PROF. FERRERO TO LECTURE.

Famous Italian Savant Will Be at Trinity Next Week.

Dr. Wilbur Marshall Urban, head of the Department of Philosophy, has announced that on Thursday evening, January 28th, at 8 o'clock, there will be a lecture by Dr. Felice Ferrero of Italy. The lecture will be in the Public Speaking Room in Seabury Hall. Dr. Ferrero will lecture on "Ancient Foundations of Modern Science." Dr. Ferrero is the brother of Dr. Guglielmo Ferrero, the famous Italian historian, and is studying Greek civilization in the same way that his brother is studying Roman civilization. He has lectured at a number of universities and colleges in America, and is an intensely interesting speaker. The lecture will be open, free of charge, to all friends of the college.

HOCKEY TEAM DEFEATED.

Trinity Loses to Columbia by Score of 4 to 3.

The hockey team journeyed to New York last Monday, January 18th and was defeated by Columbia at the St. Nicholas rink by the score of 4 to 3. It was the first game of the season for Trinity, those preceding it on the schedule having been cancelled on account of poor ice. The team had had all the practice it needed, and Columbia had the upper hand throughout most of the game. There were no exhibitions of finished hockey, as neither side showed much team work. Columbia, however, was better in this respect than Trinity. The individual work of several men on both teams was noticeably good. Captain Webb, of Columbia, played a brilliant all-around game. He was ably seconded by Cleary and Reynolds, the latter repeatedly breaking up Trinity's attempts to score. Bradley and Burnham were the Trinity stars. The former gave a remarkable exhibition of goal-tending, while the latter scored two of Trinity's goals. Little scored the other.

Three times during the game Trinity showed flashes of offensive strength, and improved opportunities to score, but these flashes were short lived, and it was usually the Blue and White that forced the play. The first goal of the game was scored by Butler of Columbia in four minutes and forty seconds, the tally being made on a pass from Webb. One minute later Burnham scored Trinity's first goal. Then Columbia carried the fight to the Trinity net, and finally Webb got the puck in for another goal. Little for Trinity, and Webb for Columbia, each added another goal for their respective sides before the half was over.

The second half was nearly all Columbia, Cleary scoring what proved to be the winning goal in six minutes. Trinity could get but one real shot at the Columbia net, but that one by Burnham was successful.

The contest was a rough one. Captain Webb of Columbia, the shining light of the game, was twice knocked out in the second half, and had to be carried from the ice, although each time he returned.

Adopted resolutions congratulating President Luther upon his good work, and a resolution of greeting to George Williamson Smith, who held office during the Senior year of the Class of 1884.

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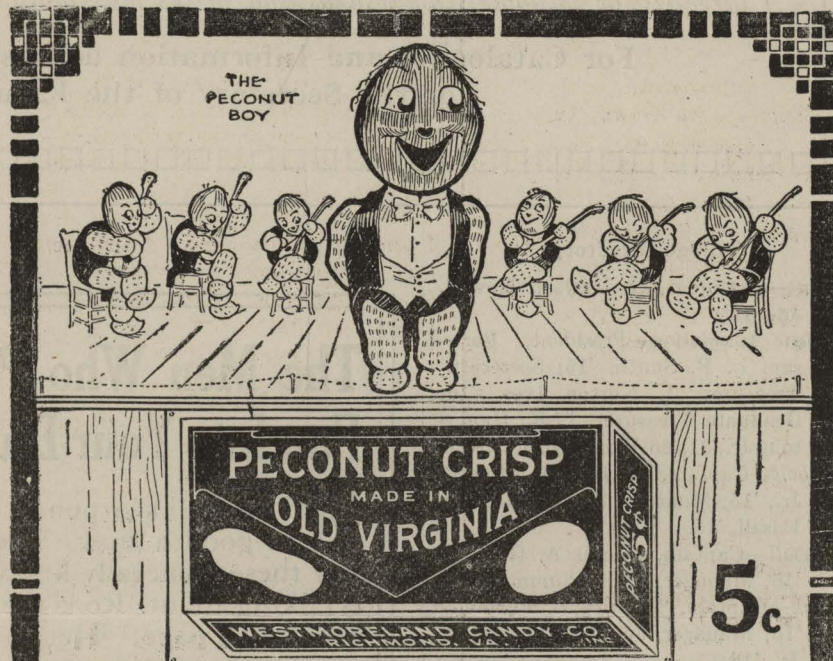
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TRINITY MEN ENTERTAINED.

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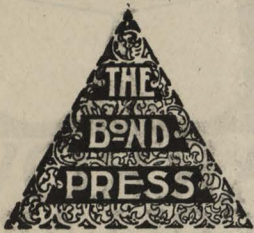
