated by a few seconds. Crehore ran a splendid mile, running without great difficulty. Captain Wessels astonished the spectators by his pole vaulting, for although he only had to go 11 ft. 4 1/2 in., such a height had never before been reached on the Union field.

The omission of the discus was unfortunate for Trinity, as Hudson would probably have won that as he did hammer and shot.
