## WESLEYAN TOMORROW.

### Little to Choose Between Rivals.

The climax of the 1915 football season will come next Saturday, November 20, when Trinity meets her big and time-honored rival, Wesleyan, at Trinity Field. To Trinity the season has already been a successful one from one viewpoint, and whether or not it will be so from all viewpoints rests upon the outcome of Saturday's game. Trinity has had an undefeated, and therefore a successful season, but it cannot be successful in the supreme sense of the term unless Wesleyan is beaten. To an impartial observer it looks about like a toss up as to which team has the best chance to win on Saturday. Trinity has not been defeated, although twice held to scoreless ties, while Wesleyan has been beaten once by Amherst, a team that Trinity vanquished. This comparison would give Trinity the advantage, but it must be remembered that Trinity's development has been retarded by the cancellation of the N. Y. U. and Columbia games, both of which would have been excellent and needed tests for the team. Trinity has been idle for two weeks due to the Columbia cancellation, and it may be that the team has been somewhat thrown off its stride thereby. In these respects Trinity may not be as well prepared for Saturday as is Wesleyan.

A comparison of the two elevens, both as teams and man for man, again leaves little to choose between them. Their strength and weakness, however, lie in different departments. Trinity has the better defense, and Wesleyan is stronger on the offense. In other words, Trinity has the better line, and Wesleyan the better backfield. From tackle to tackle it has not been possible to gain through Trinity's all season. The ends are more vulnerable spots, but Trinity's greatest weakness will be in the backfield. The loss of Vizner through ineligibility, will remove a powerful cog in the Trinity machine, while the absence of Kennedy from quarterback also on account of the one-year rule, will deprive the team of its accustomed and ablest pilot. Maxon is expected to worthily fill Kennedy's shoes, and it is hoped that Hyland or Ives will prove nearly as good as Vizner. On the offense Brickley is the only man in the Trinity backfield who is superior to any and all the Wesleyan backs, and there is comfort for Trinity men in the fact that his superiority is so marked as to need no comment. Cole's greatest strength will probably lie, as heretofore, in his sensational work on secondary defense.

The Wesleyan line from tackle to tackle is infinitely inferior to Trinity's, but Hallack and Boswell, the Wesleyan ends, are better than any Trinity can show, especially in handling the forward pass, which is one of Wesleyan's main assets on the attack. The star of the Wesleyan team is Deetjen, at

halfback, whose end and open field runs have been the terror of all his opponents. It has been said that he is the entire Wesleyan attack. Certainly he is a star of the first magnitude, but his value to Wesleyan is much less than is that of Brickley to Trinity. Trinity has smothered Deetjen before, as those who saw the 1913 game at Trinity Field will well remember. Trinity cannot, however, think that stopping Deetjen will beat Wesleyan, for Peck, Harman, Markthaler, Stookey and Captain Hingeley, the other Wesleyan first string backs, look to be better men than any Trinity combination, excepting Brickley, that can take the field. Thus, when all comparisons are made, there is little to choose between the Blue and Gold, and the Cardinal and Black.

The question of fighting spirit must be considered, and when it comes to that, it takes only the traditions and records of the past to conclusively prove that on that score no Trinity man should worry.

Only one thing can be forecasted with certainty. The game will be a battle royal, and the biggest and most brilliant crowd in the history of Trinity will be present to witness it.
