TRINITY WINS FROM NORWICH UNIVERSITY.

The football team won the opening game from Norwich University on Trinity Field Saturday afternoon, 3 to 0. The game marked the opening of the season for both teams and was not particularly thrilling at any stage. Hyland's drop kick was the only score. Neither team played brilliantly and fumbling was frequent on both sides. The teams were more evenly matched than a year ago, when Trinity won 27 to 0.

Only four Trinity veterans were in the lineup: Captain Woolley, Breslin, Jackson and Nordstrom. The halfbacks did not exhibit great strength and the loss of Cole and Vizner of last season's team was keenly felt throughout the game. Jessen and Purdy are both new men. The center of the line from tackle to tackle was the most formidable part of the Trinity machine and in the backfield Hyland and Jarvis played well.

Most of the playing was in the Norwich team's territory, and the Trinity goal line was not in any great danger at any stage of the game. From the start it looked as though chances favored the Blue and Gold eleven. Neither side used the forward pass successfully.

The only score was the three points made by Trinity on Hyland's drop kick in the last part of the first quarter. McDonald made a short punt-out from his 18-yard line, and Jarvis gained five yards. Hyland dropped back and made a clean drop kick from the 27-yard line.

Jarvis ran the team well from quarterback and played a fast game. Bishop and Martin were strong on the offensive for Norwich. Trinity was penalized for a total of fifteen yards during the game and the Norwich team did not receive any penalties. Jackson and Purdy prevented substantial gains by Norwich by intercepting two forward passes.

Trinity had a chance to score in the first part of the fourth quarter, but after several gains, an attempted forward pass failed and the ball went to Norwich on downs. The summary:

BLOODY MONDAY.

Following the usual custom, the bulletin board rush was held Monday afternoon. At four o'clock the sophomores lined up around the board. Hardly had they taken their position when the freshmen rushed and Fox, '20, touched the board in eight seconds. The judges were Rock, '17, Macrum,

'17, and Rabinovitz, '17.

At 7.15 o'clock the rope rush was scheduled to take place. When the judges came it was found that the sophomores had broken into the room where Bond, the freshman treasurer, had hidden the rope, and removed it. The judges ordered that the rope must be returned by the scheduled time. Promptly at 7.15 the sophomores banded together opposite the mob of freshmen. They were about fifty yards apart. At a signal from the timers, both classes rushed at each other. Soon the spot was covered by little heaps of struggling men. Shortly both classes began to carry off their captives and placed them bound hand and foot before the judges.

The freshmen had a great advantage in numbers. They outnumbered the sophomores 2 to 1. The latter, however, put up a good fight. To those present the scrap seemed to be the most spirited one in years. During the 20 minutes of allotted time the freshmen tied up 25 sophomores and the sophomores tied up 6 freshmen.

The timers were Shulthiess and Jackson, '18. The judges were Woolley, '17, Clement, '17, Jones, '17, and Parker, '17.

After the scrap the entire college body headed by a band marched down town. Dr. Luther made a short address in acknowledgment of the loud cheers given him as the parade passed his house. According to custom, the procession halted under the "portico" of the Capitol, in order to sing "'Neath the Elms."

A college smoker given by the freshmen was held at Harry Bond's.

■ FALL TENNIS TOURNAMENT.

The annual fall tennis tournament for the championship of the college will start Thursday, October 5. The entry list can be found on the bulletin board, and it is hoped that a large number of men will help to make the tournament a success. The entrance fee is fi cents for the singles and fifty cents for each pair in the doubles, payable in advance to Kramer, '17, or Harding,' 18. No entries will be received after 6 o'clock Wednesday evening. The drawings will be posted Thursday morning, and the first round in singles and doubles must be completed by the following Thursday. It is to be regretted that the college courts are not in condition for play, so all matches must be played on the public courts in Hartford. COLLEGE MEETING.

On Friday evening last a meeting of the college body was called in the Public Speaking room by Acting-Secretary of the Senate, Theron B. Clement. The purpose was to elect a president of the College Body, which office was vacant, due to the failure of president-elect McKay to return to college this year. The meeting was called to order by Mr. Clement, who stated briefly its purpose and who voiced the regret of the entire student body over the non-return of Mr. McKay. In spite of his absence, however, he was given seven long Trins.

The nominations for president were then opened. Messrs. Woolley, Rock, Jones, and Macrum were nominated. Mr. Woolley was elected on the third ballot. He then took charge of the meeting.

Brief speeches were made by Mr. Woolley and Coach Cole on the football situation. After some cheering for both captain and coach, it was moved, seconded and carried, that a smoker be held in the Union on Tuesday evening, October 3, to welcome Dr. Luther, and that an assessment be made to defray the expense.

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned.

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SENATE MINUTES.

After this rather forceful introduction of the freshmen to the sophomores, all the classes got together and gave their class yells. The whole ceremony was brought to an effective close by the singing of "Neath the Elms."

Zabriskie, one of this year's entering class, is with the 7th Regiment, New York National Guard.

PRECAUTIONS AGAINST PARALYSIS.
