THE REV. GEMONT GRAVES, '49, DEAD.

# Was Trinity's Oldest Living Graduate.

The Rev. Gemont Graves, D. D., a graduate in the class of 1849, who, since the death of Samuel Porter Church, M. D., '41, last December, has been the oldest surviving graduate of the college, died in Washington, D. C., January 27, 1915. He was born November 8, 1827, at Ira, Vermont, the son of Captain George Graves and Lucretia Adaline (Collins) Graves. Captain Graves was a manufacturer of leather at Rutland, Vermont. Dr. Graves prepared for college with the Rev. John A. Hicks, D. D., of Rutland, Vermont, and entered Middlebury College, Vermont, in

the fall of 1843, where he remained two years. He entered Washington (now Trinity) College as a sophomore in January, 1846. His college course was: broken by a year's absence on account. of ill health, which took place at the end of his sophomore year. He graduated in 1849 with the degree of Bachelor of Arts, and received from the college the degree of Master of Arts in 1862. In 1908 the college conferred upon him the honorary degree of Doctor of Divinity. In 1863 Middlebury College, Vermont, conferred upon him the degree of Master of Arts. Upon his graduation, Dr. Graves entered the General Theological Seminary, where he graduated in 1853. June 19, 1853, he was ordained deacon by Bishop Hopkins in Trinity Church, Rutland, Vermont, and September 20, 1854, he was ordained priest by the same bishop in the same church. During his ministry, covering a period of fortyeight years, his work was confined to the diocese of Vermont with the exception of a period of five years during which he was located in the diocese of Western New York, and two years in the diocese of Albany, New York. He was located in charge of parishes during his lifetime as follows: Randolph, Vermont, 1854-1858; Hamilton, New York, 1858-1863;

Northfield, Vermont, 1863-1864; Middiebury, Vermont, 1864-1869; Manchester Center, Vermont, 1869; Cambridge, New York, 1869-1872; Arlington, Vermont, 1872-1875; Missionary Winooski and Shelburne, Vermont, 1875-1880; Cambridge, Vermont, 1875-1901.

Dr. Graves was married October 28, 1858, at Lowell, Massachusetts, to Maria Moulton of West Randolph, Vermont. They had seven children. Two sons, Harmon Sheldon Graves, '92, and Dudley Chase Graves, '98, are graduates of Trinity College. A brother, Charles Emmett Graves, LL.D., was a graduate of Trinity College in the class of 1850, and was for thirty years treasurer of the college, and for a longer period a trustee of the same. Arthur Collins Graves, '91, and Richard Staynor Graves, '94, sons of Charles Emmett Graves, are graduates of the college. Dr. Graves was a member of the I. K. A. Fraternity.

### SUNDAY VESPERS.

Doctor Luther's sermon was very moving. 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#### OBITUARY.

The Rev. Henry Trowbridge Gregory, a graduate in the class of 1854, died at his home, Southern Pines, North Carolina, on December 24, 1914. Mr. Gregory was born at Albany, N. Y., September 29, 1834. He was the son of William Marvin Gregory and Catherine Williams (Trowbridge) Gregory. He prepared for college at the Mansion Hall School, Greenbush, New York, and the Albany Academy, Albany, New York, entering the freshman class of Trinity College in 1850. He graduated with the degree of B. A. in 1854, and took the degree of M. A. in 1857. By high standing in scholarship he was a member of the Phi Beta Kappa. Mr. Gregory entered the Berkeley Divinity School in 1855, and was ordained to the ministry in 1858. Immediately following his ordination, Mr. Gregory took charge of the parish at Thompsonville, Conn., where he remained until 1863, when he was called to the parish at East Haddam, Conn., where he remained until 1868. After one year's residence in Albany, followed by a year's residence in Akron, Ohio, Mr. Gregory settled in Middletown, Ohio, where he remained from 1870 to 1875, and was connected with different parishes in South Carolina from 1875 to 1877, when he returned North and assumed charge of the parish at Groton, Conn., where he remained until 1883. He then returned to Middletown, Ohio, where he remained until 1888, then removing to Ticonderoga, New York. From 1892 to 1896 he was located at Columbia, South Carolina, and from 1896 to 1910 at Southern Pines, North Carolina. In January, 1910, he resigned his parish at Southern Pines and retired from active work. September 11, 1861, Mr. Gregory married at Waterbury, Connecticut, Miss Catherine Stone of Hudson, New York. Later, upon the death of his wife, he married at Brooklyn, New York, in 1887, Miss Mary Belle Wilson, of Middletown, Ohio. There were no children by either marriage.

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
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
